ROCKLESS RAILWAY SUBSIDIES.

A striking illustration of the reckless and extravagant manner in which the public funds are dissipated in subsidizing the construction of railway schemes is just now the subject of general comment in Ontario.

The Canadian Northern Railway Company secured a subsidy from the Dominion Government for the line between Toronto and Sudbury.

Then the Company obtained another subsidy for the same line from the Ontario Government, besides various concessions from the people of municipalities on the proposed route of the line.

Having secured such substantial aid, the promoters have recently announced their intention to build the line. But it now appears that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has already commenced the construction of line between the same places.

It claims that it has authority to build such a road without getting a special charter for it under the provisions of its charter which authorizes the Company to build branches from its main line.

The Canadian Pacific Company states that it asks no bonus or subsidy from either the Federal or Provincial Government, but will build the line because it considers it will be a good business proposition. There is, therefore, a prospect that there will be two lines constructed between Sudbury and Toronto.

One thing, we think, will not be disputed. That is that the day for subsidizing railways, without any other condition being attached to the bonus of subsidy than that of the construction of the line, has passed away.

THE VENEZUELA AWARD.

The arbitrator in the outstanding dispute between Great Britain and Venezuela has given his award.

The arbitrator in the outstanding dispute between Great Britain and Venezuela has given his award. By the agreement between the two parties when the matters in dispute were submitted to arbitration, it was decided that the award should be final and binding on all concerned.

Venezuela seems to have lost the case insofar as the substantial issues are concerned and will have to pay a sum that will not be inconsiderable for that little republic. It is to be hoped that she will promptly respond to the arbitrator's decision, and that she shall thereafter hear no more of a country which has presumed more than once on her insignificance and weakness in her dealings with the world.

The award is interesting in that it deals with two matters of a novel character. One is the decision that if a given date arrives and no award is made, the case shall be referred to the arbitrator.

The other is that in regard to the nationality of an individual, Venezuela was successful in her contention. The arbitrator holds that Great Britain's claim that a man born in Venezuela of British parents residing in Venezuela, and was a British subject under the Constitution of Venezuela existing at the time of his birth, is not well founded.

The same view is taken by the arbitrator in the other matter where Great Britain argued that in the case of a British subject domiciled in Venezuela, who died there and was married to a Venezuelan woman, such widow became a British subject by her marriage and could appear as a claimant for a pension accruing to her husband in lifetime.

Although it was agreed that in regard to the award should be final, we do not assume that it will be regarded as settling these novel questions in international law, as though it was given by a court whose authority was recognized.

A NEW IRELAND. The passage of the Irish Land Act of last year has been generally regarded as marking the commencement of a new era in Ireland. In the complete and thorough reorganization of the land, and the removal of the burdens which the carrying out of the provisions of the measure will entail on the Irish people, there is considerable evidence of the desire of the Government to solve the Irish problem and have the Irish people prospering in industry and agricultural productivity.

Although this is an extreme case, perhaps, it exemplifies the unsoundness of this railway subsidy system. Originally designed to secure for the public those transportation facilities which otherwise could not be obtained, it has now become principally a method by which a few individuals enrich themselves at the expense of the whole community.

There are, of course, many exceptions to that. From time to time it is found impossible to raise capital to construct a line on the bare merits of the scheme itself, although it may be a thoroughly bona fide and promising enterprise. In such a case it may be desirable to have the aid of the public, clearly in the public interest that aid, to a reasonable amount and in a businesslike form, should be given to the project.

Great System Of Irrigation

Six Thousand Acres in Kamloops Section Nearly Ready For Settlement.

British Company Has Expended \$150,000 on Reclamation of Arid Lands.

Kamloops, B. C., May 28.—(Special)—Sometime in July the remodeling and reconstruction of the Fruitland irrigation system will be completed, when a new and promising era of immigration will be inaugurated in the Kamloops district. These camps have been established at points along the eighteen miles of main canal and big forces of carpenters and laborers are hustling to finish the work.

After many months of patient effort brought to a successful conclusion, the expenditure of fully \$150,000, the Canadian West Pacific, Ltd., is about to open up for settlement some 6,000 acres of semi-arid land that in past years, for lack of water, was practically valueless except for the scant pasture it might afford during a limited season.

The correspondent has just returned from a trip up the west side of the North Thompson river, passing through Fruitland. Little is known on the west side of this undertaking, to which English capital has been attracted.

It is estimated that the irrigation system will be completed in July, when the first crops will be raised. The water is taken from the North Thompson river, and is carried through a series of canals and ditches to the fields.

The land is now being prepared for settlement, and it is expected that a large number of immigrants will be attracted to the area. The water is of excellent quality, and is well adapted for growing a variety of crops.
