Their Excellencies were conducted to the Judge's stand, in the centre of the ring, and the President of the Western Fair Association, Mr. W. Saunders, presented Lord Dufferin with an address. It is desired to know what the three Emperors think of the matters referred to them, and whether they are willing to lend their influence to secure freedom of proceeding to the above-named conclave. No answer has, it is said, been received from them as yet.


