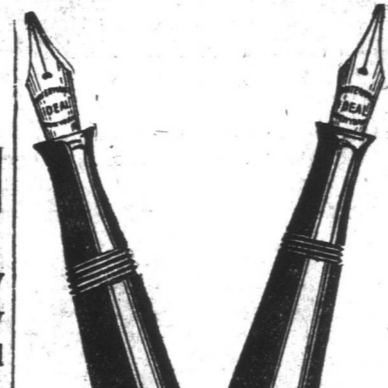

Ismet Pasha Climbs Down

Private Discussions Between Delegates—Chile Plans For Pan-American Conference—Japan's Prince Regent Has Measles.

THE MINORITIES DEADLOCK.

LAUSANNE, Dec. 13. Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation, attempted to put himself in a better light with the League of Nations in an address before the East Conference to-day, in which he announced Turkey's refusal to accept international control over minority populations. He said "some might think my statements yesterday were disrespectful to the League. I must say I give the League all the respect it is entitled to." Ismet emphasized that Christian Turks lived happily in Turkey, and asked for nothing. He also called attention to the fact that the Ankara Government had signed peace with Soviet Armenia. Ismet said he was prepared to grant amnesty to everybody, but would not grant exemption from military service to any minorities because military law applied to all subjects. While the Conference is distracted by Ismet Pasha's flat refusal to consider the Allied plans for the administration of affairs of minorities in Turkey, there are many discussions going on between the delegates, and the indications are that some compromise plan may be reached out, whereby Turkey will be asked to give a large voice in handling the minorities' problems that will not regard co-operation of representatives of the Great Powers in this work as an infringement of Turkey's sovereignty.

SEAT FOUND FOR WILSON.

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., Dec. 13. Lord Col. Leslie Orme Wilson, the Government Whip, who was defeated in the general parliamentary election for Reading, has been elected for Portsmouth South, Col. Wilson received 14,421 votes against 7,000 for the Independent Liberal, Mr. Cross.

Hard on Both Physical And Financial Health.

Observer was walking down town with his friend Knockemall the other morning, when a man went by in a motor car, who waved a "Good Morning" as he passed. The sight of the man in the motor car proved to be the cause of a sudden turn in the conversation, for Knockemall said: "There goes a chap who is committing murder." "Murder!" exclaimed Observer. "Is it as bad as that? Who is he murdering?" "He is murdering himself with too much motor car." And then he went on with his spiel. "You know," said Knockemall, "I remember when this man Willie B. and I used to walk into town together nearly every morning and almost as frequently we would walk homeward together at night. That meant about three miles walking a day for each of us. But now, since Willie B. has a car—and he has had it now about two years—he does not walk at all. In the morning he goes out in his garage, backs out his car, and rides to his office; at noon, he drives home, and then back to his office again; and so on. I don't believe he has walked an average of half a mile a day in the last twelve months; for as a result of his motor car riding he has become so lazy that on days when he leaves the car in the garage he rides down town in the train."

"So you think it is killing him?" queried Observer. "Yes, I am sure of it," responded Knockemall. "He doesn't realize it, but that is what is happening. I consider that the motor car is one of the greatest menaces to the health of the average owner, of anything I know; for I don't care who the man is, if he has a fair appetite and indulges in meats and sweets, he must have some physical exercise as an aid to digestion. Of course there are other kinds of exercise besides walking, but none so easy and none so natural to the business man."

These remarks of Knockemall serve to remind Observer of a conversation he had recently with a prominent banker. Observer had remarked that one of the greatest difficulties of the day in merchandising was to cut down the overhead. The banker replied: "Yes, that is true, but do not confine it to men engaged in merchandising. It is everyone's trouble these days." And then he went on to say that the thing in his mind which was most accountable for eating up the surplus earnings of the people was the motor car—not so much the actual money invested in the purchase of a car, but in the waste of depreciation, and repairs and running expenses. Think of the gasoline that is burned for the purpose of nothing but joyriding. It is nothing less than a frightful tax which the majority of people who pay it are not able to bear.

Observer couldn't help wondering the other day when he saw a comparison between the per capita number of motor cars owned in the United States and Canada and the per capita number owned in Europe (the whole of Europe was not given, but roughly it is not too much to say that over there they have only one to twenty or twenty-five that are on this side of the water) if perhaps the difference between Europe's cost of living and the cost of living on this continent as measured by the motor car might not be the thing that in the course of another generation would put all the gold there is in America back in Europe once more.

Knockemall's criticism of the motor car on the score of physical health was a pertinent one, but the banker's criticism on the score of financial health was equally pertinent—"Observer" in the Maritime Merchant.



Russia Reiterates Readiness to Disarm.

MOSCOW.—Minister of War Trotsky and Leo Kamenoff, president of the Moscow Soviet, in recent public addresses in this city, repeated previous assurances as to Russia's readiness to reduce her army providing other states would do the same thing. The occasion was a gathering of delegates to the Third Internationale. Trotsky announced that the Soviet government "is ready and eager to cut its armed forces in half, or even to one tenth of the present strength, provided other countries would agree to similar reductions." The war minister expressed the hope that the outcome of the disarmament conference to be held in Moscow within a month would result in a reduction of the armies of the Balkan states. Kamenoff said he had a message to the world. "Russia," he declared, "is indeed eager for peace and is prepared at any time to reduce her fighting forces, if given guarantees by other countries. But in making these proposals, he continued, it must be understood that because of our strength we would refuse any proposals which might tend to humiliate Soviet Russia." "This is no idle boast and day by day we are showing greater strength in Communism, greater constructive ability in re-organization of the country and in re-establishing ourselves." A review of the Red Army followed these speeches. The troops defiled past a large reviewing stand. The Moscow garrison headed the parade and included cavalry, heavy and light artillery, machine gun outfits, tanks, armored cars and anti-aircraft guns; then there followed droves of factory and railroad workers armed with rifles, thousands of trade unionists, and many children. The parade has been described as the greatest military turnout ever attempted by the Soviet Government. It is estimated that over half a million persons passed in review.

One woman, for instance, has run Wedgwood blue ribbon through the hem at the bottom of her beige-colored flit net window curtains to tone with her Wedgwood-blue carpet. Another woman made a most delightful set of covers for her dressing-table and bureau out of black taffetas finished at the ends with overlapping rows of colored silk petersham ribbon in rainbow tints, jade, blue, and rose, choosing the colors in the cretonne hangings.

In a diversity of ways ribbon is also used for making cushions, which can be ornamented with a basket-work of interlaced narrow satin ribbons in two contrasting colors, or made entirely of lengths of ribbon in innumerable happily harmonizing tones jointed together at the edges and forming over-enlarging circles.

The decorating of a back of a piano which stands away from the wall is a difficult problem, but can be solved by using ribbon. Two strips of very wide black and gold brocaded ribbon can hang straight down from a rod with a full curtain of thin black Japanese silk between and on each side of the strips. These wide ribbons, with gay floral or tinsel patterns also look very well for dressing-table runners under plate-glass.

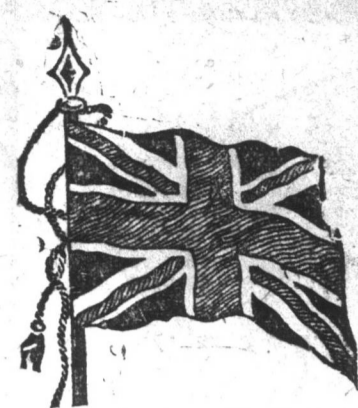

Norway Invades West Indies.

Norwegian competition in dried fish is becoming very active in the West Indies. Formerly this country confined itself to European markets, but with increased production, it was found that wider areas had to be obtained, and markets across the Atlantic invaded. Hence the entry of Norwegian fish into the West Indian islands. And Norway is a pusher. Once her fish is put on new markets, there is no let up in filling the supply and maintaining the demand. Progressive in building up new industries in fish production, Norway is a formidable rival to Newfoundland. And once the fish of that country comes into competition with ours, there will have to be some hustling done to run even. Mr. G. K. Stevens, one of the most wide awake trade commissioners of Canada, whose territory covers Jamaica, Cuba, and other islands of the Caribbean Sea, contributes a timely article to the Commercial Intelligence Journal, in which he calls the attention of Canadian Codfish exporters to Norwegian competition in these islands. Although Norway is at a distance of several thousand miles further from Cuba than Canada, and has to rely upon a monthly steamship service, with freight rates 65 per cent. higher than those Canadians have to pay, and further being subject to a landing charge which most British fish escape, and also the slowness of mails and the more expensive cable rates, yet spite of all these trade difficulties Norwegians are capturing the codfish trade of Cuba and other islands of the greater Antilles. The Canadian trade with Cuba and Porto Rico came to Canada as a war legacy. Newfoundland too had some share in the new business thus created. To-day, owing to not having continued relations and kept the markets thus made, both Canada and Newfoundland have failed to meet West Indian requirements in the codfish industry. There are two influences favoring Norwegian competition, says Mr. Stevens in his very readable article, but one of these only is important. Norwegians are great believers in the consignment plan, and are always willing to ship new markets on this principle. Newfoundland too is a believer in consignments and persists in them, because old traditions die hard. But yet who will be bold enough to deny that cargoes on consignment did not prove generally profitable in the whole history of fish exportations? Nevertheless the time now seems opportune for the abandoning of this old and time honored practice. Newer methods, quicker sales, smaller profits and more frequent returns must be the new order, and its inauguration will spell prosperity to all who are directly connected with the staple industry of this colony. Mr. Stevens argues that the solution of the trouble is simple. The Cubans and other West Indians, demand a certain quality of fish. Norway supplies that grade. Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, refuse to take pains in the preparation of the article demanded. Therefore

they lose out. There is something wrong about this. If a good customer demands and insists upon a certain article and wants it put up to suit his taste, why not give it to him? There is no reason why this could not be done. The man who consumes knows exactly the quality he requires and if one country will not give this to him, another will. Norway caters to the taste of her customers. Newfoundland and Nova Scotia do not. Hence the Norwegians carry off the palm. There is a moral in this which our fishermen and merchants would do well to study out.

Schooner Colonia Driven Ashore.

MAY BE TOTAL LOSS.

A message was received by Messrs Steer Bros. this morning, stating that the schooner Colonia, Capt. W. Blackmore, went ashore last night at Seal Cove, White Bay, and was rapidly filling with water, while the seas were raging, and it was feared that the little vessel would become a total loss. No further particulars have been received, but it is presumed the crew arrived ashore safely, as when the vessel struck she was only ten miles from her destination. The schooner referred to has been carrying freight all season. Her last shipment, which consisted of provisions and stores, was taken from Messrs. Bowring Bros. about four weeks ago, and it was while the supplies were being conveyed to Messrs. Wm. Dawe & Sons at Western Arm, White Bay, that the vessel went ashore. The Colonia was built in Lunenburg, N.S., in 1901, and was registered at 98 tons. Her owners are Messrs. Steer Bros.

Fire at Job's Cove.

TWO PEOPLE BADLY BURNED.

A special train which arrived in the city at 115 o'clock this morning brought two victims of a disastrous fire, for admission to the General Hospital. The patients are Miss Agnes Colbert and Ronald Davis of Job's Cove, B.D.V. The accident occurred on Wednesday night last, and was caused by the explosion of gasoline. It appears that Miss Colbert, whose parents are dead, had been keeping on the home with her younger sister, with a young lad named Ronald Davis as helper for the winter. On the night in question, Miss Colbert being short of kerosene, was in the act of substituting gasoline in the lamp, when both the lamp and can exploded. The flaming contents went over herself and Davis, and both were very seriously burned. Fortunately for herself the younger sister was not present at the time. The young lad did all possible to subdue the flames, despite the fact that he was terribly burned about the face and hands. Miss Colbert was even in a worse state, her arms face and back being horribly seared. Neighbors who were attracted to the scene did all possible to beat out the fire, but in spite of their efforts, the home and its contents were totally destroyed. The two victims were removed to a neighbour's house, where all possible was done to allay their pain. As there was no doctor resident at Job's Cove one had to be summoned from Willets Bay. Dr. McLean responded as soon as possible, but in the meantime, Nurse Hudson of Lower Island Cove had been called. She arrived first and rendered excellent service. The doctor prescribed for the patients and made arrangements to send them to hospital for further treatment. The connections, however, were not completed until yesterday. Miss Hudson accompanied the patients to the city. The ambulance was at the station last night and removed the sufferers to hospital. The loss of their home will be a severe blow to the Misses Colbert as it was not covered by insurance.

A large quantity of oats which was soaking wet and heated fetched from \$1.05 down to 60 cents per sack. The sale of butter and cheese which was to take place was called off until advice is had from Montreal. The sale will probably take place to-morrow.

JAMES WILKIE RENDLE.

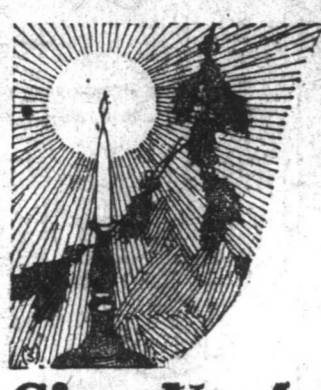

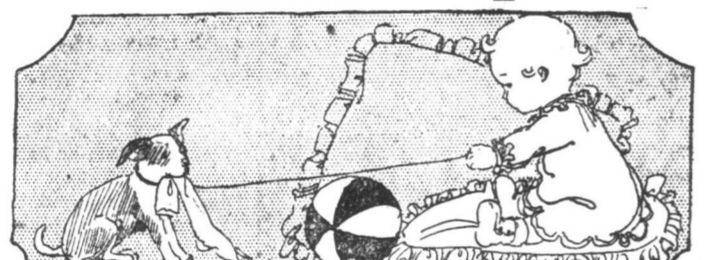

**Address Delivered by
His Excellency the Governor**

At a Special Meeting of the Bible Society in the Methodist College Hall, Sunday, December 10th., 1922.

I remember when I was a boy at school I was told that an old story, if it is a good story, can never die of age. Now I claim for the British and Foreign Bible Society, and I am confident of your concurrence, that its story which is a most thrilling one fulfills these two requirements. It is certainly an old story, because it dates back over a hundred years, and, if we put faith in our religion, it is assuredly a good story. But the Bible itself, for which the Society stands sponsor, is a far, far older and a much more marvellous tale. Right away back at the dawn of history when man was extremely primitive there was an undoubted desire for, and a hankering after, what may be termed a control of some sort to regulate human society, and later customs and laws became blended with rules and formulas and thus a standard was evolved. The Old Testament shows how Church and State in Ancient Israel had no separate existence. Gradually and very slowly this primitive order decayed and vanished, and as men learned to think and reason, and sifted out truth from superstition, former beliefs dissolved. Then finally a new faith was born, one that was eventually to sway the Darwars, and men listened spellbound to the wonderful story of One God, the Father of humanity and Redeemer of mankind. For long generations State and Church held domination together, but slowly modern Europe threw off the shackles of ecclesiastical bondage while retaining religion as its life-blood. In this respect did not history repeat itself during the terrible years of the Great War? Did we not as a people recognize again and again that our main support was our religion? Did not the widow and the orphan and those who lost their nearest and dearest in the fight for freedom feel that their restorative and consolation, indeed their mainstay in their days of sorrow, anguish, and grief, was their religion?

And does it not come home to each one of us, more particularly at this time of year, how the New Testament is the Magna Charta of Peace on Earth, Goodwill among Men? Readers of all faiths and believers in the Bible cannot fall then to regard the Bible Society as a partnership of Christian people belonging to many different communions, but with a common object in view, namely, to provide each one who can read with God's message in his mother tongue. So world-embracing is the Society's activities that the Gospel is being issued in some fresh tongue on an average of about one every five or six weeks. The Society exists solely to make the Scriptures available to every race of mankind, leaving all questions of interpretation to authorized teachers, in other words, to circulate the text of Holy Writ without note or comment. But as you will readily understand the practical difficulties of translation are many. To instance what I mean I will read a passage from a report I have before me.

Having instanced the difficulties of the translator in his at all times most delicate and perplexing task, permit me for a moment to testify my appreciation of the magnificent services rendered by these devoted missionaries and their wives belonging to the Anglican, Wesleyan, and Presbyterian denominations, whose work fell under my notice during the twenty-five years I was in the Pacific. The still earlier story, commencing with the voyage of the good ship "Duff" of the London Missionary Society over 100 years ago, when the glad tidings contained in the Bible were first carried to the various benighted and heathen populations inhabiting those wonderful archipelagoes stretching from the Continent of America across the intervening 7,000 miles of sea to the Commonwealth of Australia, is a more thrilling story than any three volume novel. The difficulties and dangers, the encouragements and disappoint-

ments, the victories and the failures of the men and women who went out in the first voyage of the "Duff" must ever remain an inspiration of the many hard pressed, overworked, heavily fatigued and devoted men of every denomination who have given up their lives to the Master's work, and are engaged in conveying the Bible and its teachings to the millions throughout the universe whether engaged in toil in our over-crowded cities, or earning their living on the deep, or dwelling in comparative comfort, or doing pioneer development in the far-flung lands or in tropical and fever-stricken areas. But in alluding to pioneer missionary effort in the Pacific, I particularly desire to mention the splendid services rendered by Roman Catholic Priests and Sisters in those far-away, lonely, and lovely islands. Words fail me to do justice to their devotion and example and their self-sacrifice.

In 1921-22 the Society's issues numbered over eight and a half millions, composed of over one and a half million Bibles and nearly seven million portions of Scriptures. Considering the distracted state not only of Europe, but of the whole world, the above is undoubtedly a phenomenal, indeed almost incredible record. It goes without saying that to obtain such colossal figures and such wonderful results, involves a huge amount of work and organization and an enormous expenditure. This is quite apart from the maintenance of over one hundred depots in various continents and many other expenses such as colporteurs, etc. The Society's receipts during the last financial year (1921-22) amount £394,000 and the disbursements £382,000, leaving a credit balance of £12,000 on the year's operations. This satisfactory result was only brought about by the most severe economy and retrenchment, and it is only right to mention that the receipts included special gifts amounting to £20,000 and that a favorable foreign exchange assisted the reduction in outlay in many countries. The number of languages on the Society's lists to-day is 550. Of these 100 were added during the last nine years, the Great War notwithstanding.

I trust that this rough sketch of some of the Bible Society's activities and the results that have been and are being achieved, thanks to the Bible, justify a continuance of the financial support which has been given to the Society in the past by the people of Newfoundland.

Jewelled Hip-Belts.


Now that the waist on gowns is approaching its normal position—both on day and evening models—it is not surprising to find that this line is accentuated by broad belts which provide a feat of interest on simple toilettes. A beautiful model recently seen had one of the new draped skirts which was looped above a jewelled hip-belt the top of which was at the normal waist-line. Pink coral colored brocade composed the gown and white coral and tiny crystal beads were used in a floral design to make the decorative belt.

Taking The Census.

JERUSALEM—Palestinians temperamentally afraid of the census. In the days of Abdul Hamid and other Ottoman rulers a census was taken only in order to increase taxation or to conscript the men for military service. The pre-war days are still fresh in peoples' minds, and therefore most of them to-day prefer to remain uncounted. Because of this, and the feeling which has run very strong among the Mohammedan and Christian populations on account of the Balfour declaration, the present government's demand for a census has met with considerable opposition. The government evidently has been perfectly sincere in its purpose to find out the total population of Palestine with the primary object of determining who is eligible to vote in a forthcoming election for members of the legislative councils of the government. However, every sort of opposition has been encountered, both from the intelligent and the ignorant. The Mohammedan and Christian society first sent out a manifesto to its constituency, advising them to do what they could to help the census along, but later the society retraced its manifesto. This resulted in open opposition to the census, especially in Nablus, the ancient Shechem. The government began by showing a strong hand and imprisoning a dozen notables but it finally changed its policy, released all who had been arrested, and even consented to the demand to enumerate all absent Syrians, which had been put forward by the society.

When the day of the census arrived all the government schools of the country were closed so that the teachers could be used as enumerators. So strong was the feeling in some quarters, however, that in Jerusalem three Mohammedan and two Christian teachers refused to assist in the work, and were thereupon dismissed from service. This resulted in a strike on the part of all the boys in the school where these teachers held classes.

Waterspout Wonders.

A remarkable experience recently befell the crew of the steamship Carston, off Guantanamo, Cuba.
 One afternoon the vessel was caught in a tropical thunderstorm, which lasted for about three-quarters of an hour. Then the wind dropped suddenly and the low clouds began to send down a number of long, tapering arms towards the water.
 These arms were constantly changing their shape and size. Sometimes some of the smaller ones spinning at an almost incredible speed. When a larger spout was formed it would absorb all the smaller ones around it. At one time no fewer than nine waterspouts were visible at the same moment.
 Waterspouts are fairly common in the course of the Gulf Stream, and one is occasionally seen round the British coast. But to encounter them in such numbers is an almost unheard-of occurrence.
 They are caused by small swirls of air, which are brought about by conflicting currents in the atmosphere. These swirls suck up the water from the sea, sometimes in the form of spray, but more often in the form of a great swaying column of solid water. As the spout reaches the clouds, which are always low at such a time, it spreads out and breaks into drops, which are scattered through the body of the clouds.

The Ghosts of Parliament.

SOME WEIRD APPARITIONS.

 While "Silent Members" may be regarded as the modern substantial ghosts of the House of Commons, there are also spectres reported on the precincts of the Famous Legislative Chamber of more romantic and tragic character.
 One of the most cherished, traditional possessions of Westminster is the Terrace ghost, a weird apparition, taking the shape of a tall lady attired in shimmering white, who on foggy nights perambulates the Terrace, finally hurling herself, uttering a despairing shriek, over the parapet into the dark waters of the Thames.
 "Big Ben's" ghost is said only to appear in the vicinity of the House on the occasion of the death of a royal personage, or prominent member. As the midnight hour booms forth from "Big Ben" the ghost appears rowing an old leaky boat from the shadow of Westminster Bridge towards St Stephen's. As the last stroke of twelve strikes the spectral boatman and his craft mysteriously disappear.

 A strange ghost story is told in connection with T. P. O'Connor, the "father of the House." One morning, early in the year 1897, Mr. O'Connor hurriedly set off for Ireland to the bedside of a dying parent. His seat in

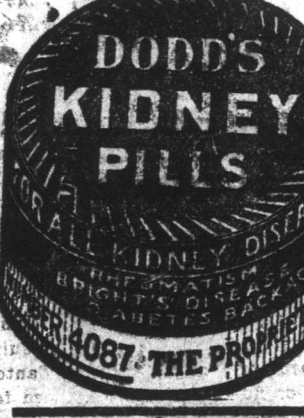

Fluke That Brought Fame.

HISTORY OF A GREAT SONG.
Early next year will be celebrated the centenary of the first performance in public, at Covent Garden Opera House, of that wonderful song, "Home, Sweet Home."
The author of the words was John Howard Payne, an American, living in London. He was born in the United States and lost both parents when still only a schoolboy. Previous to this he had wanted to go on the stage but to prevent this his father apprenticed him to a merchant.
Payne had an extraordinary love for the theatre, and used to contribute poems and articles to a small theatrical magazine. One day his work attracted the attention of a wealthy man, who took an interest in the budding author and sent him to college to be educated.

Hard Work's Reward.
Here Payne was not lucky. He made bad friends, and his studies did not progress much. Gradually he managed to displease his benefactor, and finally found himself alone in the world at sixteen.
By dint of hard work and perseverance he became quite well known as an actor and playwright. At twenty he came to London and contracted to supply librettos for operas at Covent Garden.
One of these, "Clari, or The Maid of Milan," was ready early in 1823, but by a lucky chance another song was suddenly decided upon by the management to improve the second act, and Payne was told to provide this immediately.
The "Home, Sweet Home" was born. The air is also an invention of Payne's, for it was he who hummed it over to Sir Henry Bowley Bishop, who was to set the song.
Within two years Payne had made over £2,000 out of royalties, though after this the song did not make much more for a time, and Payne still had to work very hard and keep on writing.
He died in 1855, lonely and unhappy, never seeming to have got much out of life.

Secret Flying Battleships

GIANT PLANE AS "EYES OF THE FLEET"

Elaborate precautions are being taken to ensure that no detail shall leak out of a gigantic flying ship which is now being built for the Air Ministry at Southampton.

The design of the craft, which, when completed, will be the world's largest flying ship, involves the results of a

great amount of research work.

The hull of the boat, which has the appearance of an ordinary ship, has not yet been completed. It is made in one piece from stem to stern, and this gives it a resiliency which enables the craft to ride safely at anchor on the roughest seas.

There will be ample sleeping and living accommodations on the "hush-hush" craft for a crew of twenty, and in addition, provisions for many weeks' absence from port.

Protecting Wings From Waves.

It is intended that the flying ship shall operate with the Navy. It will be able to go out on the manoeuvres without a "mother-ship," and "when not flying ahead and acting as the "eyes of the Fleet" will be able to lie at anchor, or "taxi" through the water under its own power.

During operations the flying battleship will carry anchors, foghorns, riding lights, and all other paraphernalia of an ocean-going vessel.

There are no floats on the boat itself, and the wings are worked on the cantilever system. They fold back when the ship is at anchor, so that they shall suffer no damage from violent seas.

The flying battleship is to be fitted with two 650 h.p. engines, and there will be emplacements for several machine-guns.

Sex Play Fair.

We are going along with this sex play stuff to the point where there are no favors as between sexes, to be in law or out of it; equal rights for men and women in the home, marriage and the church, the age of consent, and so on, what are we to do about our breach of promise cases? The question is creating no little attention both on this Continent and in Europe. As breach of promise suits are so common and heavy damages are very often assessed under the British law—small chances, the law has in such cases before a court—matters are one that should be settled. If we are going to have equality of sex on the lines established by the National Women's Party conference held at Washington the other day, the men splitting every woman with the women fifty-fifty—then the question of our laws respecting breach of promise is over due.

And this is not merely a man's point of view. Just the other day in London Miss Florence Underwood, of the Women's Freedom League, in commenting on a case in that city where a lady got \$2000 heart-balm from a Highland Yard man who broke his promise because he thought that marriage in this particular instance would have been "hell on earth for both of them," came out plump and against such court actions. "I

do not think," said Miss Underwood, "that women will have any use for breach of promise actions. The whole idea is contrary to the ideal of equality for which we are fighting."

Another British authority Mrs. Seaton-Teideman, secretary of the Divorce Union Reform, "whatever that may be, takes the view that everything that makes for coercion into marriage is likely to lead to unhappiness. "Our breach of promise law," she concludes, "is obsolete and ridiculous."

Women cannot have their cake and eat it, provided they are going ahead with this new freedom idea. I note in a breach of promise case recently tried at Red Deer, Alta., in which women sat on the jury, an award was made of \$4,000 to the plaintiff. This is all wrong, and we beg leave to protest. We men are willing to take up our burden, if it burden it is, and split the responsibilities of life into two equal parts, but we do not expect the women to take all the fruit and leave us with only the bare branches.—Saturday Night, Toronto.

Some of the newest table mats are made of white linen striped in black, and in a modern dining-room with china of jade or orange, and lamp-shades to match on black candle-sticks, they look very effective, especially if a large black bowl is placed as the centerpiece of the table and filled with orange berries or green grapes. The mats of one set were round, finished with a picot edge, and the half inch stripes of black were set on the white linen about an inch apart and finished with rows of hem-stitching on either side.

White mats striped with colors—pale blue, green or rose—are also popular at the moment and other sets are made in colored linen of the same shades and are squared all over with rows of hemstitching.

Novelty in Handkerchiefs.

Colored handkerchiefs are enjoying a vogue, and the most popular shades are numerous yellows and tans, including banana, lemon, and burnt orange. Sometimes the whole handkerchief is colored, with the merest line of white at the edge in the shape of a rolled hem. In other instances this is reversed, the handkerchief being white bound with a color. Then, again, widely striped borders are used; in some cases a single stripe in 2 1/2 inches wide, leaving quite a small square of white in the centre; the rolled hem being also white.

Very dainty are the little handkerchiefs with a veining edge in a pale color and a tiny initial or monogram to match. Cross-stitch is introduced in some of the newest handkerchiefs, a smart effect being given by a single row of black cross-stitch on buff or burnt-orange linen a little way from the hem, while sometimes the rolled hem has a line of cross-stitch in a color on it.

Even in plain white handkerchiefs there is always an effort to introduce novelty in the embroideries and hems that are used. Rolled hems put on by hand are popular, and another attractive border is a row of veining, button-holed at the outer edge.


