A SAINT FACED THE REDS.

Captain Francis McCullagh, who acted as The Daily Mail correspondent in Russia, in circumstances of great peril, supplies unanswerable evidence in his magnificent book, "The Bolshevik Persecution of Christianity" (Murray, 18s.), that the Bolsheviks are still attacking Christianity and martyring Christians for their religion

There are few finer passages in iterature than his account of the trial of Mgr. Budkiewicz, the heroic Roman Catholic ecclesiastic who was so foully murdered for his faith. Captain McCullagh, who risked his own life by showing sympathy for the victims of the Bolsheviks, describes in thrilling terms the whole tremendous scene when a saint confronted a gang of savage revolutionaries.

### Callous Women.

Conspicuous for their indecent onduct were the Bolshevik women. They wore low-necked dresses

and jewelery; and at the terrible end of the trial, when one could almost hear the Angel of Death beating his wings in that hushed and crowded court, they scrutinized the faces of the condemned men through their opera glasses as hungrily and insistently as they would have scrutinized

the faces of great actors on the stage.

The execution was as hideous as the trial

Mgr. Budkiewicz was stripped naked and made to traverse a dark corridor leading to a cellar where an experienced executioner was awaiting him. On reaching the end of this corridor he found himself in a room which was suddenly lit up by a powerful electric light that made the unfortunate priest blink and stagger back. Before he had recovered himself the executioner had shot him through the back of his head.

Nothing could shake Mgr. Budkiewicz's calm. His air was that of a courtly prelate, but he was strong as iron and true to death:

Not only was he immovable himself, but (in the opinion of the Bolsheviks) he made others immovable. His manner was for a Slav curiously cold and impassive. In speaking he used no gestures.
