

Military vs. Civilians.

There appears to be a very bitter feeling existing between the military and civilians at Quebec, arising out of the Lemesurier-Elmhirst affair, in which from all accounts the latter was to blame for the disgraceful proceedings. The latest phase is that the officers of the 55rd tendered Mr. Lemesurier an invitation to a ball, and then withdrew it, and the citizens by way of reprisal refused to accept the subscriptions of the military to the skating rink. Further, at a party given by Mr. Pope, at which Mr. Lemeusurier was present, the officers informed the host that he must order Lemesurier from the house, or that they would leave themselves! The civilian whose presence was so offensive to these men accordingly left the house—and thus the social war rages. The antagonism between the military and civilians is not confined to Quebec — Montreal experiences its share of it. There many of the officers have comported themselves in a manner which reflects anything but credit upon them. Street rows with policemen, drunkenness and creating disturbances at midnight, buffoonery at the theatre, and insulting ladies at bazaars, are some of the innocent amusements which have been indulged in by not a few of ther Majesty's servants' in the last named city. Nor does this sum up all their transactions in the way of annoyance to the long suffering colonials, as witness the cases of seduction at London and Ottawa, and the recent attempted elopement at Montreal. It would seem that a commissioned officer is allowed a large range of sooundrelism without calling forth a word of censure. It is only such men as Lord Cocil and Lieutenant Dunlop, who deem it their duty to preach the gospel to the multitude, that come under the ban of the red tapists of the army. Military vs. Civilians.

Despatches from Havana throw a flood of light upon the recent news from Cuba and give us a cause for the intense excitement in Havana during the past few days. The insurgents had captured the important city of Puerto Principe, the city of second rank in the island. Curiously enough this event occurred on the same day on which Count Valmaseda entered the abandoned town of Bayamo, which had hitherto been the headquarters of the insurgent government. The cunning insurgents led him on his march without serious resistance, he believing all the time that he was striking a fatal blow at the revolution, and when he was well within the toils they suddenly turn upon Puerto Principe, and Colonel Mena, with his reported garrison of fifteen thousand troops, an equal number of volunteers and eighteen cannon fall into their hands. It is not strange that the exciteable Cubans should be demonstrative and the Spaniards revengeful on the discovery of this intelligence. By mail we have dates from Havana to the 23rd instant. It gives among other important news, the fact that a committee of Cubans had presented to General Dulce the resolutions in favor of a free government in Cuba, and asked him to proclaim it. These rumors were, no doubt, largely encouraged by the announcement that, in the event of war breaking out between Turkey and Greece, the Viceroy of Egypt would furnish a contingent of fifty thousand mental that the contingent of the Sultan denies that Turkey is deing anything beyond what is absolutely required by the circumstances. All through this trouble the government of the Sultan has comported itself with dignity and propriety. It has been the reverse with Greece. Now that Europe has deliberated and given advice, the best thing that can be done is to leave Greece to her fate.—Turkey, by the course she has taken, has the sympathy of the nations. Mr. Barber before his Constituents.

According to arrangement a convention of reformers was held in the Town Hall, Milton, yesterday (Friday) to consider the course pursued by Mr. Barber, member for Halton, during the last session of the Local Logislature. Barber, Esq., our representative in the Local Lelature, desire to express their gratification that he has successfully refuted the charges of personal corruption against himself, and also their confidence that in the future he will be found acting heartily with his party in the Legislature, for the purpose of securing a return to a purely Reform Government for Ontario, and thereby securing a more truly economical administration of public affairs."
