

An Insular Critic. The Sheffield Independent rebukes those people who, it says, "would regulate our British politics in some reects by what is supposed to be Cantake about this," says the Independ-With "the average intelligent interested Canadian politician knows next to nothing about British polities, has never genceived what the problems of empire really are from the British standmoint, or realized the essential features of the commerce of the mother country. The most obvious and striking feature of practically the whole Canadian press is its complete absorption in Canadian affairs. The great daily newspapers of the Dominion appear day after day with no word of coinment on any matter that is not strictly Canadian. A young, enthusiastic and hopeful country is naturally interested in itself intensely. To the Canadians, Joyal and hearty though they be, Canada is eleven-twelfths of the world, and 1st comes as a revelation to them that England has a point of view they have never attempted to realize. The alienation from English thought and the absence of the most elementary knowlredge of home affairs, is striking. Experienced Canadian newspaper men will tell you in one breath that they have never heard of a London daily newspaper which you read in almost any hotel on the continent of Europe. and in the next breath they will remark that their parents were born in Yorkshire, in a place called Durham, Before we begin to attach weight to Canadian opinion on British politics or commerce we must ask whether there is any appreciable amount of such opinion founded on knowledge and fair thought. The fact is that Canada is at present intensely parochial in politics. She is pivoted on herself. Her aim twhere politics and commerce mingle is to sell all her own products-agricultural or manufacturing-at specially high prices, and she would like England o help her; but as to the English point of view, well, it is outside the range f the average Canadian's thoughts." The Independent bases its remarks on the personal impressions of a staff correspondent, one of the party of Britsh journalists who recently toured this country. This gentleman wrote a numper of articles in which he described in detail the lumps raised on his person by Canadian mosquitoes, and warned all who were attractive to biting inects to stay away from the Canadian Northwest. Even if the mosquitoes had not prejudiced him against this country, it may be questioned whether he could accumulate in a six weeks visit any appreciable amount of knowledge' pon which to found such opinions as re expressed in the above. The party f which he was a member had no leisre for the study of Canada's politics eing rushed to the Pacific coast and back in order to allow them to see as nuch of Canada as possible during the larvest season. It is not true, as he tates, that the great Canadian dailies ppear day after day with no coment on anything not Canadian. During election that may be the case, but aders of the Canadian press will uch for the fact that ordinarily a eat deal of news and editorial space devoted to foreign topics, particularto British politics. In fact, since le question of Imperial trade relations me to the front, British politics have most overshadowed domestic issues Canadian newspaper discussion. here never was a time when Canaans had a livelier and more intelligent terest in old country affairs, or tried ore earnestly to comprehend the Britpoint of view. 


