Loss of Life at Sea in 1914

The loss of life by marine disasters during 1914 was 2,519, divided as follows: Ocean, 1,295; inland waters, 1,224; as compared with a total of 1,640 in 1913 and 4,400 in 1912. The unusual loss of life on inland waters is to be mainly credited to the sinking of the steamer Empress of Ireland in the St. Lawrence River, May 29, in which 1,027 perished. The detailed list does not include vessels destroyed in the naval battles of the year.

Table Oilcloth Has Many Uses.

Mrs. Phibbs, Peterboro, Ont., has fourteen near relatives at the front, and also a son with the Canadian contingent at Salisbury Plain. Both of her grandfathers fought in the Crimean War.

THE LUCKY INDIAN.

He is the Most Envidable Man in Canada, Says H. B. Co. Factor.

"The Indians are the most fortunate people in Canada to-day," said A. F. Fugl, district manager of the Hudson Bay Company at Edmonton, Alberta. "They have fish and fuel at their very doors and it costs them nothing to build their houses."
"These remarks were made by Mr. Fugl when asked if the report were true that the Hudson Bay Company had cut off the food supply of the Indians in the far north. "Absolutely not," said Mr. Fugl. "These reports that the Indians of the north are starving are altogether untrue."
Mr. Fugl stated that his company would continue to buy all the furs the Indians could supply and also stated that the public were under a false impression when they thought that the Indians required a large supply of food for the winter. "Such is not the case," said Mr. Fugl, "in fact, it's quite the reverse. It is when the Indian is loafing about the towns and settlements that he requires the food supply and not when he goes on his winter's hunt for furs. When the Indian leaves for his hunt, he takes just as little food supply and other articles as possible as he wants as small a pack to carry as it is possible to make. His winter's supply of food comes mainly from what he shoots and from fish."
Fur prices, according to Mr. Fugl, have dropped 85 per cent. in the past year, but the Indians continue to get a very good price for their skins. For mink skins, where the Indians one year ago got \$5 for a good skin, to-day, he gets but one dollar. Mr. Fugl stated that as high as \$15 is paid for a good marten skin, so it would seem that after all the Indian should be better off than many white people.
"If I were to lose my job to-morrow and had no means of livelihood, I would go straight to the far north country," said Mr. Fugl. "There I would at least have enough to eat."
Mr. Fugl states that he is well acquainted with the Indians of all parts of Canada, having lived among them and dealt with them from the Labrador coast to the Arctic coast, and he says that of all Indians in Canada to-day, none are so well off and have better means of livelihood than the Indians of far northern Alberta.

The annual report of the Indian Department shows that although the Indians of the northern region of Canada who depend on hunting are suffering from the effects of the war on the fur market, and have to be aided by the Government, the Indians of the Dominion on the whole have made considerable progress in the past year. They raised 400,000 bushels of grain more than the year before, and their agricultural products were worth \$208,000 more, the total being \$1,568,000.

Resolution Passed by Municipality of Annapolis County

Granting \$4,500 to Belgian Relief and Canadian Patriotic Fund

To the Municipal Council of Municipality of Annapolis County:—

Gentlemen,—In view of the European conflict and the demand that will be made upon all portions of the Empire for assistance, both to the distressed and destitute Belgians as well as to the dependents of those who have gone from Canada to fight the battles of the Empire in our stead, and desiring to do our full duty as a Municipality within the Empire;

Therefore resolved:—

That this Municipal Council of the Municipality of Annapolis County vote the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500.00) to be devoted to the purposes aforesaid, to be paid to the Treasurer of the Belgian Relief Fund and of the Treasurer of the Patriotic Fund for the Province of Nova Scotia, by order of the Municipal Council of this Municipality in such amounts and at such times as the exigency of the situation in the opinion of this Municipal Council may warrant.

Commander Samson, of the British navy, known to the Germans as Captain Kettle, has annoyed them so much with his remarkable aeroplanes exploits about Ypres and Courtrai in France that they have offered a reward of \$5,000 for his capture dead or alive. He is among the most, if not the most, daring of British aeroplanists and has done much damage to the Germans besides doing important spy work for the allied army. So the official offer of a high price for his head has been made. However, the knowledge of his danger has not stopped his work nor ruffled his disposition.

—With so many voices of learned Germans lifted in vindication of the Kaiser, it is well to know that there are men brave enough and sane enough in Germany to condemn the war. Professor Martin Rade of the Marburg University in a paper which he edits, says, "I can only deplore the manner in which the Chancellor in his speech of August the fourth has treated the question of neutral countries, for there was no need for him to have recourse to the proverb, 'Necessity knows no law.' With that proverb I cannot convince those who behold in the existence of a neutral States a triumph of the rights of man. That is why it is a pity—for which it is hard indeed to make reparation—that the German Government should not have abstained altogether, at the very outset, from the sin of violating rights, which it has committed against Belgium. Whoever accuses my view of being unpatriotic, I challenge, by whatever test he likes, to show that he loves his fatherland better than I do."
