



The railway passes for miles along the banks of Harry's Brook, the Codroy's and the Humber; 'rabbe's, Robinsons' Fishels, etc. The rivers named are among the best in he country and are usually crowded by fishers in the summer time. On the same page we are told that "in the spring and early summer fishing is at its best," and on page 196, the same book informs us that "the best salmon fishing is to be had directly the salmon start going up the rivers. generally about the second week in July." What is to be inferred from this; are we to assume that Mr. Mc-Grath is ignorant of the advance of the seasons in this country, or that he got himself hopelessly befogged in trying to handle a subject of which he s entirely ignorant. He says in one breath that the best fishing is to be had in spring and early summer, and that the best salmon fishing is to be ad when the salmon begin to go up he rivers in the middle of July. By the middle of July the salmon are well up towards the head waters of most of our streams, much depending on the rain falls. From the first of June, or even earlier some years, good over" are found on the Island. Mr. fishing is to be had in the lower reaches. LEIPSIG, Dec. 13. Heavy punishment has been awarded to the English spies, afrested at Hamburg, after trial. Shult, the English shipbroker, is sentenced to seven years penal servitude; Hipsich to twelve years in jail; Engineer Wolff to two years in jail; Von Maak, a merchant, and Shultz's housekeeper, to three years. The judge sentencing the accused said that their arrest had broken up a group of spies whose activities were dangerous to the safety of the Empire. Hipsich, particularly, had been employed for twelve years as engineer in one of the principal naval sheds, and was able to collect designs and information from all German vards. These had been delivered in January last to agents of the English information bureau, thus exposing Germanys' important military secrets. Shultz, whose sweeping admission established the guilt of himself and others, had organized, according to the judge, a network of spies throughout Germany, who reported direct to England.

LONDON, Dec. 13. Lord Lansdowne spoke gravely in the House of Lords concerning the changes in India. Some of the Conservative morning papers follow suit Dissatisfaction is due to the fact that the new policy involves a reversal of ord Curzon's policy bringing about a partition of Bengal, and the fear that the new departure may be construed in India as yielding to political agitation. The change of the capial to Delhi is applauded generally Almost all moderate opinion approves of the change. Official papers issued on the subject show that the new policy proposed by the Indian Government was thoroughly weighed and considered before its being adopted, as essential to the growth of self-government in India on safe and sound lines. Although the changes will be much criticized in Parliament, all party leaders recognize that, as they vere announced by the King himself. they are irrevocable. 




