

He Is the Most Enviable Man In Canada, Says H. B. Co. Factor. "The Indians are the most fortun

ate people in Canada to-day," said A. F. Fugl, district manager of the Hudson Bay Company at Edmonton, Alberta. "They have fish and fuel at their very doors and it costs them nothing to build their houses.'

These remarks were made by Mr. Fugl when asked if the report were true that the Hudson Bay Company had cut off the food supply of the Indians in the far north, "Absolutely rot." said Mr. Fugl. "These reports that the Indians of the north are starving are altogether untrue.'

Mr. Fugl stated that his company would continue to buy all the furs the Indians could supply and also stated that the public were finder a false impression when they thought that the Indians required a large supply of food for the winter. "Such is not the case," said Mr. Fugl, "in fact, it's quite the reverse. It is when the Indian is loafing about the towns and settlements that he requires the food supply and not when he goes on his winter's hunt for furs. When the Indian leaves for his hunt, he takes just as little food supply



Looking For Privates.

Visit Salisbury camp any Sunday and watch the battery of limousines drawn up close to the battalion lines, says J. A. Maclean in a recent article in The Toronto Sunday World. Sunday is visitors' day, and thousands of relatives and friends motor out to the camp from the south and north, east and west. Practically all that troops do on Sunday is to attend church service in the morning and receive visitors. Many, of course, go to London and elsewhere on leave for the week end.

"Is Private Johnston in this battalion?" asked a silk hatted plutocrat in a limousine which has stopped at one of the camp roads near the quarters of the Toronto or Montreal Highlanders, the Queen's Own or some other battalion. The soldier addressed sprints alongside the rows of tents and yells the name out: "Private Johnston." The soldier wanted appears most likely in mud and grease stained kakhi and walks out to meet his uncle who is connected with the War Office, or the Admiralty, head of a half a dozen banks or something like that.

"When you see these visitors searching for relatives in the ranks you get a pretty good idea of whom these Canadians are," said an officer. "They are of the best."

Another officer remarked: "You know we must have discipline and we are gradually getting it. But it is hard going some times especially if a man is almost unmanageable. Most of these fellows had no previous knowledge of soldiering. It's rather tough when you have got to call down the son of your boss for coming in late on parade."

A steamship official of Irish birth, who resides in Montreal during the summer navigation season and spends the remainder of the year in Halifax, the winter port of his line, was explaining the compensations of his mode of life to his Montreal friends while preparing to leave them a few weeks ago. "I do like to spend New Year's Day in Halifax," he said. "In fact, I wouldn't miss it for any amount of money. Every time you enter a bar, the bartender always insists on buying the first drink. It's a local custom there, and a good one. If you start out early enough, by noon you feel so good that you start buying drinks yourself."


