



#### The Crime Trust

A LEADING INDUSTRY OF CHICAGO CHIEFS HOBNOB WITH JUDGES.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 .- A truly Gilbertian situation has been disclosed in Chicago by the regal funeral ac-corded to Dion O'Bannion, its most popular bootlegger.

According to the American news-According to the American newspapers, which are alternately indignant and humorous on the subject, O'-Bannion was only a third-rate captain of crime. The actual heads of the profession he practised, they say, are men far "higher up" who frequent the best clubs, hobnob with leading lawyers and judges, and receive homage in the form of respectful salutes from in the form of respectful salutes from the police when they violate the speed laws in their luxurious motor cars.

In a word, their lives are spent in exalted spheres of society, for they are not "outlaws" but men who skilfully manage to keep within the law while they amass riches from the efficient industrialization of crime.

In the underworld, however, O'Ban-In the underworld, however, O'Bannion was a most distinguished figure. When he died at the hands of three when he died at the hands of three assassins, who escaped scot free with the aid of a covering cohort of confederate motorists, the Chief of Police exclaimed, "The city is well rid of him, for he has been responsible for 25 murders

#### Judges and the Widow.

Yet municipal judges, city officials, and ward politicians-whose names the local Press publishes—hastened after his death to leave cards and wreaths with his widow. A prolonged and spectacular "wake" was held; and, finally, the remains of the bootlegger chieftain were conveyed in a solid silver coffin, resting on a huge hed of roses, to the cemetery, where a mob of ten thousand people with a thousand motor cars had assembled to witness the last rites.

The Church alone remained aloof from the fantastic ceremony. It closed the doors of the cathedral to the mourners and refused the use of consecrated ground for the burial. But its absence was concealed by a gorgeous procession of 22 vans bearing floral tributes from the underworld and by a highly skilled jazz band, which played hymns during the "serwhich played hymns during the "service." All in all, the funeral was the most expensive as well as the most bizarre in the history of Chicago.

To appreciate the significance of the To appreciate the significance of the episode an epitome of O'Bannion's career is necessary. He was first seen in a small Illinois town as the son of a plasterer. His environment was religious. He was a choir-boy. Drifting to Chicago, he waited an opportunity. Meanwhile he cracked a safe, but es-Meanwhile he cracked a safe, but escaped with a three months' sentence.

Years later prohibition opened up wealth. He organized his gang and established himself beside it in an ornate florist's shop. His watchword to him a broad and rapid road to was "postes and pistols." Beneath a cluster of carnations in his establishment a pair of revolvers invariably reposed; for in the career O'Bannion had adopted death comes early.

The average age of those of his confederates who died in feuds was net more than twenty-eight; and O'= Bannion was already in the early thirdes, a plump, short, sleek man with a sentimental regard for the relatives of the victims who were crippled or killed in the game of capturing consignments of beer and whisky. For besides being a bootlegger O'Bannion was what is known as a "Hi-Jacker," a man who organized raids upon the goods of his fellow bootleggers.

Once, about a year ago, he was caught by the police with his pistol levelled at the head of the driver of a lorry full of whisky. But the case against him never came to trial. On another occasion, as the La Salle Theatre was disgorging its crowd of playgoers, he shot and wounded a rival gang leader. When the time of trial came, however, the witnesses had conveniently forgotten what they

#### Stealing His Own Goods.

O'Bannion's latest exploit was his undoing. He ordered a shipment of whiskey for £20,000 from New York and raided the trucks containing the liquor before their arrival in Chicago. The generally accepted version of the sequel is that agents of the vendors called on him in his florist's shop with imperative instructions to exact

And so he fell dead, riddled with bullets amid a profusion of flowers. His ornate funeral has created an uproar. The newspapers, in recording the ceremony, published lists of the men opposed to O'Bannion, whose death from assassination might be confidently anticipated within the next few days. The police accused the magistrates of responsibility, because of their leniency, for the "acute murdar problem" in Chicago; and the magistrates in turn denounced the police for their failure to arrest the chief criminals.

The police sallied forth and arrested 80 men in various pool-game parlours whom they alleged were carrying guns; and their orders, as proclaimed, were to "save trouble for the lawyers by giving work to the hospitals." There, for the moment, the problem rests. It is assumed everywhere that the prisoners captured will be released shortly, and that the captains of crime will continue to pay

"Perhaps it was your hand that was responsible for the death of Stone." said Mr. Justice Wilson in sentencing Adam Parillo to the penitentiary for life.

This was the final act in the famous Banque d'Hochelaga bandit case. and Parillo was the last man to come before the courts for sentence.

"In the commission of your crime poor young Henri Cleroux died," continued Judge Wilson, "he died a hero's death—a martyr to his idea of defending his employer's property. You and your gang were responsible for that sad demise. Four of the gang have been hanged. Some of them have escaped the rope. I am going to send you to join your compatriots. You will find them in the penitentiary and you will stay there for the rest of your natural life."



He had once asked an old crook his opinion of the judicial bench. I think Lord Byron threw away his life in fighting for them, and I have always been of opinion that this country has got itself into no end of trouble in the east simply because Greek is a compulsory subject in public schools and universities. It has, therefore, misled a number of otherwise sensible persons, notably the late Mr. Gladstone, to involve this country in no end of obligations for the sake of the Greeks, all because they have read about Helen, and Menelaus, and Ulysses, who, to my mind, was a most disreputable person. (Laughter.) The consequence of this education is that we have fought all sorts of battles for the Greek-Navarino and many another. I should have kept clear if I had been called into the councils of the sovereign about the year 1827 when Navarino was fought. I have escaped this infection for the simple reason that I never went to the university because I had not been to school. Therefore, I do not see why the slander should be repeated that I quoted Greek. I would not have done so in the House of Commons; first, because I did not know it, and next because hardly anybody there in my time would have understood it, except Mr. Gladstone, whom I never attempted to gratify, and Mr. Asquith. But if

TO RELIEVING OFFICERS, STIPENDIARY MAGIS. TRATES, AND OTHERS:-

The expenditure of public money upon hospitals and similar charitable institutions, the care of outside patients, and transportation to and fro has grown to alarming proportions. Disregard of instructions as to the sending of patients to St. John's from the Outports has not only increased the expenditure, but has caused inconvenience to the authorities, and unnecessary suffering for the ailing. Room in the hospitals has not, at times, been available for patients arriving here, and it has been found necessary to send to boardinghouses, to await their turn for entering a hospital, many who would have been better cared for at home during the period of waiting. These and other considerations have made it advisable to state the facts. and to repeat and add to instructions.

It is the policy of the Legislature and Government to limit, as closely as possible, the expenditure of public money in the case of the sick in public hospitals, and their transportation to and fro, to provision for those patients only who are unable to pay for their own care, and whose natural protectors are unable to pay for them. The aid given is a charity for the sick and helpless, and it should only be accepted consistently with self-respect. Those who are able to pay in whole or in part for their own treatment are expected to do so. Parents are expected to pay for the care of children, and children for the care of parents, wholly or partly, where they are able to do so.

Only Relieving Officers, or Stipendiary Magistrates, acting in lieu of such Officers, have authority

to send patients, at the expense of the Colony, for treatment in the public wards of hospitals. Where a Relieving Officer resides conveniently

near, he alone has authority. Where by reason of the remoteness of a Relieving Officer, and the nature of the malady, delay until such Officer could act would seem to a Stipendiary Magistrate to be undesirable, such Magistrate may act in

lieu of a Relieving Officer, but Magistrates are requested to observe as far as possible the rule that dealing with the sick at public expense is specially the province of Relieving Officers.

Clergymen and others whose attention is drawn to persons asking treatment at public expense are requested to refer such patients to Relieving Officers or Magistrates in their order (wherever such reference can be made without danger to the sick), and to refer to Mr. Bartlett only in instances in which no Relieving Officer or Magistrate is near enough to deal with the matter adequately.

It is desired that the discretion of sending forward patients shall be exercised wherever convenient by Relieving Officers and Magistrates only, in the order named, except as provided in the next following para-

Except in "Emergency cases," as herein defined, no patient may be forwarded by Relieving Officers, Magistrates or others, at public expense, unless permission has been first asked and obtained of Mr. Lewis Bartlett, Public Health Officer, St. John's. Patients suffering from serious accidents, or from appendicitis, or whose condition requires immediate surgical attention, may be forwarded without the prior consent of Mr. Bartlett, but he must be immediately notified by telegram of the coming of the patient, and of the ailment thereof. Every such instance will be strictly inquired into, and unless the condition of the patient made the forwarding thereof without prior permission reasonably necessary, the person forwarding will be considered to have acted without discretion, and be held liable to pay the cost incurred.

When application is made to forward a patient for hospital treatment, a Relieving Officer, or Stipendiary Magistrate, as the case may be, should, before complying, satisfy himself that the patient, or the person liable for the care of the patient, is not able to pay the expense of treatment, and that such expense should be a charge upon the Colony, and if it seems to such Relieving Officer or Magistrate that the financial and physical conditions of the patient call for treatment at public expense, a Doctor, where one is conveniently near, should be asked to examine and report whether hospital or other treatment is necessary or expedient. The certificate of the Relieving Officer, or Magistrate, as the case may be, that the case is one for treatment at public expense, and the report, if any, of the Doctor upon the patient's condition, should be forwarded to Mr. Bartlett, with application for permission to forward the patient. When it seems desirable to telegraph for Mr. Bartlett's permission, the telegram should indicate the effect of the Doctor's report. If a Doctor is not conveniently near, the Relieving Officer or Magistrate, or other person intervening on behalf of the patient, should state to Mr. Bartlett as fully as possible the nature of the ailment complained of.

These regulations have, of course, nothing whatever to do with transportation or treatment in hospitals of patients the charges for whom will be paid by them or their friends. But in respect of such patients, as the hospitals are frequently overcrowded, application to Mr. Bartlett to ascertain if a bed can be obtained, will be promptly replied to.

ADDRESS BY E. LEO CARTER AT THURSDAY'S ROTARY LUN-CHEON.

I have been asked to say a few words to you on this occasion in reference to "Our City of St. John's," such a wealth of material as almost into history if I would form even a part concept of exising conditions.

On the 9th of June, 1846, the town was again visited by fire. In this fire upwards of 2,000 houses were consumed, and property to the value of \$4,000,000.00 was destroyed. The Morning Courier, published a few days after the fire, says (amongst other things) "a cold night succeeded a day eventful to the inhabitants of St. John's, and far the greater portion of them spent it under the canopy of Heaven. The open ground in front of Government House down towards Gower Street was occupied by numerous family groups, sitting beside the portion of their furniture saved from the flames. It was a sad sight to see shivering mothers endeavouring to shelter their little babies, and to hush them to sleep; while the cries of older ones for food had in many cases to be answered by 'wait until daylight and we shall try to get some



Gosling and commission of twelve was appointed The commission besides temporarily administering Municipal affairs had as their purpose the remedying of existing evils by the drafting of a new Municipal Act which we know as the Charter. After much political shuffling, during which the Government of the day endeavoured to play Chess with the Municipal Commission, the Citizens' Committee and the Parliamentary Select Committee as Pawns, the Charter was at length passed in the year 1921, not in the form intended by its fathers, but badly bruised by the rocks that rise in the rapids parliamentary procedure, but it was passed and as it is we must ac cept it. Some of its outstanding features are the great benefits which citizens derive from the power which t gives them to convert leasehold property into freehold. Another benesomewhat startling to lawyers is the abolition hereafter of that prescriptive right known as "Ancient Lights.' Another benefit to citizens generally is the imposition on adjoining landowners of the cost of sewerage and street improvements in front of their property which cost was formerly borne by the community but must now be paid by the individual benefitted.

The Charter since its passing has had to be carried out by Mayor Cook and the present Municipal Board. Their work has been particularly ardnous because of the new conditions which its passing has brought about, but I think you will agree with me that in no previous Council has there been such a business-like management or a more courteous attention to the wishes of citizens and this cour tesy has been extended not alone by the Mayor and Councillors, but also by our geniall City Clerk, Mr. J. #### The Origin of Surname

The evolution of the surname is, in many instances, remarkable, if not

Prior to the Norman conquest of England such things as surnames were unknown. The country was very sparsely populated, so that the single Christian name usually sufficed to distinguish a man from his fel-

When the Normans came they brought very few Christian names with them; the majority were Henrys, Johns, Williams, or Richards. So it became necessary to have some means of distinguishing between them.

A partial solution of the difficulty was found by ordaining the landowners should add the name of the'r estates to their first names. Thus we had Henry of Winchester, Henry of Durham, Henry of Peterborough, and

At that time men were known also by their trades or callings, and as son usually succeeded father in business a great class of what we may call trade-names soon sprang up. There were possibly several Johns in a village, but as their occupation varied one was called John the Tailor, another John the Fisher, and a third John the Tanner.

When the original Johns died their sons, who might be Henry, James, and Robert, took on their businesses and succeeded to their descriptive trade names. To this class of surnames belong Smith, Fletcher (which means 'arrow-maker"), Butcher, Weaver, Collier. Winter (which is Vintner, or wine merchant), Leach (doctor or 'vet"), Clark, Painter, Butler, and a host of others.

The development of surnames went on also in other directions. Three Johns' for example, might be distinguished not by the trades but by the Christian names of their fathers. The first might be John Rob'n's son, the next John John's son, and the third John Herbert's son. In this way the multitude of "son" surnames came into being-Jackson, Peterson, Jameson, and the like

Diminutive of Affectionate Form. Again, instead of calling a man Henry Roger's son, he m'ght be known simply as Roger's Henry or Henry Rogers. Thus Gilbertson, Gilberts, Gibson, and Gibbs are really all the same name, Gib being the diminutive or affectionate form of Gilbert

The next step was to distinguish men by means of nicknames referring to their physical powers, or the color of their hair, eyes, complexion or clothing These nicknames became crystallized into surnames. Examples are Armstrong (or strong i' th' arm), Swift, Straight, Crook, Small, Black,

White, Green, Brown and Grey. The likeness of persons to certain animals produced such names (originally nicknames) as Fox. Calf. Bull. Lamb, Badger, and Bird. Duckworth St. & LeMarchant People from other lands received

and kept the names of Scott, Irish, French, Dane, Norman (meaning Norwegian), Holland and Spain wegian), Holland and Spain.

To the last class of surnames belong those which denote place of birth. Originally a man would be known as, say, John o' London, then

the "o" or "of" was dropped, and he became simply John London. Many examples of this type of names will occur to you in a moment.

Tyldesley, the famous Lancashire cricketer, comes of a family hailing from the village of Tyldesley, in the

County Palatine. Scottish, Irish and Welsh names were evolved on similar lines, though most of them belong to the "son" class. The Scottish Mac, the Irish O', and the Welsh Ap all means "son of." The Welsh, however, have in a vast number of cases adopted the English form, as we seen in Evans (Evans's son), Jones (John's son), Davis (Davey's son), and Williams (William's son).

#### Course

MAKES TRADE A PROFESSION, Foremost Commercial Nations Have Made Practice of Teaching Principles of Business for General Edu-

Prof. E. H. Morrow, Dept. of Moone mies, University of Western Ontario.)

When a university enters the comnercial field it is following a traditional precedent. Medicine, law and engineering, which are now accented without question as being within the scope of collegiate instruction were originally callings acquired in practice on the apprentice system Only when the activities of doctors lawyers and engineers grew sufficiently in volume to permit the evolution of a satisfactory theory based on scientific classification and instruction did the various professions become established with recognized standards or attainment. In each case the university played its part in building up the profession by offering specialized teaching in subjects peculiar to medicine, law or engineering. And as each professional course was developed, it competed with the general arts course, which received the residue of students after those desiring to enter the professions had made their choice.

Apart from graduates intending t enter academic life the general arts do not technically train men and women for any particular calling. though many arts graduates go into the industrial world. To-day the commerce course comes as the first step towards professionalizing the occupation of business, and we are again faced with a situation where a specialized course is competing with the general arts course in the edu-

cation of students. The seriousness of the new devel opment should not be minimized, particularly by those who are encouraging it. The field of commerce reaches into every phase of our national and social life, and, in its application, business as a profession will go into the understructure of society far more deeply than can the older professions. The scope of business as an occupation will have no confining ratio of numbers to population, such as tends to limit the number of doctors, lawyers or teachers. General arts are facing the strongest competition that they have ever experienced, and it is not impossible that a commercial rather than an arts graduation will become the maopen to question, particularly as we find that medicine and law have retraced the path of educational specialization and are insisting upon a preliminary arts training.
