ECLIPSES IN 1848.

There will be Six Eclipses, four of the Sun, and two of the Moon, this year.

I. There will be an Eclipse on the Sun's northern limb on the 5th of March, at the time of New Moon in the morning—beginning at 57 m. past 6—greatest obscuration at 12 m. past 7—ending at 31 m. past 7—visible only in the north-eastern parts of North America, from the 41st degree of latitude, including Greenland and Iceland.

II. There will be an Eclipse of the Moon on the 19th of March, at the time of Full Moon in the evening, invisible here.

III. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on the 3rd of April, at the time of New Moon in the evening, visible only in the South Pacific and Southern Oceans.

IV. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on the 28th of August, at the time of New Moon in the afternoon, visible only in a very small patch in the Southern Ocean.

V. There will be an Eclipse of the Moon on the 12th and 13th of Sept., visible and total. Beginning Sept. 12, at 17 m. past 11, night; middle, Sept. 13, at 5 m. past 1—ending 52 m. past 2.

Duration of total darkness, 1h. 38m. Whole duration, 3h. 36m. Depth of immersion in the Earth's shadow, 20.42. digits from the northern side.

VI. There will be an Eclipse of the sun on the 27th of September, at the time of New Moon in the morning, invisible in America, excepting along the north eastern coast of Greenland. Visible in some of the northern countries of Europe and Asia.

1. Venus will be Morning Star, until July 22nd, then Evening Star, until May 12th, 1849.
2. The Moon will run highest, this year, about the 2nd degree of Cancer; and lowest, about the 2nd degree of Capricorn.
3. Latitude of Herschel about 38 minutes south this year.
4. Longitude of Moon's Ascending Node in the middle of this year, 5 signs, 25 degrees.
5. Mean obliquity of the Ecliptic in the middle of this year, 23° 27' 32.6". True obliquity at the same time, 23° 27' 22.8".

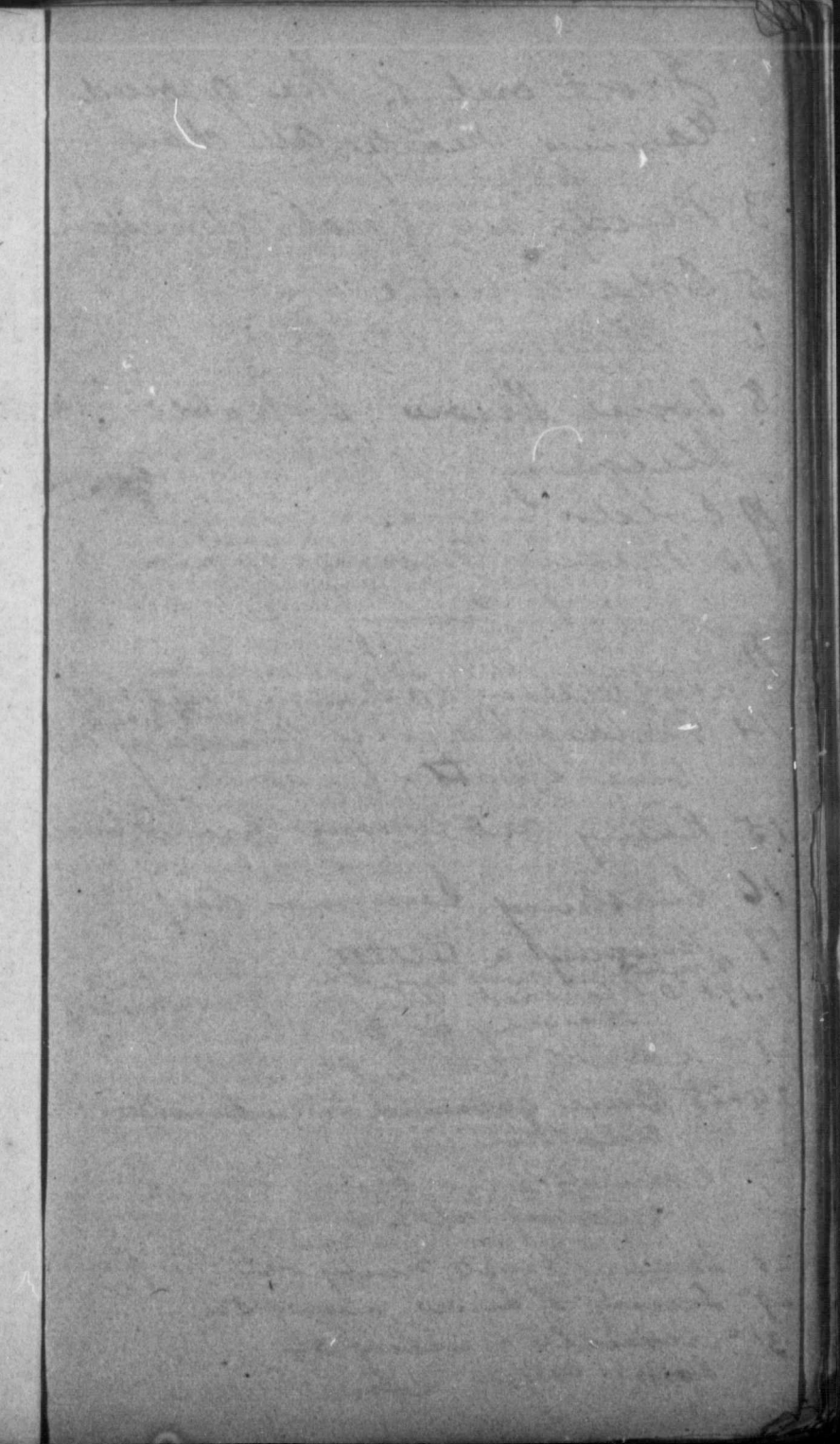

FISH, fresh, not described.

HORSES and CARRIAGES of TRAVELLERS, and Horses, Cattle and Carriages, and other Vehicles, when employed in carrying merchandize, together with the necessary Harness and Tackle, so long as the same are *bonâ fide* in use for that purpose, except the Horses, Cattle, Carriages and Vehicles, and Harness, of persons hawking goods, wares and merchandize through the Province for the purpose of retail, and the Horses, Carriages and Harness of any Circus or Equestrian Troop for exhibition. The Horses, Carriages, Caravans and Harness of any Menagerie to be free, and Horses and Cattle belonging to persons coming into the Province for the purpose of actually settling therein.

HIDES, OFFAL and TALLOW of Cattle and Swine, slaughtered in bond.

MANURES of all kinds.

MODELS of MACHINERY, and of other inventions and improvements in the Arts.

PACKAGES containing Dutiable Articles.

PHILOSOPHICAL APPARATUS, Instruments, Books, Maps, Stationery, Busts, and Casts of Marble, Bronze, Alabaster or Plaster of Paris, Paintings, Drawings, Engravings, Etchings, specimens of Sculptures, Cabinets of Coins, Medals, Gems, and all other collections of Antiquities, provided the same be

specially imported in good faith for the use of any Society incorporated or established for Philosophical or Literary pursuits, or for the encouragement of Fine Arts, or for the use or by the order of any University, College, Academy, School or Seminary of Learning within this Province.

PHILOSOPHICAL APPARATUS, &c. &c., imported for use by any public Lecturer for the purpose of gain, and to be re-exported, shall be allowed to be entered under Bond of two good and sufficient persons for their exportation within the specified time.

ARMS or CLOTHING which any Contractor or Contractors, Commissary or Commissaries, shall import or bring into the Province for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for the use of the Indian Nations in this Province; Provided the duty otherwise payable would be defrayed or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

SPECIMENS of Natural History, Mineralogy or Botany.

SEEDS of all kinds, Farming Utensils and Implements of Husbandry; Animals for the improvement of Stock, when specially imported in good faith by any Society incorporated or established for the encouragement of Agriculture.

WEARING APPAREL in actual use, and other Personal Effects not merchandize, Implements and Tools of Trade of handicraftsmen, in the occupation or employment of persons coming into the Province for the purpose of actually settling therein.

The native Produce and Manufactures of all or any such of the other British North American Colonies as shall admit the native Produce and Manufactures of Canada free of duty, shall be entitled to exemption from duties under this Act, with the exception of Spirituous Liquors.

Also :—

CORDAGE, Salt, Salted or Cured Meats, Flour, Biscuits, Molasses, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Leather, Leather-ware, Fishermen's Clothing and Hosiery, Fishing Craft, Utensils and Instruments imported into the District of Gaspe from the United Kingdom or the Channel Islands, or neighbouring Colonies, for the use of the Fisheries carried on therein: subject to such regulations as the Principal Officer of Customs at the Port of Quebec shall make, and which he is hereby empowered to establish, for the purpose of ascertaining that such articles are *bonâ fide* intended to be applied to the use of such Fisheries.

The Academical Terms are three—Michaelmas, Hilary, and Easter; and the Terminal Dues, payable by students in the Faculty of Arts, are 4*l.* currency, including all charges for tuition.

Those who are desirous of attending particular courses of lectures, although not members of the University, may be admitted as occasional students, but such attendance will not be regarded as a qualification for a degree.

In October, 1846, the College Council established seventy-two Scholarships; three for each of the districts into which Upper Canada is divided, six for Upper Canada College, and six for the University. They are tenable for three years; and the advantages to be enjoyed during that period are, by the District and U. C. College scholars, exemption from all dues and fees; and by the University scholars, in addition to the above, the privilege of rooms and commons without charge. The first Examination took place in October, 1847.

COLLEGE QUARTERS:

First Quarter, from end of Summer Vacation to Christmas Vacation (about 20th December.)

Second Quarter, from end of Christmas Vacation to 20th March.

Third “ from 26th March to 3rd June.

Fourth “ from 3rd June to Midsummer Vacation, about 6th of August.

At whatever period of any of the above quarters a pupil may be entered or withdrawn, his dues for tuition are payable for the whole of that quarter.

All pupils, whose names are on the roll, are charged with the dues, unless notice has been given of their removal from the institution.

Twelve Exhibitions were founded by the Council of King's College, 1841. They are tenable for three years. Accordingly, the regular number of vacancies each year is four; to two of which is attached exemption from College dues for tuition—to one, in addition to the above, the annual stipend of £10—and to one, exemption from College dues for both Board and Tuition, with the liberty to commute the privilege of boarding for an annual stipend of £20.
