At present Benares is the seat of Oriental learning and literature; while it also retains its reputation for superior sanctity by the wealth of its temples, the gorgeousness of its shrines, the costliness of its idol-ministrations, the number of its devotees, and the pride and pomp and power of its arrogant and legion-like priesthood .-Many of the temples are richly endowed; and gifts and propitiatory offerings are daily presented, not only by the affluent inhabitants, but also by pilgrims who flock thither from all parts of the country in fulfilment of religious vows. Nowhere in India is human knowledge so highly cultivated, and human art so far advanced; but nowhere is there such an ignorance of God, and such
