Tragic Death of Mrs. F. M. Young.

The people of Bridgetown were very much startled last Friday morning by the news that the wife of the Rev. F. M. 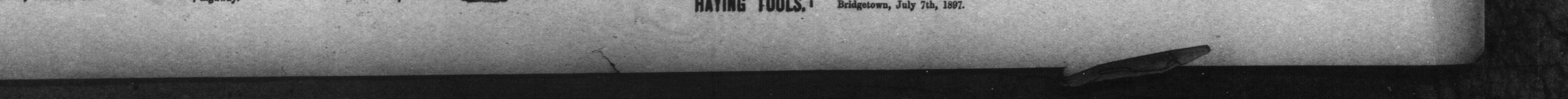
