of William HrEntyre." We are happy to belier that all the papers connected with that sad case air fathally given. For this the authorities of the
Hospital are to be congratulated on their candon at least. The wrong-doing of the Hospital offcial
towards a dying man, established on evidence not and for which the Governors could find no reproo nor even preventive for the future, must plac
these Centlemen in a position before the public both psinful and humiliating. Nor can it raise the
reputation of the Hospital in public confidence and esteem, to have it officially made eknown tha in regard to cathoins neither justice nor ordinary
protection can be expected from its highest tribun religious fanaticism. The small Catholic minorit on the Committee, if unnble to do more, have a least fully succeeded in demontrating this; for, on
cvery question and division, we find an intoleran Protestant majority bear do rnevery effort to obtai
