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Indians in East Africa Demand Equal Rights.

A New and Involved Problem--Nova Scotia Celebrates Tercentenary--Numerous Casualties in Belfast Rioting.

A THORNY PROBLEM.

LONDON, Aug. 31. The status of Indians in Kenya Colony, as well as that of their fellow countrymen in British Columbia and other parts of the British Empire, was one of the thorniest problems discussed at the recent conference of the Premiers of Empire. It has now reached a stage which seriously affects the imperial question. A deputation of leading white settlers from Kenya has arrived at Biera in Portuguese East Africa, on the way to Pretoria, to confer with Premier Smuts on the subject. This

deputation is most emphatic in its view that the settlers of Kenya are prepared to do their utmost in opposition to the application of the principle of equality for white and brown races in their Colony. Kenya settlers, interviewed at Biera, feel that the acquiescence of the Canadian and Australian Prime Ministers in the resolution, adopted by the Imperial Conference, in favor of conferring citizenship upon Asiatics in the dominions is only understandable from the fact that Canada is too cold to attract large bodies of immigrants from India, while Australia is too far away to suggest trouble on that score. The Times in a leading article takes the gravest view of the present position. This paper says, "British settlers at Kenya are evidently anxious to confer with Premier Smuts, as being more sympathetic to their views on the Indian question than British Ministers of the Colonial Office. Such an appeal by a section of the people of a Crown Colony to a Dominion Prime Minister, as being at variance with British Government on certain points, is a new development, and Premier Smuts will doubtless realize its gravity as a precedent, and may be trusted to impress upon the delegation the

consequence of what they are attempting to do. The South African Government will hardly be inclined to assume additional and gratuitous responsibility in open disregard of the Colonial Office."

NOVA SCOTIA CELEBRATES.

ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, Aug. 31. The tercentenary of the granting by James I of a charter of Nova Scotia to Sir William Alexander; the bicentenary of the establishment here of the first court of English common law, in what is now the Dominion of Canada, and the centenary of the coming to Annapolis of Thomas Chandler Haliburton, Judge and writer, creator of "Sam Slick," were celebrated here today by hundreds of Nova Scotians and visitors. Messages were received from the Lord Chancellor of Great Britain and William Howard Taft, Chief Justice of the United States.

VON BUELOW DEAD.

BERLIN, Aug. 31. Field Marshal General Von Buelow, who was Commander in Chief of the German second army during the war, died here to-day.

STREET FIGHTING IN BELFAST.

BELFAST, Aug. 31. Street fighting of a most savage character continued in this city last night, following a day of disorder. The day's rioting and outlaws culminated at nine o'clock in the appearance of a party of men, armed with rifles, who entered Stanhope Street, took positions on the grounds and opened a hot fire. Pedestrians stampeded from the fusillade. Exchange of shots between contending parties began early in the morning and gradually spread over an extensive area with increasing intensity. During a fusillade on North Queen Street in the afternoon two persons were killed and a dozen wounded. An armored car was sent to the scene to stop the fighting. Outside of detachments in armored cars, the military forces of the Government have not interfered in the rioting.

DEAD NOW NUMBER NINE.

BELFAST, Aug. 31. Fierce revolver fighting between Ulster Loyalists and Sinn Feiners continued here this morning, causing scenes of wildest excitement in some of the city's thoroughfares. Another man was killed at eight o'clock, making the total dead up to the present nine.

THE BELFAST RIOTS.

BELFAST, Aug. 31. Rioting and sniping had died down in Belfast this afternoon following the advent of military forces which patrolled the streets in the disturbed districts. Sir William Cotes, Lord Mayor, early today called on General Carter Campbell, Commander of the British troops in Ulster, for soldiers to quell the rioting, urging the need of protection for the citizens, and the demand was granted.

GREEKS DENY MILITARY REVERSE.

PARIS, Aug. 31. The Greek legation in Paris last evening published an official communication dated Eski Shehr, Asia Minor, at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning, as follows: Reports from Turkish sources announcing that two divisions have been severed from the Greek right wing are absolutely false. Our right wing is in complete contact at all points with the enemy, pursuing its advance toward Angora and repulsing the Turks.

AUSTRIANS CLEARING OUT FOREIGN ELEMENT.

VIENNA, Aug. 31. Eight thousand Austrian troops moved into the Nussdorf district of Burgstadt, yesterday, and will police the foreign element there. Refugees arriving here from Otenburg say that city is quiet but wholly in control of the insurgents.

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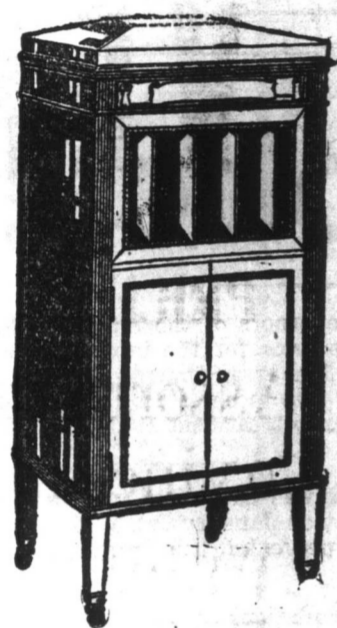

DAMMING THE STRAITS.

A stupendous scheme having for its purpose the damming of the Straits of Bell Isle, between Newfoundland and Labrador at the narrowest point between the two, a distance of about ten miles, is described by Walter Noble Burns in the August number of the Popular Science Monthly (New York). In his article Mr. Burns states that this project is being actually considered by engineers, who contemplate the construction of a railway across the Straits to connect the island with the mainland. The line would be laid on the platform of the dam. The scheme is declared to sound perfectly plausible, but the question is whether the ocean currents will obey the behests of human agencies which essay to direct their courses. There is a chance that while the dam changes the course of the Gulf Stream, the Labrador or Arctic current may be diverted eastward enveloping the British Isles, thus changing the climate of England into that of Labrador. Engineers say no, but other persons do not hold to their opinions. If the wall of masonry across the 'Bells' Isle Strait would alter the climate, it would also alter the agricultural and industrial destinies of Eastern Canada. 'New Industries would spring up to meet the changed conditions. New wealth would swarm in, seeking investments. Immigration would arise. Population would increase enormously. Canada would soon become a competitor of United States in the markets of the world. Montreal would loom as the trade rival of New York and challenge the commercial supremacy of the continent.' What climatic and other benefits Newfoundland would derive from changed conditions such as the above extract from Mr. Burns' article describes, he does not say, but doubtless we too would participate in some of the good things which would accrue to Canada. Anyway the island would necessarily be the half way house between America and Europe, and if as stated by Mr. Burns that a group of British Capitalists have asked concessions from the Canadian Government to build a railway from Quebec to St. John's, via the Straits of Belle Isle, the construction of this road would make our capital one of the great shipping points for Canadian export trade with Europe. No overtures have been made the Newfoundland Government, so far as we know, relative to this proposition, nor has Canada yet announced any decision in the matter. The cost of the Belle Isle Straits dam would be about ten million dollars, and it would require a solid block of stone and concrete ten miles in length and fifty feet wide, the depth not being calculable at present. Whether or not the building of such is outside the bounds of possibility, there are many distinguished engineers who believe it quite feasible, and it may be that in the very near future the seemingly impossible will have been accomplished.

The Badger Situation.

MINISTER OF PUBLIC WORKS EXPLAINS.

Owing to the fact that the allocation for the building of the Badger Road is very nearly expended, 600 men will shortly be paid off, so a Telegram reporter was informed by Minister of Public Works Jennings this morning. Mr. Jennings also gave explanations of various occurrences on the Badger road work. When asked concerning conditions amongst the men, he said that when first they went out their huts were ready for them and they were provided with plenty of roofing felt for covering, free of charge. They got their supplies from the stores and saw live as cheaply as possible. As regards extortionate charges by the storekeepers, Mr. Jennings said that he has previously placed all orders for supplies with leading Water Street firms at wholesale rates, and these goods were retailed at a percentage over cost sufficient to cover loss in handling. He claimed that there was not enough profit made to pay the storekeepers. In connection with the reported attack on Mr. Graham, who was in charge of the work, the Minister said that arrangements had been made whereby one man from each gang of fifteen or twenty would go to the stores at a time for supplies. This was to prevent congestion at the stores. On one occasion Graham found five or six men from the one gang at the stores and at the one time. He immediately ordered them to return to work and was threatened by a number of men as a consequence. He explained the situation, however, and satisfied the men that they were receiving fair treatment. Mr. Jennings denied all knowledge of any disturbance last pay day. He said that an immense amount of labor was involved in the preparing of the cash notes with which the men were paid, and it was possible that the men might have become angry on account of some unavoidable delay in giving them their money. It is not expected that the allocation for work on this road will last much longer owing to the enormous number of men employed.

St. John's Champions.

CITY WINS FINAL IN INTER-TOWN FOOTBALL.

By a margin of one goal, the City footballers won the final of the inter-town series at Grand Falls last evening. A cricket match played in the afternoon between a City team and Grand Falls was won by the paper men by 63 runs. The football game was a real thriller and was fast from start to finish. Combined play was a feature of the game, which was one of the best exhibitions of football ever seen in the island. No scoring was done in the first half, but shortly after the start of the second half the City got away and scored from a mix-up in front of their opponents' goal. The remainder of the game was not exciting. The City players had a most enjoyable time whilst in Grand Falls, and appreciate all that was done for their entertainment. All arrangements for the trip were carried out in a most satisfactory manner by managers R. E. Innes and R. G. Ross.

West Coast Conditions.

Compared with various other parts of the island, the district of St. George's is not by any means in a bad condition, as there is sufficient employment to keep a fairly large number of men constantly at work. It is hoped that during the coming winter the men of the district will be enabled to get work at the lumber camps cutting pulp wood for the A. M. D. Co. A large number of men were employed at this work last year. According to a prominent merchant of the district, there is an entire absence of destitution there.

New Teaching Staff.

On the return trip of the S. S. Sochem from Liverpool several new teachers will arrive for the new school year. They will replace those teachers who resigned in a body in June. As a consequence of the staff not being here, the College will not re-open until the end of September or the first week of October.

Stole a Safe.

Some men contrived in some unknown way to enter the Treasury Department of the Reid Newfoundland Co. early this morning and to get away with a small safe, which contained papers and documents. The man were seen taking the safe at about 2 a.m., but no attempt was made to stop them, and they went off in the direction of the Southside Hills.

The Board of Governors of the St. John's General Hospital beg to announce for the information of the General Public that final arrangements have been made for the collection of fees to be paid by all persons who occupy beds or undergo treatment at the General Hospital.

The scale of fees was advertised in December last as coming into effect on January 1st, 1921, but unforeseen circumstances prevented this from being carried out.

The following regulations, in accord with "An Act respecting the General Hospital," will be strictly enforced.

Under an Act respecting the General Hospital (6 George V., Cap. XLIX.), and with the approval of the Governor in Council, the Board of Governors of the St. John's General Hospital give notice that they have fixed and prescribed the following scale of fees to be levied from and paid by all persons who occupy beds or undergo treatment at the Hospital. The scale is to come into operation on the 1st of October, 1921.

SCALE OF FEES.

Every person receiving treatment in the General Hospital shall, after the 30th day of September, 1921, pay fees according to the following scale:—

Persons admitted to the public wards \$1.00 per day. Persons occupying private rooms \$10.00 per week, in addition to the daily fee of \$1.00. Every applicant for admission to the Hospital must bring with him, or forward to the Superintendent of the Hospital, certificate signed by a duly registered physician that such applicant is a proper subject for Hospital treatment.

Under the provisions of the General Hospital Act, 1915, all patients who are unable to pay fees shall be required to bring with them a certificate of their inability to pay, which shall be signed by a resident Believing Officer, or, where there is no such Officer, by a Justice of the Peace, a Clergyman or other responsible person. The fees of such patients thereupon become payable by the Commissioner of Public Charity, by virtue of the said Act.

Episcopal Visitation of South West Coast.

His Lordship, Bishop Renouf, has completed a two weeks visitation of the South West Coast. On August 17th His Grace's arrival at Ramea Island was the signal for an outburst of gun fire to welcome his Lordship who was on board the entire Roman Catholic community. He was greeted by Mr. and Mrs. Perry, who accompanied him to the beautiful island church. After the necessary preliminary confirmation was administered to the children, and Mr. Perry's hospitality of Mr. Perry's Lordship left a magnificent display of fireworks was given as the absence of fog made the journey to Harbor Breton enjoyable and the morning arrived about mid-day. Every young man blazed away with his guns, and the children and older people, headed by Dean Hawkins received his Lordship and the priests who accompanied him. Fr. St. Croix and Mr. Brogan, at the landing stage. It was soon evident that many of the young people recognized in the visitor a priest of twenty-five years ago, now by God's grace their Bishop. He recalled his labors amongst them and ministered to the scattered parishes, not alone of Harbor Breton but also of the coast of Bay St. George and along the coast to Bay St. Lawrence. With a tenacity which characterizes his people's memory when it is a matter of recalling the good offices of their priest, many anecdotes of long ago were recalled. A sign of his visitation was the arrival of ten young men from Harbor Breton, who were speaking to the people after conferring confirmation. The Bishop expressed the anxiety he and those who had their spiritual good at heart, felt for the education of the young generation. It is to the young girls of the future it is absolutely necessary that they be equipped with that knowledge, the absence of which deprives even the most well-to-do of any chances of progress. The matter rests with the priest and parents to a large extent. The priest supervises the teacher and supervises the erection of schools, but the parents are obliged to send their children to school, and their duties do not end here for they are also obliged to assist by every means in their power the teacher's work. They should appreciate their teachers in word and deed. As he left the settlement, in the morning, His Lordship was accompanied to sea by several skiffs, the occupants of which cheered him loudly in bidding him God speed. His Lordship spent Sunday at Harbor Breton and presided at Solemn High Masses by Very Rev. Dean Hawkins, Fr. St. Croix, and Subdeacon Fr. Brogan. When the ceremony of confirmation was finished, a delegation of the parishioners entered the sanctuary, and facing His Lordship, read an address of welcome. His Lordship, in reply, expressed his admiration for the loyalty to Holy Church, as manifested by the royal welcome that had been tendered. He confessed that he felt deeply the expressions which were contained in the address toward himself. Considering the present condition of the country he asked them to have courage, and remembering the well-known recuperative powers of Newfoundland, to look forward to a gradual lifting of the cloud which now hangs over all our hope. Each man should do his part in dispelling this cloud by throwing himself heart and soul into his work. His Lordship next visited the principal settlement of Bay D'Espoir where he and his party were the guests of Fr. St. Croix at St. Albans. There he visited the Indian settlement at Conne River, being received by the chief and his devoted followers. The Indians of Conne River through their own self-sacrifice and industry built a church which was a point of architectural beauty which compares favorably with any other church. To many who had come to Bay D'Espoir for the first time, many agreeable surprises were shown. The Bay, whose sinuous arms penetrate almost thirty-five miles from the sea, is backed by lofty mountains of granite, which later softened into richly covered with wood, and finally at St. Albans, the land is found to be as rich and productive as any in the island. An industrious people, led by their enthusiastic pastor, Fr. St. Croix, will soon make Bay D'Espoir the same position to the West coast as Conroy Valley does to the West.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

MAKING CONSPIRACY DISCOVERED.

LONDON, Sept. 1.
A despatch to the Daily Mail from Calcutta says that police in the Punjab have discovered a conspiracy among the British to overthrow the British Government, and assassinate Europeans. The despatch adds that prosecution of the alleged conspirators will be undertaken.

TURBULENT EXPULSION.

ODENBURG, Burgenland, Sept. 1.
Lieut. Hjas and other turbulent elements have been expelled from West Hungary by Hungarians. The Hungarian Government justifies the postponement of the transfer of Odenburg, and the second zone of Hungary to Austria, on the alleged failure of Austrians to enter into obligations to surrender the state for property taken over, to retain Hungarian officials in office, and to take over proportionate part of the Hungarian war loan.

ANARCHY INCREASING.

LONDON, Sept. 1.
Anarchy has been increasing in the western part of Spanish zone of Morocco during the past few days, says a Tangle despatch to the London Times. Official statements that tranquillity exists in this region are contradicted by the despatch which declares that attacks upon Spanish posts and convoys have been of daily occurrence, and that fighting has resulted much loss of life and material.

Newfoundland Chapter of Hadassah Formed.

Mrs. S. Kahn of the Queen Esther Chapter of Montreal, Ontario, who is here on a short visit to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. Goldblatt, is to be congratulated on the pluck and ability she has shown in organizing a Hadassah Chapter here in spite of all the obstacles that were in her way.

On Sunday evening, Aug. 28th at 8.30 o'clock in answer to invitations issued by Mrs. Kahn, practically all the ladies of the Jewish community of St. John's were assembled at the home of Mrs. P. Goldblatt, 379 Water St.

Mrs. Kahn took the chair, and being personally acquainted with all present, a formal introduction was unnecessary.

In her opening remarks, Mrs. Kahn expressed both surprise and regret at not finding a Jewish organization of any description in our community. She dwelt at length on the important part that women have played throughout the ages all over the world in fostering Jewish ideals, and appealed strongly to the women here to organize themselves into a body that will rouse the Jewish consciousness of the community.

She then introduced the Hadassah Movement, explaining its aims and principles in detail and succeeded in thoroughly convincing even the most skeptical that it is a movement that any Jewish must take great pride in supporting.

At the conclusion of her able address, it was unanimously decided that a Hadassah Chapter be formed here. Mrs. Kahn was asked to retain the chair and proceed with the election of officers, which resulted as follows:

Why the Sun is Yellow.

All this summer's glorious sunlight composed of different colours and of varying lengths. The longer waves are red, after which come orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo and violet.

These combined give a white light, as we see ordinary light to be. All the sun itself, however, it is certain that large numbers of light-rays are stopped before they can reach our sight.

Many of the short-length and weak-rays, for example, are not strong enough to get any further from the sun's interior than some thousands of miles below the surface. They are impeded, with the result that we do not see them affect the sun's colour in the least.

The strong violet and blue are stopped only when they have nearly succeeded in getting out, and they, too,

are therefore prevented from entering into the sun's colour.

Altogether, so many of the sun's light rays are unable to escape that in the end we find only the very powerful red, orange, and green ones coming our way.

Thus it happens that from the combination of these tints we get a yellow sun. But for all that, we have had a narrow escape from having a blue sun.

Whence They Came.

"E. a. D." has its origin in Librae, scold, and denari. These are Latin words, denoting, of course, "Pounds, shillings, and pence."

"I pledge my truth" is a saying which has not yet fallen into disuse, and it was originally introduced into the marriage ceremony to mean that the parties promised to be true to each other. Truth is an Old English saying meaning faith.

"Nightcap" is a term signifying a drink taken previous to retiring to rest. The Old English word for this was "pocet," and it has not entirely become obsolete. Formerly, "pocet" meant milk curdled with wine or other liquor, and it was taken up to bed and drunk just before putting on the "nightcap."

"Thumbs up," it is interesting to find, is a new saying which originated from a very old method. In the days of the gladiators, the Roman spectators used to put their thumbs up if their favourite was winning. But if things were not going well with them, they kept their thumbs down. Hence the saying, "Thumbs up."

Spots on the Sun.

On the sun there are countless numbers of markings, to which the name of "rice grains" has been given, because of their resemblance to those objects. They measure between 400 and 300

miles across, and are noteworthy for their rapidity with which they change their shape and position.

This resemblance can be observed in a telescope of even moderate power. Their profusion on the sun's hot and glowing surface gives it quite a mottled appearance. Each "grain" is an intensely brilliant speck of light when a high-powered telescope is brought to bear upon them.

So dazzlingly bright are they, indeed, that it is believed they are the tops of columns of white-hot gas rising from deep down in the sun's interior.

The best photographs of the sun show these amazing "grains," or "granules" as they are known to science. The "granules" do not measure more than ten or twelve miles across.

Tanned Truth.

A tanned complexion makes the plain person good-looking, and the good-looking better looking. We all like to be sun-burned, but not all of us know how the tan comes.

The truth is that thousands of the tiny bloodvessels beneath the skin have to be ruptured before we can tan. The heat rays of the sun first inflame and then rupture them. The skin cannot then resist the heat. The cooling shield beneath the skin has gone, and brownish taces place.

Those unfortunate folk whose complexions change to a vivid red instead of an attractive brown have, contrary to the popular notion, tough, thick skins. The latter resist the rays, and there is surface inflammation instead of tanning.

Those whose noses peel have skins in which the perspiration ducts are clogged. Thus there is nothing to "oil" the skin, and it peels because it is dry.

Finally—this will be news to many—only the white races tan, scorch, peel, or blister from the action of the sun. A black man will get much hotter than a white man, because black skins absorb the heat and pass it beneath the skin. It has no external effect.

Freckles are but tan in patches, due to a varying thickness of the skin.

Criminal Flowers.

Like human beings, flowers have their likes and dislikes, and vent their displeasure in no uncertain manner upon their unfortunate victims.

Poppies, for instance, have a very injurious effect upon other flowers placed in the same vase, which seems to react upon themselves, as they soon fade and die under such conditions. The same remark applies to sweet peas, which should always be placed by themselves.

If other blooms are mixed with nigdette, there are few which will survive such intimate contact. A yellow tea-rose faded away in two hours when placed next a pink one, yet in the ordinary way it would have lasted several days.

This explains why, after arranging perfectly fresh flowers, one comes back in the course of an hour or two to find that some of them have wilted badly. In nearly every case, it is willful murder on the part of the other flowers which could not bear their company.

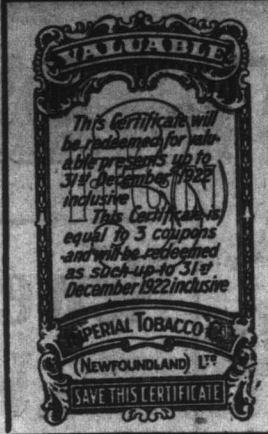

Pimientos are excellent stuffed with well-seasoned chopped lamb and cooked rice and baked.

Household Notes.

Cut winter squash into large pieces, remove seeds and stringy portions and bake as you would potatoes.

Vegetables for a boiled dinner should be as nearly the same size as possible to secure uniformity in cooking.

A combination of fruit seasoned with lemon juice makes a good fruit cocktail. Chill and serve not too sweet.

The wise housekeeper will keep some sewing on hand to pick up in the afternoon. Thus she is not on her feet all day.

Garnish split-pea soup with a hard-boiled yolk which has been put through a sieve. Serve with toasted bread sticks.

Hot creamed fish may be served in the centre of a potato border and garnished with parsley and tiny cooked carrots and beets.

Cook hard eggs, halve and remove yolks. Mix the yolks with three-quarters cup chopped ripe olives, season, and refill whites, chill, slice and serve in cream sauce.

Pare and core six tart apples; place in a baking pan; cover with one cup brown sugar, two tablespoons of butter and one-third cup water, and bake.

Have a frame fashioned for a shallow drawer in the kitchen, into which each kind of knife will fit with the blade lifted so that it does not touch anything.

Brown six pork chops and arrange in a shallow roasting pan. Mix two cupfuls of crumbs, half cupful canned corn, two tablespoons melted butter, one beaten egg and seasonings. Heap some of mixture on each chop, pour in water enough to cover bottom of pan and bake.

Salvage Notes.

Some time in June Mr. Lewis, ex-Lieut. in the Royal Nfld. Regt., came to Salvage on route for Bar Harbor, 3 miles distant, on the hunt for some supposed buried piratical treasure. After futile attempts to get anyone to show him the "correct" spot he returned to St. John's. After he came a second time and started digging operations for the buried loot, but apart from the expenses incurred in the operations, and the reported doings of the supernatural caretaker, "Silver-Buttons," the expedition was reported a failure.

The version of the old time story in connection with Bar Harbor is as follows:—Early in the eighteenth century when pirates were not unknown on the Newfoundland coast, an English sloop sailed these seas in search of the marauders, and late in the evening of a certain day in December, on passing Cape Bonaville beheld a pirates schooner in the Bay. Of course the chase was on, but a blinding snow-storm put a hasty end to the combat that evening. The squadron anchored at Big Bar Harbor. Early next morning some of the officers ascended to the top of Tilly's Hill, and to their surprise saw the "tant" spars of the pirate a short distance inland in Little Bar Harbor. Needless to say, it was a fight to the death, the pirates being extinguished and their leader taken to England and hung. Whether the money is still there—or ever was there—we know not, but we have heard it stated that Mr. Smallwood's Mineral rod failed to locate it.

Up to the time of writing we have failed to hear of any of our Salvage schooners, but a message to Mr. Stanley Burden, Squid Tackle on Wednesday informed him that both his schooners were well fished.

This year appears to be somewhat better than the average for the wild fruits that grow so profusely in our borders. The Blackberry was very plentiful, the raspberries plentiful though somewhat stunted. Gooseberries and Currants etc., are up to the average, while Partridge berries and Blueberries are reported "as black as ever they were" in this vicinity.

Yesterday evening saw shoals of herring in Bishop's Hr. The scene reminded one somewhat of Placentia Bay in the old time herring season.—COR.

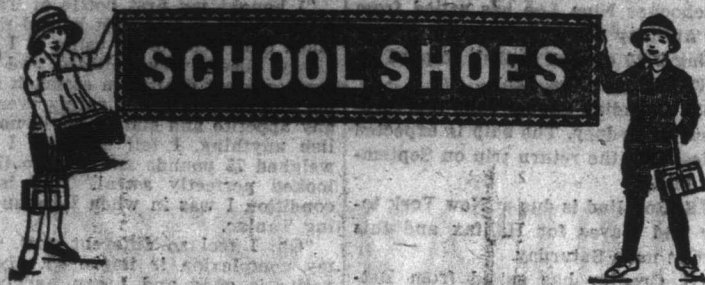

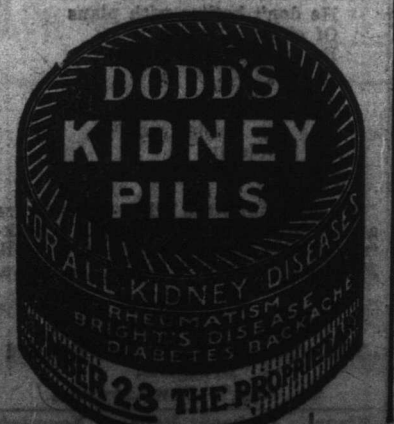

Do American Colleges Foster Bolshevism?

Forum Declares Too Much Liberty Is Given Radical Speakers.

Edward G. Riggs, prominent political writer in an article published in the September Forum on "Radicalism in Our Colleges," says:

"There is a natural rebelliousness of youth, which promises progress; there is a natural venturesomeness to play free with ancient faiths; both of which are attributes of the spirit and signification of drawing mental vitality. It is during the periods when these adolescent expansions are in process that the youth is captured by influences which deliberately lie in wait for him in the colleges. True, in after years a large proportion comes to their senses sufficiently to be able to sit on the fence and see themselves go by, but they come back to sanity. . . .

"I suggest that the anti-radicals should have speakers to attend our colleges and use the language so familiar to the man on the street. They should have practical financial and business experience in order to be able to point out the fallacies advanced by the radical propagandists. Men in this very material business and professional world are usually measured

Bolshevism Cannot Win British Labor.

Englishmen are too individual for Socialism.

Lord Asquith, the eminent British economist, in an article written for the September FORUM, declares:

"The common sense of the country has, on the whole, countered half-baked ideas, and maintained a sound middle course between the dull creed of the reactionary and the terror of apostles. Labor dimly realizes that it marches on its stomach not on phrases. It dislikes dictatorial action, and objects to the control of fear."

"However much international socialism may be preached, the British workman is very individualistic and national. He is not partial to the schemes of foreigners, and there is no appeal to the majority of women, in the theories of Bolshevism or the stories of the doings in Russia. The international effort falls flat."

Sea Notions.

The sea is gradually getting more and more salty.

Sea vapour is not salty, the salt being left behind in the process of evaporation.

The salt in the sea comes from the land, being brought down by the rivers which gather the salts from the earth. If all the sea dried up, it had been estimated that the salt deposit left would form a covering one mile thick over a million square miles.

The sea has a great effect on temperature: in hot climates it reduces the heat, and in cold climates, mitigates the cold.

An analysis of sea-water from the English Channel revealed that in 1,000 grains of water there were 27 grains of salt and 8 of other saline matter.

The cause of the waves is the wind, which presses unequally on the surface of the sea, and depresses one part more than the other. Each depression causes a corresponding elevation, and the undulations are the waves.

A tide is a wave of the whole ocean, which is elevated to a certain height by the attraction of the moon; and then sinks.

There are two tides in a lunar day of 24 hours 49 minutes.

The only effective way of removing the effects of salt water from clothes is by washing the salt out with fresh water.

There is some truth in the statement that sea-water does not give people cold; the salt acts as a stimulant, keeps the blood circulating, and retards evaporation.
