English Appreciation

"The new arrival of frozen fish from Newfoundland is now on offer. Apparently those responsible for this shipment have given heed to the comments passed on previous consignments, and published in earlier issues of the Canadian Fisherman: the fish appears to have been frozen when perfectly fresh, and great attention has been paid to the grading. Then again part of the cargo consists of packages containing 60 and 80 pounds, respectively, which is a far mere convenient package to handle than the unwieldy 200 pound cases. The fish has been marketed at a most opportune time, and has met a ready sale, being scheduled by the Ministry of Food at 9 shillings and sixpence a stone, wholesale, (practically 17 cents per pound). The shipment consists principally of Cod, but also contains a fair quantity of fresh Haddock, together with a few cases of Salmon. The reliable quality of this shipment, provided it is maintained all through, should do much to establish the confidence of the trade in frozen fish."



BRITISH FLEET SAVED RIGA.

LONDON, Jan. 24.

(British Wireless Service.)—Riga was saved from attack by Bolshevists and from disorders within the city, by a British fleet which was sent into the Baltic late in Decamber, for the purpose of assisting British refugees to leave Russia. Threats of bombardment resulted in immediate representations by German army officers, that they were there to keep order, and that they would leave as soon as assurance was given that anarchy would not break out. 
