Grand Celebration of Hudson's Bay Company Anniversary.

VANCOUVER, B.C., April 29, 1920. Oregon and Washington, according to report, will cross the internations border to witness the street pagean symbolizing "The Romance of Progress," which will commemorate the 250th anniversary of the Hudson's

Bay Company in Vancouver, May 19. The interest of the people of Oregon and Washington in the Hudson's Bay Company is a logical historical sequence. Those states were once part of the vast territory ruled by the company. Fort Vancouver, at the junction of the Columbia and Willamettes rivers, was for years the company's capital west of the Rocky Mountains, and Chief Factor John McLoughlan in charge of that port was known as the "king of Oregon. Sir Robert Kimberley, governor

the company, will lead the parade which will be three miles long and contain eighty floats, picturing Hudson's Bay Company history and pioneer achievements of British Columbia.

Following Governor Kindersley will be six mounted heralds carrying early flags of the company and Canada, and bandsmen in the costume of 1670 Prince Rupert, the company's first governor, will appear escorted by a troup of cavaliers, such as rode with that redoubtable champion of the House of Stuart in battles against Oliver Cromwell.

Then will come a replica of the Nonsuch ketch, which sailed into Hudson Bay in 1658, followed by traders of 1674 with packs and flintlock muskets. Indians on trail and portage will be pictured. A float will set forth all the fur-bearing animals of Canada and the fur-trappers of 1885. Another will support a globe showing the territory over which the Hudson's Bay Company once held

sovereign sway. Red river carts and prairie schooners will carry pioneer adventurers, and a float will typify life in the Red river settlements of Lord Selkirk. Then will follow in order a float showing Fort Charles, first, of the company's posts on James Bay; another emphasizing figuratively that the Hudson's bay company was the first exploiter of Canada's natural resources; em-loyees of the company, winners of the company, winners of the company school children contest; a company of soldiers in the uniform of 1753; and floats typifying Britannia and "Father Time 1670-

The following is an extract from the Encyclopaedia Britannica (Last Edition, Vol. 26, P. 590.—Article Temperance.

The absolute condemnation of aldorsed by public opinion or by the medical profession, because it is con-tradicted by their general experi-That many persons are better without any alcohol, and that many nore would be better if they took less than they do is undeniable; but it is equally undeniable that many derive benefit from a moderate mount of it.

Sir James Paget, than whom no man was more completely master of his appetite or better qualified to judge, drank port wine himself because he found it did him good. He represents the attitude of the medical profession as a whole and of temperate men in general. Attempts to support the case for abolishing the use of alcoholic liquors, by attributing to them effects which spring from other causes, do not carry conviction or advance the cause of temperance A much stronger argument lies in the difficulty of temperance, a definite line between the use and abuse; they tend to merge into one another, and it may be urged that the evils of the latter are sufficiently great to justify the abandonment of the former. But the use of most things is open to the same objection, and mankind at large has never consented to forego the gratification of a natural appetite because it is liable to abuse. Nor is there any sign of an intention to make any exception in favor of alcohol. On the other hand, moderation is attainable by every sane in-

It is in fact, observed by the great majority to an increasing extent. There is a line between use and abuse and every one knows, where it is in his own case. If he cannot draw it let him abstain, as Dr. Johnson did for that reason.

But society can do much to assist the individual by inculcating moderation, setting a standard, promoting its maintenance by helpful environment, discouraging excess and diminishing temptation. All the evidence points to these means as effective agents in securing the improvement which has taken place in Great Brit-


