FINAL BRIEF FOR

Was Filed Today in the United States District Court.

CONCORD, N.H., March 27 .- The habeas corpus and for admission to bail, pending a decision on the matter of extradition, were filed in the United States district court by counsel to-day. The document lays stress on the claim that the statute under which Thaw originally was committed to the insane asylum at Matteawan, N.Y., is unconstitutional, and therefore it was no crime for him to escape from custody: that an insane person cannot commit a crime, and accordingly cannot be extradited on a charge of committing a crime; that Thaw's sanity or insanity must be decided before i can be determined that there is jurisdiction to extradite him, and that h is not a fugitive from justice within the meaning of the federal constitu-

As to bail, counsel maintains tha bail in a misdemeanor case is a mat ter of right. The brief concludes: "The purpose of the state of New York being to return Thaw to Mat teawan, it is making a misuse of the extradition laws to accomplish it end. We confidently assume tha upon the facts and authorities Thaw should be discharged."



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS
ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestemption, may enter for a purchased homestempt

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a preemption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

per cent. in mental efficiency, acording to a series of experiments by Dr. A. D. Bush, the results of which are set forth in the current number the New York Medical Journal.

There was a series of 120 tests on ach of fifteen men in several diferent psychic fields. The subjects clunteering for the experiments all vere medical students ranging in ag: rom twenty-one to thirty-two years t varying previous experience, from the farm laborer to the life long student; of divergent mental capacity, from the failure to the honor student, and of differing habits as to tobacco addiction. The subjects were attendants at the University of Vermont where Prof. Bush is an instructor in olivsiology

Among the findings are; The greatest actual loss was in the ield of imagery, 22 per cent. The three greatest losses were it he fields of imagery, perception and

The greatest loss in these exper nents occurred with cigarettes. Nicotine was not found in th smoke of any tobacco except that of garettes, and then only in traces. Pyridine was found in the smoke

all tobaccos tested. Pyridine is one of the decompos on products of nicotine, the latter eing almost twenty-two times as oisonous as pyridine, so far as its action on the human body is conce n

This was the first extensive invesgation of the mental effect of smok. The recent tests at Columbia University and elsewhere were chiefly for the physical effects on students
