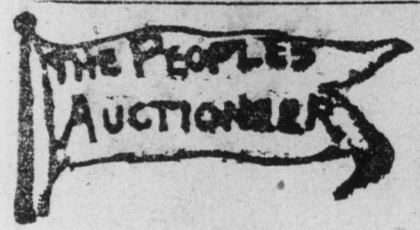

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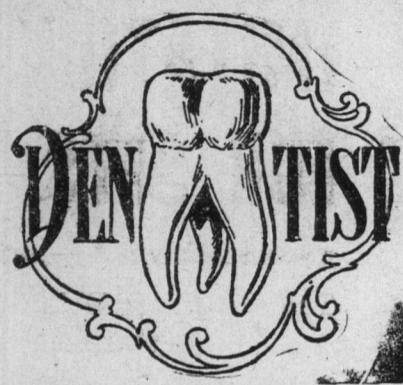

**Serious Accident.**

BOY FELL OVER EMBANKMENT THIRTY FEET HIGH AND IS DANGEROUSLY INJURED.

At the General Hospital now there lies a boy, who is between life and death as a result of an accident he met with yesterday evening. The victim is Thomas Codner, aged 9 years, son of Mr. Nicholas Codner, grocer, of Henry Street. The accident occurred between five and half-past five. The boy was playing with some schoolmates at the rear of Dr. Fraser's residence, on Duckworth Street, and was walking along on the top of the embankment holding on to a fence as he made each step. He kept too near the edge, missed his footing and went over the perpendicular embankment or cliff thirty feet high. He fell on his head and the wonder is that he was not killed outright.

NO DOCTOR AVAILABLE.

Mr. Healey, an aged Municipal Council employee, who is engaged watching on Duckworth Street, saw the boy falling and went to his aid. Workmen near were acquainted and Thomas Delahunty took the boy in his arms and brought him to Dr. Cowperthwaite's surgery for attendance; the boy then appeared to be unconscious. That physician was out on a call and then the boy was taken to the police station. Detective Byrne telephoned to several places for a doctor, but failed to get one; several other officers went off looking for one, but were equally unsuccessful. The boy, who was made as comfortable as possible at the Police Station by Sergeant Courtney, appeared to be getting weaker. A bad wound was inflicted in the top of his head and blood flowed copiously from it. Suddenly he lapsed into unconsciousness. At this juncture his father arrived, took his injured boy tenderly in his arms and brought him home. Again all efforts to get a doctor proved futile and it was not until 6.30 p.m. or over an hour after the accident occurred that a physician was procured. Dr. Fraser, on learning of the accident, responded hurriedly. On examination he found that the boy's injuries were such that he could do nothing for him so he ordered him to Hospital where he was immediately taken in the ambulance. The patient is suffering from a fractured skull and other internal serious injuries and his recovery is doubtful.

A MENACE.

Dr. Fraser informs us that the place at the rear of his residence referred to is a menace to the safety of the children who congregate there.

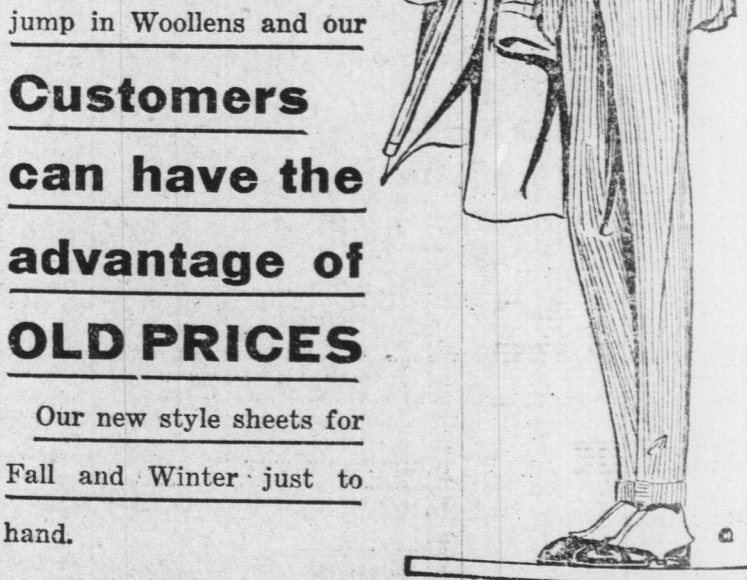

## From the Front.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

**OFFICIAL.**  
LONDON, Oct. 19. The Governor, Newfoundland: France reports enemy attacks near Sochez frustrated, elsewhere reciprocal bombardments.

Russia reports the enemy driven across the River Aa, near Riga. In the southern area were Russian successes at various points. Over three thousand men and many machine guns were captured.

General Sir C. Munro has been appointed Commander of the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force, in succession to General Hamilton. General Birdwood will command temporarily, pending General Munro's arrival.

### BONAR LAW.

**PREMIER ASQUITH ILL.**  
LONDON, Oct. 19. Premier Asquith has suddenly become ill, and his state of health will require withdrawal from public activities at least for a few days. Before 1 o'clock the following bulletin was issued at Downing Street: The Premier is suffering from an attack of gastric intestinal catarrh, which will necessitate a few days of complete rest. Earlier in the day Asquith attended meetings of the war committee and the cabinet, both of them held in his official residence.

### LOYD GEORGE ASSUMES LEADERSHIP.

LONDON, Oct. 19. In Premier Asquith's absence, Lloyd George led in the Commons this afternoon. He steered off all proposals of what the Government considered awkward questions. "It is impossible," was his reply to urgent requests for statements regarding the situation in the Dardanelles, and as to Italian co-operation in Serbia.

Lloyd George was only able to say that methods whereby Italy can most effectively co-operate in helping Serbia in the common cause were under discussion among the Allies. Sir Edward Carson, whose resignation as Attorney General was announced yesterday, did not put in an appearance. No explanation was made of his retirement. ### ANXIETY OVER THE CABINET.

LONDON, Oct. 19. Britain is awaiting anxiously whether the Cabinet ministers will be able to compose their differences or continue the grave work of swapping horses in midstream. The military difficulties which confront the Allies have taken a position of secondary importance for the time being. The Cabinet has been holding long and frequent meetings since the Balkan crisis developed. Both newspapers and politicians agree that vital differences of opinion have arisen over the conscription issue, and the Near East question. In the meantime the newspapers are carrying on bitter debate and exchanging accusations of lack of patriotism and of placing party and private interests above those of country.

### BRITISH PRISONERS IN GERMANY

LONDON, Oct. 19. Twenty-five thousand was the official answer in the Commons to-day to a request for information as to the total number of British prisoners of war in Germany.

### SPIES SENTENCED.

LONDON, Oct. 19. Two prisoners, charged with espionage, and tried by court-martial in London, were both found guilty. One was sentenced to death, and the other to five years' penal servitude, the Press Bureau of the War Office announced to-day. The prisoner sentenced to death was executed this morning.

### GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED.

PARIS, Oct. 19. German attacks with hand grenades last night to the northeast of Sochez, were completely repulsed by French forces, according to a French official statement given out to-day.

### BULGARIANS LOSE HEAVILY.

PARIS, Oct. 19. Heavy losses for the Bulgarians in the fighting which preceded the capture by the Allies of Strumitza are reported in a despatch from Salonika to Milan. It is asserted that the entire balance of the Bulgarians were annihilated by the Franco-Serbian forces. British, as well as French troops, the despatch says, took an important part in the engagement north-west of Derran near the Vardar River, and at Valanov. In the northeastern sector of the latter point the Bulgarians made a counter attack, but subsequently fled across the frontier pursued by Serbians.

### DEDEAGHATCH BOMBARDED.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19. A News Agency despatch from London, published here this afternoon, says that it is officially announced here to-day that Dedeghatch, the strongly fortified Bulgarian port on the Aegean Sea, was being bombarded by the Allied Fleet, twelve miles across the open gulf from Enos, and that if the bombardment is being staged by the Allied fleet, it is probable that a movement to take the city by land has been started by the Anglo-French forces which landed at Enos yesterday.

### BULGARIAN TROOPS OCCUPY VRANYA.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19. The capture by the Bulgarian troops at Vranya, on the Serbian railroad, between Nish and Salonika, Greece, is reported officially to-day by the Bulgarian Legation here. Occupation of the railroad at Vranya cuts the Serbian capital and the source of supplies apart. According to the Legation's advices, four forces of troops are operating against Serbia, and are operating against the railroad northward to Nish in operation. The officials of the Legation were of opinion that a large army would be before the capital within three days.

### ALLIED TROOPS FOR SERBIA.

ATHENS, Oct. 19. British and French troops continue to disembark at Salonika. The number of those troops is so large that it is impossible to forward them all off all rail to Serbia. Some properly by rail to Serbia. Some troops are making forced marches through Greek territory in the direction of Serbia.

### OCCUPANTS OF ZEPPELIN KILLED

LONDON, Oct. 19. A London firm of glass manufac-

turers, which has a plant at Mauge, in France, received the following cable message to-day: "The chimney of our Mauge works has been destroyed by a Zeppelin dashing into it. All the occupants of the Zeppelin were killed."

### RECOGNIZES CARRANZA.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19. Formal recognition by the State of a de facto government in Mexico, with General Carranza as chief of the executive, was accomplished at noon to-day, by the delivery to General Carranza's representative, Eliseo Arredondo, at the Mexican embassy, of a letter from Secretary of State Lansing.

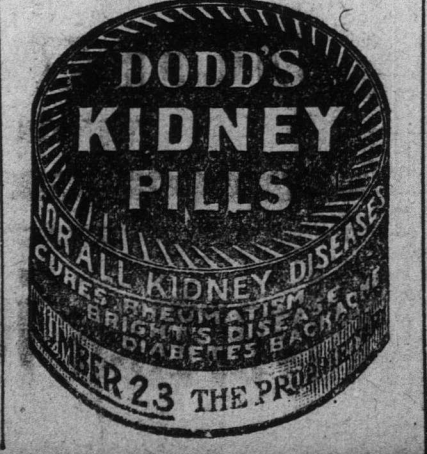

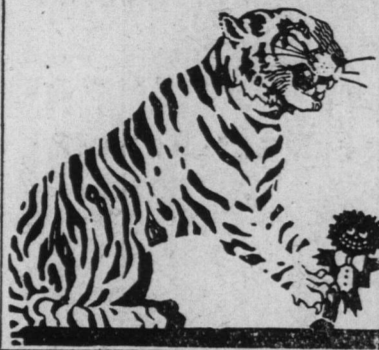

**ITALIAN SQUADRON UNDER SEALED ORDERS.**

PARIS, To-day. An Italian squadron has left for the Near East under sealed orders, supposedly to participate in the blockade of the Bulgarian coast, according to despatches received here last evening, but which were delayed in transmission.

**SEEKING NOTORIETY.**

LONDON, To-day. Robert Beresford, a former army officer, addressing a street meeting in London, yesterday, suggested that King George dissolve Parliament and assume the command of the armies in the field. His suggestion was put in the form of a resolution which was adopted by the meeting. Thus far it has not been ascertained under what auspices the meeting was held or what its purpose was.

**GENERAL COMBATS SUICIDE.**

LONDON, To-day. General Pickler, of the Austro-Hungarian army, committed suicide yesterday by shooting, according to a despatch from Vienna, by way of Amsterdam to Reuters' Telegram Co. The officer feared, the despatch adds, an operation which he was about to undergo would not bring him relief.

**VICKERS DEAD.**

LONDON, To-day. Colonel Vickers, a pioneer of the British armament industry, died today.

**NO BRITISH RECOGNITION YET.**

LONDON, To-day. The British Government has made no move towards recognizing the Carranza Government of Mexico, but according to diplomatic circles British recognition is likely to follow recognition by the States.

**LORD DERBY'S SCHEME OF RECRUITING.**

LONDON, To-day. Lord Derby, who in the Government is entrusted with the task of recruiting, addressing a mass meeting at the Mansion House yesterday afternoon, gave the gist of the plan with which he hopes to meet the situation. "I suggest," he said, "every man who recognizes that the States has a right

to call for his services for protection, should enlist at once. All those found physically fit, wishing to join the colors at once, could do so, the remainder could continue their usual vocations, subject to the call when needed. Unmarried and married men, he explained, would be put into respective groups; bachelors would be called first and married men would be called on later according to age. By such a system, he pointed out, there would be no sudden unmanageable number of recruits, but a steady supply needed by Kitchener. Some one had asked the speaker, he said, why recruiting was urgent and necessary. He replied, "Look at the map." Lord Derby said a fortnight would be allowed to men who were called to adjust their private affairs. He hoped with a proper response, it would be unnecessary to call the older married men. In any event these older men would, as far as practicable, be placed in medical transport units. This is an honest attempt, he declared, to give every man a chance to do his duty in the last effort on behalf of voluntary service. I believe that the voluntary system can be made an unqualified success, but there is no time to lose.

**NO LIGHT ON CAUSE OF CARSON'S RESIGNATION.**

LONDON, To-day. Owing to the illness of Mr. Asquith, the delicate negotiating which is proceeding between the Allies, the enlightenment which to-day's meeting in the Commons was expected to throw on the Balkan situation over which Carson is believed to have resigned from the Cabinet, the substitution of General Munro for General Sir Ian Hamilton, commanding at the Dardanelles, was not forthcoming. There were more than a hundred questions on the order of the day, dealing with the Near Eastern affairs and the Dardanelles, the method of raising men for the army, and while Ministers answered many of them, in no wise was the information which the public is awaiting supplied. It is generally agreed that for the moment the controversy over recruiting is silenced, for the Conscriptors or the majority of them have decided to give Lord Derby's new scheme a fair trial and to assist him in every way to get men to increase the size and fill the gaps in the army. It is understood the voluntary system is receiving its best trial despite opposition throughout the country. Those favoring National Service for all will endeavor to force its adoption should Lord Derby fail in his efforts; so far as the Dardanelles and Balkans are concerned a good deal of pessimism which reigned a week ago has disappeared.

**GENERAL FRENCH DESCRIBES BRITISH POSITION BETWEEN LABASSE AND LENS.**

LONDON, To-day. Field Marshal French sends the following report from the 14th: Artillery on both sides are very active. On our front South of LaBassee Canal

the enemy made a number of bombing attacks, all of which have been repulsed. The reports that the German communiques of a repulse of British attacks northeast of Vermelles have no foundation in fact. The positions where the fighting mentioned above has taken place would be more correctly described as southwest of Auchy lez Labasse, from which it is about 1500 yards distant. It lies about 3,000 yards N.E. of Vermelles on the new front, which now leaves our old line at a point above 1200 yards S.W. of the southern edge of Auchy lez Labasse and runs thence through a main trench of the Hohenzollern redoubt in an easterly direction, 400 yards south of the southern bulge at Fosse to the southwestern corner of the Quarries, our trenches running thence southeast parallel to and four hundred yards from the southwestern edge site of Saint Elie to a point five hundred yards west of the north edge of Hulluch, the line then runs along the line of the Labasse road chalk pit, fifteen hundred yards north to the highest point of hill 70, then runs southeast to the northwest slope of hill 70, runs along the western slope of the hill, bending southwest to a point 1200 yards south of Loos church, whence it runs due west.

**FOUR MORE IN THE BALTIC.**

STOCKHOLM, To-day. Four German steamers have been torpedoed in the Baltic Sea, off Oxelesund, south of Stockholm, by a British submarine. Two were sunk and two are still afloat. The crews of all the steamers were saved.

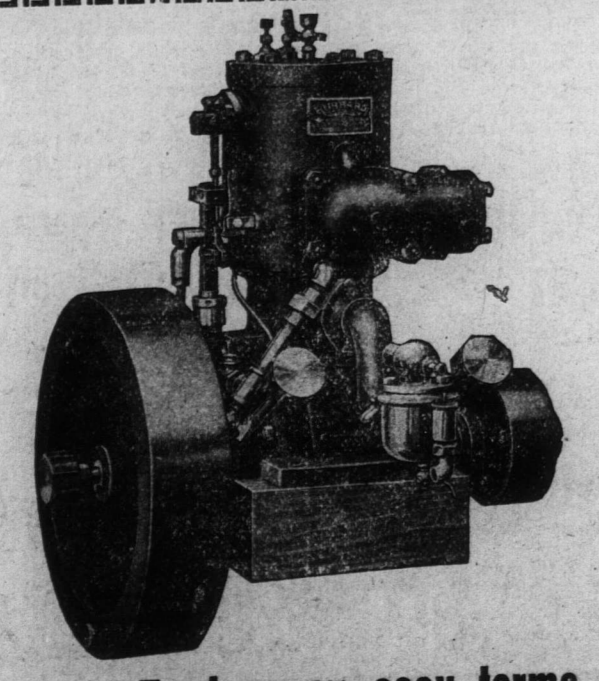

"I never saw anyone so improved," said Molly, the little stenographer lady. "In just what way?" asked the cynic. Molly wrinkled her nose, thoughtfully. "She seems softer and more human." "Was she inhuman before?" "Silly!" with an intonation that robbed it of any meaning. She was always witty and amusing and interesting, but there was a kind of hard finish on top of it all that made you feel as if she were shut up somewhere away from you. If you tried to get close to her you felt as if you were sliding off some hard, slippery surface. She made me think of beautiful shiny cold things, like enamel and diamonds.

The cynic laughed heartily at this characterization, but even without knowing the particular lady in question, I thought it very clever. You see I know other people whom it fits. Don't you?

People whom we would like ever so well if we weren't somehow held off and repelled by that peculiar hardness.

One misfortune after another overtook her. It was as if the blows of fate broke the veneer. She softened and humanized and once more became one of the most charming and beloved women in the community.

Oct. 15th. From Jas. White, (Colinet Island to Head of Salmonier)—Fifty dorries and skiffs and 20 boats are still fishing. The catch to date is 6000 qtls., but for last week, nothing. The fishery is about over for the season and prospects are poor, squid bait being very scarce. The boats are now giving up according as they arrive.  
Oct. 15th. From A. Hollett, (Sound Island to North Hr.)—There is plenty of bait, but cod is scarce and only a little is being taken on trawls, and then only when the trawls are baited at night. Four boats and 30 dorries and skiffs are fishing. The total catch is 1556 qtls. and for last week 60.

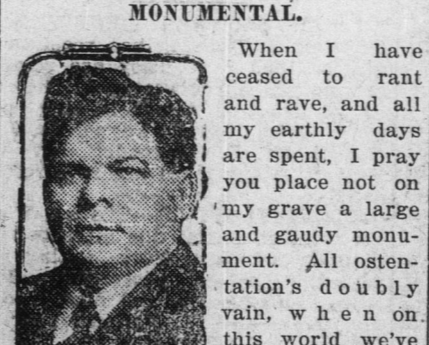

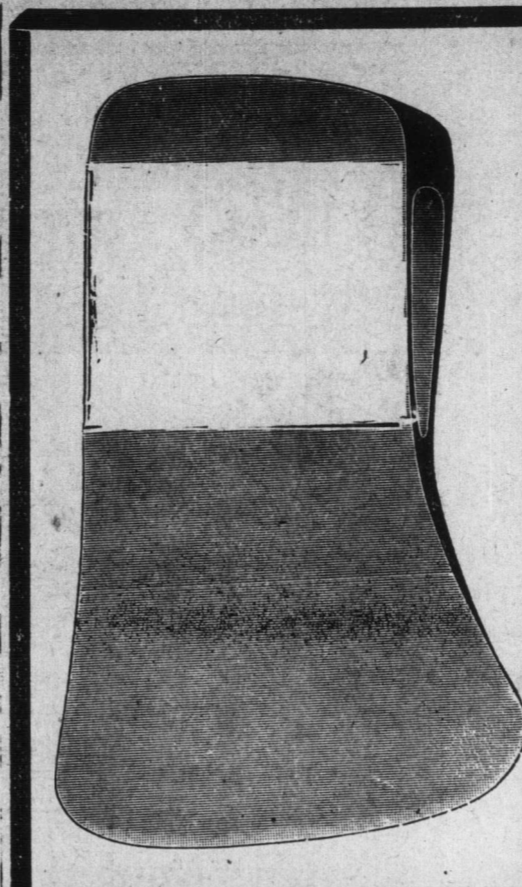

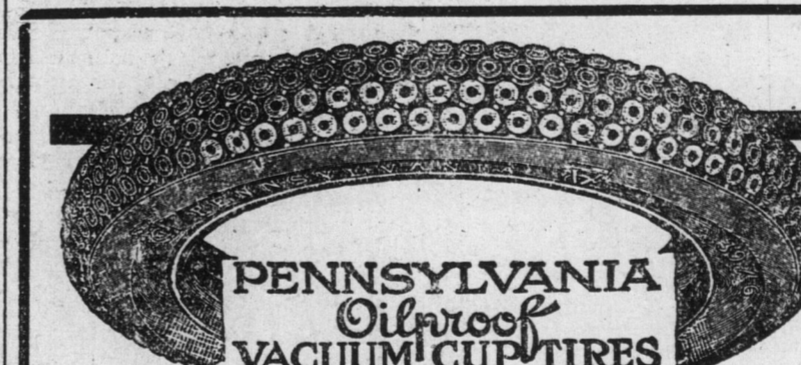
