The new steamer, City of Cleveland, of the D. & C line, is the first steamer in the world to have a steam steering bow rudder. There is an extra wheel in the pilot house especially for the bow rudder, and 42 wheel at the rear of the boat by which this rudder may be steered. The

rudder is 12 feet two inches in width and over seven feet in height. It will greatly facilitate the handling of the ship in narrow waters and she can be backed at full speed under perfect control.

The Grand Trunk authorities are rejoicing in the fine weather of the last few days. "A few more days like this," said Chief Despatcher Goodwin yesterday morning, "and we will be able to get our delayed freight on the move again. An increase in the price of standard books and the better class of school books is expected by the Toronto dealers. Bindings have gone up, paper has taken a jump, and the cost of printing is advancing, one publisher pointed out last night. Paper manufacturers of the United States are reported to have recently made a business arrangement raising prices. This increase in price has already been felt over here by dealers placing orders. The demand in the United States for all lines of paper is very heavy.

One is the Commercial Messenger and Canadian Literary Gazette, published at Montreal, dated Oct. 11th, 1841. The other is the Palladium of British America, published at Toronto, dated May 11th, 1839. The Palladium was published by Charles Forbes Fothergill at five dollars per annum. The paper is four pages printed in English style, even the market quotations being given in English money. Wheat is quoted at 6 and 6 d, oats 1 and 6 d, eggs 8 d, butter 11 d, pork 35 s per cwt., and flour 32 and 6 d. The news 1s largely a reproduction of what had appeared in late English papers, including a description of the then youthful Queen Victoria.

Cow Gave 106 Pounds of Milk in a Day.

Fond Du Lac, Wis, Feb. 28.—In a 6o-day test a Holstein-Friesan cow, owned by W. J. Gillett, has broken the world's butter record by forty pounds. The official test shows 5,326.7 pounds of milk and 260.5 pounds of butter. The cow gave birth to a call Dec. 19, and the test was commenced on the fifth day of her period of lactation. The test was continued 64 days, during which period every milking was watched, the quantity of milk weighed and samples taken and tested. The phenomenal yield was such that two separate tests were ordered, the first of 24 hours, and the second 48 hours, during which time additional representatives were sent from the experiment atives were sent from the experiment station. The cow was under constant supervision day and night. The best day in milk was 106 pounds. The best day in butter 5.74 pounds.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

"A Marvelous Old "Man", is the verdict of all who have seen and heard General Booth, the venerable head of the Salvation Army. Nearly four score years of age he is as vigorous and alert as many half his years, and is circling the globe for the second time visiting all the leading outposts of his world encircling Army. There was a time when his efforts to uplift the lowly were regarded with derision, but success demanded respect, and he is now esteemed by ministers of all denominations, and statesmen of all countries, as one of the greatest men of his generation. Truly he has accomplished much, and is doing more for the betterment of the conditions of the unfortunate than any other known agency.

The career of the late "Prophet" Dowie shows what a man of unlimited nerve and strong personality can accomplish. Starting life as a cheap clerk in Australia he worked his way up to the control of millions of dollars and immense property, and was regarded by his deluded followers as almost of divine origin. Downe was one of the numerous fakirs who build up fame and fortune on the fanaticism of their dupes. They have existed in one form or another since the beginning and are likely to continue to the end. No matter how absurd and grotesque the doctrine advocated may be, a large following is assured.

W. F. McLean, the energetic member for South York, has introduced a measure in the House of Commons that will commend itself to all who have occasion to travel on railways. His fellow members are inclined to make light of anything emanating from W. F., but many of his ideas are backed by good horse sense and have strong endorsation in the country if not in the house. The follow ing extract from a World editorial sums up his position on the railway ticket ques tion, and W. F. hits the nail squarely on the head." "What the member for South York has been trying all along to get is the lowest possible maximum passenger rate per mile in the shape of a mile ticket, or, to put it in another way, the cheapest form of mile ticket, good at any time, good in any direction, and good on any road. This mile ticket once secured and defined in law would give to the railroad passenger his travelling freedom. At present railroads only give a low rate to the traveler on conditions which they make themselves, viz.: that the ticket shall only be good on certain trains, that the passenger must return by the company's lips and the like. What the traveler wants is the cheapest passenger rate with freedom to route himself; to go the head." "What the member for South veler wants is the cheapest passenger rate with freedom to route himself; to go by one line and return by another that suits his convenience and business. And suits his convenience and business. And it is because the railways will only give a cheap ticket under restraints that they have in self defence had to protect them-selves against the ticket scalper. Railway Disaster Recalled.

Fifty years ago Tuesday, March 12th, 1837; occurred the Desjardins Bridge disaster, the most calamitous railway accident that had occurred in Canada up to that time, when the afternoon passenger train from Toronto to Hamilton went through the drawbridge over the Desjardins Canal, and the whole train with the exception of the last car went down seventy feet to the canal and through the ice into the water. Of the eighty persons in the train, fifty-nine lost their lives. Among the victims were Samuel Zimmerman, of Clifton, President of the Zimmerman Bank, and one of the leading financial magnates of that day. Mr. Zimmerman's death brought about the collapse of his bank, and created something like a financial crisis. The Zimmerman Bank was famous for its issue of three-dollar bills, the only issue of that denomination made by a Canadian bank. Railways were new in Canada in those days and for many years afterward timid people were deterred by the memory of the Desiardins many years afterward timid people were deterred by the memory of the Desjardins Bridge disaster from travelling by rail. But in these days of great and frequent horrors, such a wreck as that of the Desjardins Bridge would not count as much of a disaster.


