ST. JOHN'S MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

The following Regulation was pass ed at a meeting of the St. John's Municipal Council, held on Thursday, January 25th, 1917, and ordered to be pub-

The Occupant of any house o building situate on Water Street at any place between Job's Bridge and Temperance Street, shall, with in twelve hours after the same shall have fallen thereon, remove the snow and ice from the footpath in front of such house of building, and from the roof of such house or building, and every owner of a vacant lot or house within said limits, shall remove the snow from the sidewalks in front of such vacant lot or house, and shall deposit the same in the waters of the harbour or other place off Water Street to be named by the Municipal Coun-

cil for that purpose.

Any person violating this section shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding Five Dollars for each offence, to be recovered before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace upon the complaint of the Municipal Inspector, Police Officer, or any othe person making the same.

On and after February 1st, next, upon notification to the Secretary-Treasurer and payment of the undermentioned fees, owners or occupants of houses may have ashes and garbage removed from recep-tacles in the yard of the said houses by the Sanitary Department. Failing any such arrangement and payment as aforesaid, ashes and garbage must be placed upon the sidewalk in front of the houses. Fee for dwelling houses at the rate of \$9.00 per annum.

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


