HOUSEHOLD RECIPES

MOCK CHERRY PIE

Chop together one cup cranberries, 1-2 cup raisins, one cup water, 1-2 cup sugar; season with vanilla, stir until soft. Line a pie plate with pie paste. Turn in the sauce, put straps across the top and bake.

POOR MAN'S WASHINGTON PIE

One cup sugar, butter half size egg, two thirds cup milk or water, one egg one and half cups flour, season lemon, pinch salt, one teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoon cream of tartar. Bake in two layers, or in one and split when done. Bake in quick oven spread jelly or jam between the layers.

FRUIT STRIP

One cup of granulated sugar, add enough water to dampen it, no more, boil until it becomes a syrup, add it to the well beaten white of an egg. Beat all together until it will not run off the pie, add seasoning.

TARTSHELLS

One scant cup lard, (or half lard and half butter,) two cups pastry flour, one teaspoon soda, two teaspoon cream tartar, a little salt. Mix the cream tartar and soda through the flour, add lard, rub between the hands until it is fine, add water enough to mix. Roll and cut out with a biscuit cutter, cut the centre out of half of them, lay the rings on the other half after they have been dampened with water to make them stick, pick them and bake in a hot oven.
