L-22 Destroyed by Anti-Air Craft Defenses; Fourth . Attempted Raid on English Coast, Resulting in Disaster During the Past Year

Prisoners in German Camp all Starved by SavageCaptors; The Conditions Revealed

By Courier Leased Wire.

With the British Armies in France -(Correspondence of the Associated Press)-Three British soldiers who have just succeeded in escaping from a German prison camp 2 few miles back of the fighting lines, tell a pitiable story of their treatment by the enemy. They declared there was a great deal of sickness in the camp due to fatigue and starvation.

"If we showed the slightest disposition to get sick," said one of the men to the correspondent of the Associated Press to-day, "we were either thrashed with whips or struck with the butt-end of a rifle."

Although this soldier has been Although this soldier has been in enemy hands only three months, he had dropped in weight from 182 to 108. He was a living skeleton. His feet had been frozen and were gangrenous for lack of treatment. The men had neither overcoats nor blankets during the coldest weather of the winter When cantured durof the winter. When captured during a raid they wore leather jackets. These the Germans took away from them immediately. They also stripped the rubber lining from their shrapnel helmets and took away their regimental badges for the brass that was in them.

One of the men during the perilous trip across No Man's Land at the end of the escape, was badly wounded. For food, the prisoners received daily a quarter loaf of bread, one plate of thin soup and about every second day a cup of weak coffee substitute. On a few occasions they had a bit of meat about the size of a lump of sugar. Recently the men were compelled to work so near the front they came under shell fire from the British guns. The French prisoners, on the other hand, are constantly employed just back of the firing line, and suffer many casualties. In the camp, however, the French prisoners were better treated than the English. It was strange to hear this story in view of the sleek appearance of the German prisoners in English hands, all well fed, well nourished, paid for their bits of labor and permitted to buy-comforts at the canteens under the same conditions as the Tommies.

At a meeting of the organization

of resources committee A. J. Ray-colds, Hampton; A. Gifford, Meaford; A. Elliott, Galt, retired farm-MILITARY WEAKENING ers, were interviewed. These men advised the committee that many retired farmers were already assisting in seeding and will continue to do so to the limit of their ability. They also believe that there are many others who should be aroused to the

need of increased food production, and that each retired farmer should he personally appealed to in each city, town and village of the Provnce by the local committees. In this connection it is of interest

to note that Carroll S. Vrooman, Asistant Secretary of Agriculture of the United States, in launching his campaign to enlist 750,000 new workers for farms, spoke of the retired farmers as the first source of upply and boys between the ages of 15 and 19 years as the second The organization of resources re-

ceived to-day a report from the Y. M. C. A. Boy Secretaries, who have been appealing for the committee to the high school boys to enter farm service. They report that 118 collegiate institutes, high schools, busiess colleges, continuation schools and normal schools were visited and the appeal made to enlist older boys for service on the farm. Also mayors, presidents of the boards of trade, and in fact every leading citizen agreed to give this committee their hearty and earnest co-opera

in Petrograd. Leaders of the red guard propose to establish an organized militia ready to assist, but independent of the Council. Its function would be to fight counter-revolutionary forces, but it more likely would be used as it has been used, to supplement arguments by bullets in a fight with capitalists.

New York, May 15—The sudden death late last night of Joseph Hodges Choate, former ambassador to ges Choate, former ambassador to Great Britain, and lawyer of international fame, was due to heart disease. He complained yesterday morning of feeling depressed, and his physician ordered him to remain in bed. About 10.30 o'clock last night, he called his wife and daughter, Miss Mabel Choate, to his bedside. According to Miss Choate, he said;
"I am feeling very ill, I think this is the end." He died a few moments later.

Notwithstanding his advanced years, Mr. Choate took an active part in the entertainment last week of the French and British war commissions in New York. He was chairman of the reception committee that met both the missions. At the recep-tion on Friday for Mr. Balfour and the British commission, Mayor Mit-chell referred to Mr. Choate as "the foremost citizen of New York," at the banquet on Friday night for the British and French commissions. Mr. Choate was one of the speakers, and on Saturday evening he entertained with a small dinner at his home for Mr. Balrour. Mr. Choate was a personal friend of the British foreign secretary, and they saw much of British commission in New York.

Mass., January 24, 1832. He was graduated from Harvard in 1852.
