### A Judge

**ON PENSIONS FOR MOTHERS AND WIDOWS.**

Parliament is now discussing the proposed new pension scheme for mothers and widows, and Judge Henry Neil, of Chicago, explains in the Yorkshire Evening News how he was responsible for this reform in the United States. He was impressed with the case of a mother who came before him who was unable to support her children, and he writes—

"I went to the Legislature of Illinois and said: 'Messrs. Legislators, I have been to your institutions; I know that you buy good food, that you provide warm clothing, that you build magnificent buildings on the hillside; but you can't buy mother love. That is not for sale at any price, and that is what these children are hungering for, and what they need if you expect them to become normal men and women and home-loving citizens, willing to fight for God and Home and Country.'

"And the members of the Legislature enacted my amendment without one dissenting vote. It was the first State-wide Mothers' Pension Law.

"I have since found in thousands of cases that it pays the taxpayer to keep these mothers on their rightful jobs—of caring for their own children—and not allowing them to be broken down by the double job.

"Next I went to the Legislature of nearly every State. In one year I crossed the United States from ocean to ocean eight times. I spoke in every large city. I advanced that fit mothers of dependent children should be provided with the money to keep their own children at home.

"Mother love is," I said, 'one essential of normal child life. What would your life be if you had no memory of a mother's love? Where is the joy of adult life except in the memory of the happy days spent in childhood with your mother?'

"Forty-four States now have this mothers' pension system, and over a hundred thousand children are now at home with their own mothers instead of in institutions. These States will pay this year to these mothers over fifteen million dollars, and it is the best of all uses of the taxpayers' money. No other money can supply such an amount of joy, and hope, and happiness, and mother love as this money."

"I advocated mothers' pensions in public addresses in every city in South Africa and in Great Britain. I rejoice in what is to be done with the good will of every citizen in Britain towards the inauguration of pensions for widows."

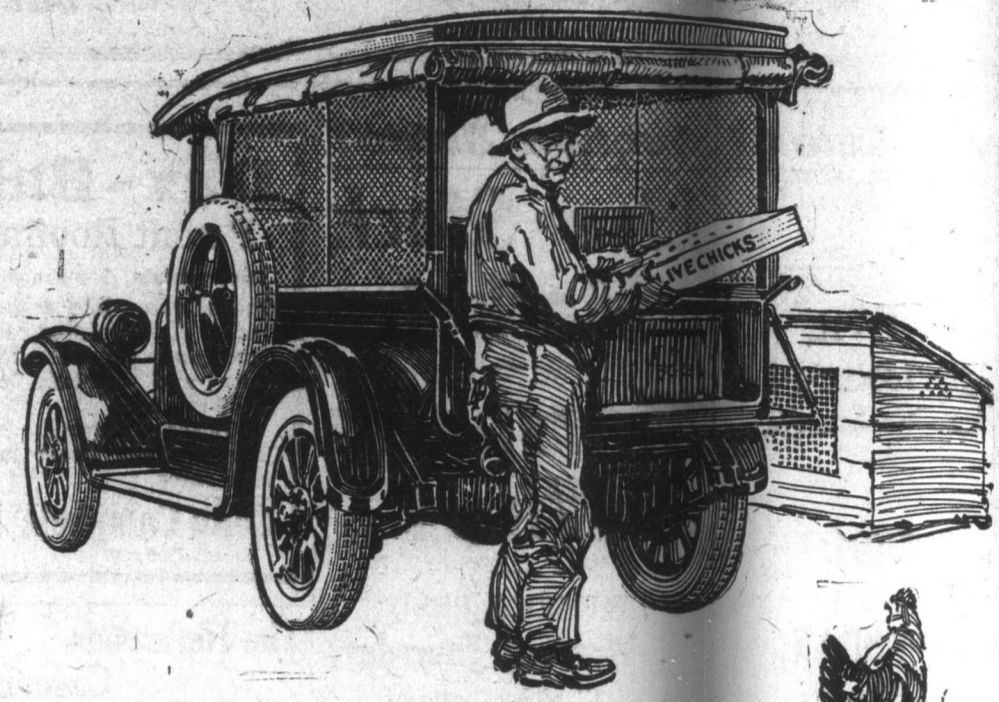

### Purchase of Union Bank of Canada Ratified by Royal Bank Shareholders

French Troops Pouring into the Riff—Tennessee Court Finds Scopes Guilty—Ford's Offer for U.S. Merchantile Fleet Recommended.

**SCOPES FOUND GUILTY AND FINED.**  
DAYTON, Tenn., July 21. John T. Scopes, Dayton school teacher, was found guilty by Rhea County Grand Jury to-day of violating the State law against teaching of evolution, and fined \$100.

**BANK MERGER RATIFIED.**  
MONTREAL, July 21. At a special general meeting of the Royal Bank of Canada held here at 10 o'clock to-day, an agreement to purchase the Union Bank of Canada was unanimously ratified.

**THE WEST COHAS FLOATED AND RESUMED VOYAGE.**  
HALIFAX, July 21. The United States Shipping Board steamer West Cohas, which grounded at Sable Island late on Sunday, while being towed to the assistance of the French

trawler Labrador, which had grounded early in the day, was floated this morning by the freighter Winonah City and was to-night preparing to resume her voyage from St. John, N.B., to Glasgow, with 550 head of live cattle. The Labrador, which was abandoned yesterday by her crew, was reported a total loss, lying half a mile distant from the scene of the West Cohas stranding. The freighter was apparently undamaged after 36 hours embedded in the sand bar in a heavy sea.

**CURZON'S YOUNGEST DAUGHTER WEDS CAVALRY OFFICER.**  
LONDON, July 21. Before a distinguished gathering in the chapel royal, St. James' Palace, loaned by King George, Lady Alexandra Curzon was married to-day to Major E. D. Metcalfe, of the Indian cavalry. The bride is the youngest

daughter of the late Marquis Curzon, of Kedleston. The Marchioness Curzon gave the bride away and Lord Louis Mountbatten was best man. Queen Elizabeth of Belgium and her daughter, Princess Marie Jose, attended.

**FORD'S BID RECOMMENDED.**  
WASHINGTON, July 21. Acceptance of Henry Ford's bid of \$1,706,000, for two hundred Shipping Board vessels set aside for scrapping, has been recommended to the Shipping Board by President Palmer of the Fleet Corporation.

**A PROMINENT SUICIDE.**  
NEW YORK, July 21. George C. Haven, President of the Metropolitan Opera Company, and prominent in New York banking and financial circles, committed suicide to-day at his home on East Fifty Third Street.

**THE RIFFIAN WAR.**  
ELKRAISH, Spanish Mor., July 21. Advice reaching here from the French zone in Morocco report that arrival of troops from France is going on without interruption. On July 12th there were in Morocco 130,000 soldiers, while at the end of the month it is expected that there will be 200,000 fighting under the French flag. Obligatory conscription under orders of the Sultan of Morocco is expected to bring about 13,000 more effectives.

**EMPLOYEES' PROPOSITION.**  
ST. JOHN, N.B., July 21. Employees of James Pender & Co., Ltd., subsidiary of the British Empire Steel Corporation, manufacturing nails and wire here, have presented the management with a resolution expressing willingness to work overtime without pay in order to permit the Company to compete with foreign manufacturers in the export markets. Provision is made that any profits accruing from the export business under the arrangement will be shared between the men and the Company, the former getting 75 per cent., the latter 25 per cent. It is planned for that the men will work three extra hours every other evening.

**CASTLE LINE ASHORE.**  
MANILA, July 21. The British steamer Egremont Castle is aground on Papatuba reef in the Sulu Sea and is leaking badly. The vessel grounded because the reef light was not burning. It is feared she will be a total wreck.

**CREW LOST WHEN WARSHIP BLOWS UP.**  
WARSAW, July 21. The Polish torpedo boat Kaszub blew up and sank in Danish Harbor yesterday. The entire crew was lost.

**Strike Situation Unsettled**  
Capt. Stevenson sent a cablegram from Schiedam, Holland, yesterday, to the Management of the Railway, to the effect that there was no change in the strike situation as yet, and it is not known when the steamer Caribou will be ready to make her trial spin.

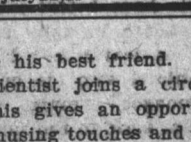

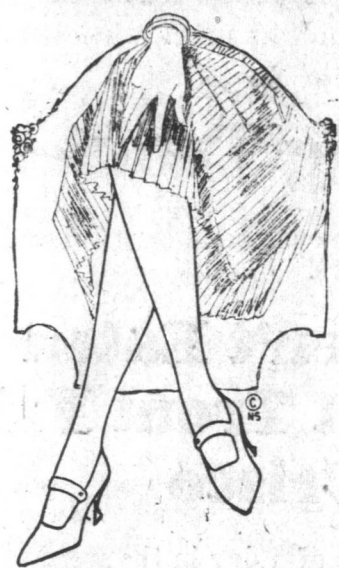

—and claims that the Plaintiffs might  
have had under it were merged or dis-  
charged in the same way as the claims  
for previous services had been dis-  
charged on the acceptance of a com-  
mission agreement with regard to the  
Gander, on August 14th, 1920.

The next bill in the series is a bill  
for costs, charges and expenses relat-  
ing, first, to the negotiations for and  
preparation and execution of the sev-  
eral agreements with Ragnvald Blak-  
stad and the Newfoundland Products  
Corporation; and secondly, the settle-  
ment of the financial scheme for the  
development of water power, and  
water rights, etc.; thirdly, the prepa-  
ration and settling of a prospectus in  
connection with the Humber matter,  
and fourthly, the preparation of the  
Trust deed constituting and securing  
the debenture stock. This bill begins  
on the 31st January, 1921 and extends  
to the 22nd April, 1921, and amounts  
to £255.

Now, my Lord, I submit that insofar  
as that bill is concerned, a large por-  
tion of it is chargeable, it seems to me,  
to Blakstad rather than the Trust;  
that no portion of it is chargeable to  
the Reid Newfoundland Company, be-  
cause it is all incidental expenses oc-  
curred in the development of the un-  
dertaking that the Trust assumed un-  
der that minute of August 14th, 1920,  
and for which payment or remunera-  
tion was covered by the commission.  
In any event, I submit that head 2  
"The settlement of the financial  
scheme" and head 3 "The preparation  
and settlement of a prospectus for the  
two and a half million bonds, and head  
4, "the preparation and settlement of  
the Trust Deed constituting and se-  
curing the debenture stock"; were work  
which should have been done by Blak-  
stad; and were work, if done by Mes-  
srs. Parkers and Hammond or by any  
other firm of solicitors, were work for  
which Blakstad should pay, and not  
either the Trust or the Reid New-  
foundland Company, and certainly, in  
any case, not the Reid Newfoundland  
Company.

Now, my Lord, the next Bill is  
marked "Further costs, charges and  
expenses relating to the scheme for  
the development of the water power  
and water rights and concessions from  
the Government, etc., and that bill ex-  
tends from the 30th April, 1921 to the  
31st December, 1922; and amounts to  
another £525; and that bill, I sub-  
mit, does not cover in any way, shape  
or form work done for the Reid New-  
foundland Company, or work for which  
the Reid Newfoundland Company  
should pay. If we look at the bill, it  
is headed "Newfoundland Banking and  
Trust Corporation, Ltd., to Parkers  
and Hammond, April 30th, 1921, to  
July 25th, 1922. Numerous attendances  
between these dates, upon your di-  
rectors" that is, the Trust directors.  
"In conference upon the reports re-  
ceived from Newfoundland, and on the  
negotiations in progress with the  
Newfoundland Government for the  
grant of its guarantee for the bond  
issue. . . ." (Finishes items under  
these dates).

## New Grenfell Hospital

AT ST. ANTHONY.

The International Grenfell Asso-  
ciation have decided to erect a new  
and up-to-date Hospital at St. An-  
thony. The present hospital was  
built by Dr. Grenfell over thirty  
years ago and, being constructed  
mainly of logs, has long outlived its  
usefulness. Plans for the new build-  
ing have been drawn by the firm of  
Delano and Aldrich, New York, archi-  
tects well known here in connection  
with the R. C. Cathedral, the Sea-  
men's Institute and the Twillingate  
Hospital. The latter building was at  
first taken as a basis, but it was soon  
found that it was not suitable for  
the Association's purposes at St. An-  
thony, so that the plans, as finally  
drawn, represent a complete new de-  
sign.

The main building will consist of  
two storeys and basement, 80 x 42  
feet, with a staff wing of three storeys  
and basement, 40 x 32. The  
building will be of concrete, using  
3 inch blocks laid on a fabricated  
steel frame. The special features of  
the hospital will be its flexibility in  
the sense of a number of wards, both  
large and small, with four sun porches,  
the wards arranged so that some  
can be shut off in the winter. The  
operating rooms are in a shut-off  
suite by themselves, very admirably  
planned. The examination and re-  
ception rooms are planned having  
the St. Anthony wants particularly  
in mind. The staff quarters are sim-  
ple but attractive and adequate, with  
the entire second floor in use for the  
nurses and third floor for the maids,  
giving them much desired privacy.  
The large basement will enable the  
Association to store a supply of coal  
for the winter and have the laundry,  
now in a separate building, in one  
end.

The Directors believe the building  
will meet all points considered es-  
sential. The cost is estimated at  
\$100,000, being \$80,000 for construc-  
tion and \$20,000 for equipment. Some  
of the funds are in hand but a portion  
has yet to be raised. The fundations  
are being started this summer. These,  
in turn, will be roofed-over in the  
Fall, a furnace installed to keep the  
basement heated, and during the  
winter the concrete blocks will be  
made. As much advance work as  
possible will be done so that the  
building may be completed and open-  
ed in the summer of 1926.

When the Hospital is finished, St.  
Anthony will be able to boast of two  
fine buildings, such as any town  
might well be proud of. The other  
is the new Grenfell Orphanage,  
erected in 1923, at a cost of over  
\$100,000. Each will remain, for many  
years to come, an enduring monument  
to the work of Dr. Grenfell in the  
far north.

### A Holiday Bill

A Bill has been introduced into  
the British Parliament, the object  
of which is to enable all persons who  
have been in the same employment  
for a period of 12 months, to have an  
annual holiday of not less than eight  
clear consecutive days. The holiday  
is to be at full pay, unless during  
the period the employed person takes  
paid work.

The bill according to advices re-  
ceived by Bankers Trust Company of  
New York from its British Informa-  
tion Service is intended to include  
all persons employed under any con-  
tract of service or apprenticeship,  
and where the employed person is  
paid by the piece, or partly by the  
piece and partly by time, his wages  
to be calculated for the purpose of  
the vacation in a manner provided in  
the Bill, and any dispute may be  
settled by the registrar of the county  
court without an appeal. There is a  
provision rendering it penal for an  
employer to attempt to evade the  
provisions of the Bill by dismissing  
or suspending an employed person,  
the penal liability being in addition  
to any civil liability. The Bill does  
not extend to Northern Ireland.




