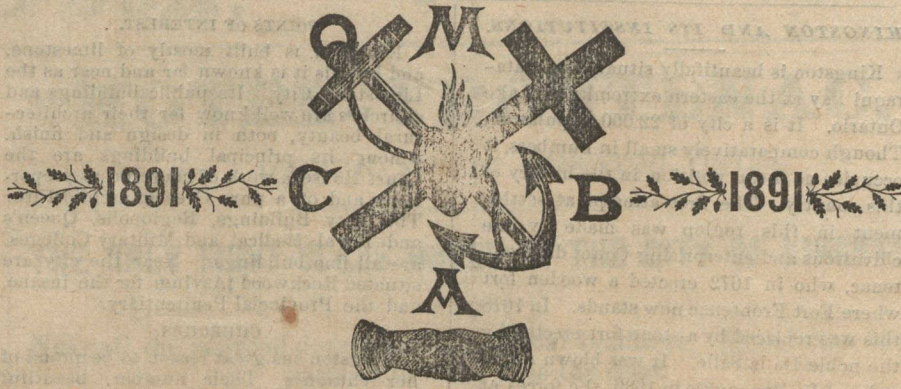

### KINGSTON AND ITS INSTITUTIONS.

Kingston is beautifully situated on Cata-  
raqui Bay at the eastern extremity of Lake  
Ontario. It is a city of 22,000 population.  
Though comparatively small in numbers, it  
occupies no mean position in the history of  
this country. The first attempt at settle-  
ment in this region was made by the  
chivalrous and enterprising Count de Fron-  
tenac, who in 1672 erected a wooden fort  
where Fort Frontenac now stands. In 1678  
this was replaced by a stone fort erected by  
the noble De la Salle. It was blown up by  
order of De Denonville in 1689, the forces at  
this governor's disposal not being sufficient  
to guard so wide an area of territory. It  
was again rebuilt by Frontenac in 1693.  
The strategical importance of Frontenac  
even in these earlier days has been main-  
tained ever since, and her military, educa-  
tional and commercial advantages have  
risen to no inconsiderable importance.

### MILITARY.

Besides Fort Henry, which is admirably  
situated for military purposes, we have  
here the Tete du Pont barracks, which oc-  
cupies the site of the old historic Fort Fron-  
tenac. Kingston also can boast of the only  
military college in Canada. It is the Cana-  
dian West Point. The graduates of this  
college have already distinguished them-  
selves as soldiers who can well sustain the  
military glory of their Fatherland.

### COMMERCIAL.

Kingston has always enjoyed a favorable  
commercial reputation, and is justly con-  
sidered the most solid financial city in the  
Dominion. The shipping advantages are  
excellent and the harbor one of the finest on  
the lakes. The grain of the Prairie States  
and of Eastern Ontario is here transhipped  
from the lake vessels into barges for the St.  
Lawrence River navigation. The Bay of  
Quinte barley, the finest brewing barley in  
the world is here collected to be sent to the  
great malting centres in the neighboring  
republic. The mining industries of the  
Kingston district are among the most valu-  
able on the continent. Rich deposits of  
iron, lead, mica and phosphate are here  
awaiting the hand of man to give them  
their proper value, while silver and gold  
are found though in smaller quantities.  
Capital is all that is required to develop  
these inexhaustible resources, and Kingston  
will yet be the centre of a community rich  
in all the gifts that nature bestows on man.  
Kingston has a splendid railway service.  
The Grand Trunk double track passes  
through the city, and the Kingston and  
Pembroke and Napanee and Tamworth  
have a terminus here. Soon another road,  
the Kingston and Ottawa, will reach the  
city. Kingston will then have excellent  
shipping advantages both by rail and water.

### EDUCATION.

Kingston has always been looked upon  
as the centre of Canadian education. It  
was here that the greatest men in Canadian  
history received the educational impetus  
that stood to them so well in after life. The  
Separate and Public schools have both reached  
a very high state of efficiency. The  
pioneer educational institution of Kingston  
was old Regiopolis College. It was founded  
in 1845 by the late Bishop Phelan. Vicar-  
General Macdonell acted as prefect, and  
with him were associated Rev. Dr. Chisholm,  
Rev. Fathers Latellier and McAvoy, and  
many of the ablest educationalists of that  
period. The college enjoyed a period of  
remarkable prosperity until 1868 when the  
government grant was removed and the in-  
stitution was closed for want of funds. The  
University of Queen's College has also  
made a lasting place for itself in this coun-  
try. It is now conducted by the Presby-  
terian church, and under its able and well-  
known head, Principal Grant, has achieved  
remarkable success.

### POINTS OF INTEREST.

Kingston is built mostly of limestone,  
and by this it is known far and near as the  
Limestone City. Its public buildings and  
churches are well known for their architec-  
tural beauty, both in design and finish.  
Among its principal buildings are the  
Court House, a work of magnificent propor-  
tions and of a pure Grecian architecture.  
The City Buildings, Regiopolis, Queen's  
and Royal Medical and Military Colleges,  
are all fine buildings. Near the city are  
situated Rockwood Asylum for the insane,  
and the Provincial Penitentiary.

### CHURCHES.

Kingston has great reason to be proud of  
her churches. Their number, beautiful  
situations, and architectural beauty should  
certainly entitle her to be called the "city of  
churches." Conspicuous above them all is  
grand old St. Mary's, a building whose  
magnificent proportions stamp it as one of  
the finest on the continent. Though the  
first stone was laid away back in the early  
history of the city, it remained for our  
present illustrious prelate to bring the  
work to a successful completion. Arch-  
bishop Cleary has performed a glorious  
work, and his name will be forever perpe-  
tuated in the grand structure he has all  
but completed. St. George's Cathedral,  
which is now being remodeled, will, when  
completed, form a very imposing structure.  
It is one of the oldest churches in this dis-  
trict. St. Andrews, Chalmers, and the  
many Methodist churches are erected on a  
very artistic scale.

### POINTS OF INTEREST OUTSIDE THE CITY.

The far famed Thousand Islands are  
within a few moments sail from the city.  
The natural beauty of these Islands are well  
known to all. Kingston Mills, a favorite  
picnic resort, will also well repay a visit.  
No one should leave Kingston without  
visiting her "cities of the dead." St. Mary's  
cemetery is situated on Division street, and  
Catarqui cemetery on Princess street,  
about three miles from the city. In the  
latter sleep the remains of the immortal Sir  
John Macdonald. Many other points of in-  
terest could be mentioned did space allow.  
Altogether Kingston will be found an in-  
teresting place for the tourist, it matters  
not what pleasure he is seeking. The hotel  
accommodation offers all the comforts the  
traveller could desire. For those who do  
not like the bustle of hotel life, private ac-  
commodation exists in plenty. Kingston  
is deservedly known for her hospitality to  
strangers, and whether they come as pri-  
vate individuals or as a public body, the  
citizens always vie with one another in  
their eagerness to make them happy, and  
to administer to their wants.

### WELCOME TO OUR VISITORS.

To those who are now about to visit us for  
the first time we extend a cordial welcome.  
We speak not only for the organization  
whose guests they will be, but we will take  
the liberty of speaking for the citizens in  
general. To our American visitors we bid  
a double welcome. Though we still cling  
to the old flag we entertain nothing but the  
best wishes for you who were rocked in the  
same cradle, who speak the same language,  
and inherit the same customs. We trust  
your stay will be pleasant and profitable  
and that in departing you will carry with  
you nothing but kind thoughts for the  
people of the good old Limestone City.  
Deeply do we feel the honor you are con-  
ferring on us by making our city your  
trysting place for a season, short though it  
be. We look forward with pleasant anti-  
cipations to the happy days we will spend  
together—days of mutual benefit and en-  
couragement. We recognize fully how  
close is our bond of union, how inseparable  
our interests, whether as individuals or as  
nations. And in our meeting that is to be  
the fact will be more fully brought to our  
minds that we are one in thought, one in  
heart, divided only by an artificial line, un-  
divided in adversity or prosperity.

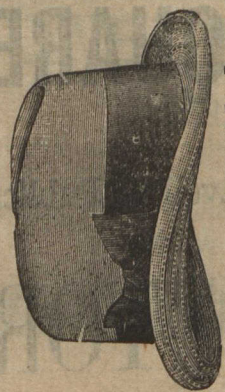

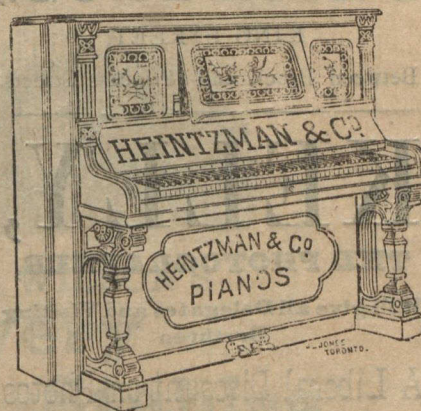

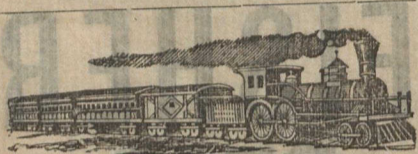

### What It Costs to Join the C.M.B.A.?

The above is one of the questions that persons who are solicited to become members are sure to ask.

In answer, we say that depends on your age, and whether you desire to pay for a \$1,000 or a \$2,000 benefit. If you are only 18 years of age, or if you do not exceed 25 years of age it will cost you \$1 at each assessment for a \$2,000 benefit, or 50 cents for \$1,000 benefit. The highest number of assessments in any one of the past 8 years was 17, while several of these years they did not exceed 15, and others 16. Then there are 25 cents a month for dues so that the greatest cost per annum is \$17 for 17 assessments and 12 monthly dues 3, total 20. The cost to become a member is the same for either class—\$4.50. That is, entrance fee \$3, medical examination fee \$1.50. For members who are over 25 years of age the cost is a trifle more as may be computed from the following scale for each assessment:

From 25 to 30 years of age,	\$1.10.
" 30 " 35 " "	1.20.
" 35 " 40 " "	1.30.
" 40 " 45 " "	1.45.
" 45 " 50 " "	1.65.

And \$3 annually for monthly dues.

#### HISTORY OF THE C. M. B. A.

The Catholic Mutual Benefit Association was established in 1876. It is thus one of the oldest mutual benefit associations on the continent. From the moment of its inception it grew with remarkable rapidity, in point of numbers, influence and wealth. It soon spread beyond the confines of New York where it first saw the light and now throughout nearly the whole Union and in Canada also are witnessed the happy results of its benign influence. It is purely a benefit association, taking no part in either civil or federal politics. All that is required of a member is sobriety, honesty, and regular attention to the duties of his religion. The growth of the organization is something marvellous. This can be easily accounted for in the low rate of insurance, in the prompt settlement of the death calls, and in the universal brotherhood so characteristic of this society. The death rate is exceedingly low, the cost to members is comparatively light, and a large reserve fund is on hand to meet any exigencies that may occur. In Canada the C.M.B.A. has met with peculiar success. A few years ago its existence was known only to a few, now every city, town and hamlet contains a flourishing branch. Its success is now established and every day is bringing new members and adding strength to its impregnable position.

#### THE C. M. B. A. RE-UNION.

When it became known to the Kingston branch that a number of their brethren from Pittsburg and other American cities intended visiting Kingston, arrangements were made to receive them in a becoming manner, and to entertain them during their stay in the Limestone City. The gathering is purely an informal one, the object being nothing more than an exchange of fraternal greetings. In order that as many as possible may be brought together, invitations have been sent to many Canadian and American branches. Favorable replies have already been received. Montreal, Renfrew, Pembroke, Belleville and many other towns have already signified their intention of participating in the event. Thus far everything augurs well for a happy meeting, and a pleasant gathering. The Kingston branch is doing all it can in the way of making preparations, and all classes of citizens are generously coming forward with assistance.

#### THE BRANCH IN KINGSTON.

The Kingston branch was established in 1884. It first consisted of chartered members, now the branch numbers 125 and is increasing steadily. The branch meets regularly at its hall, market square, on the first and third Wednesday in each month. The officers for the present year are—President, W. Purtell; 1st Vice-President, H. LaCroix; 2nd Vice-President, J. Farmer; Recording Secretary, Jas. Coyle; Asst. Secretary, J. Brennan; Financial Secretary, Wm. Christmas; Treasurer, W. Shanahan; Guard, Jas. Barry; Chancellor, J. J. Behan. The meetings are largely attended and every member is alive to his responsibility in making the branch a success. Last year the branch made a new departure and established a sick benefit. The funds are made up from the reserve fund, and from the monthly dues. Already it has assisted a number of deserving brethren, and day by day the want of such a departure is more clearly manifested. What was first tried merely as an experiment has proved an unquestioned success.

#### HARRIGAN'S MISTAKE.

"When I named my play," said Edward Harrigan, "I felt sure that there was no pawnbroker named Reilly, but I was mistaken, and have had a rather unpleasant reminder of the fact within the last week. In the mail one day came a letter addressed to me and bearing the postmark of a town in Canada. The writer, who signed himself Edward Reilly, pawnbroker, said he had been informed that I was using his name in a play without permission, and he warned me that if I didn't stop he would 'have the law on me.' The letter struck me as being funny, and I sat down and wrote Mr. Reilly, explaining that no harm was intended by using the name of Reilly, and that I did not know of the existence of a pawnbroker of the name when I selected the title. I enclosed him coupons for a box, and asked him to come and see the play. He returned the coupons, and declared in vigorous terms that he couldn't be bought over for a \$10 theatre box; that his name was worth more than a hundred times that amount, and, as he didn't want to figure in a play at all, I had better stop using his name."

Rev. Mother Starnes, Superioress-General of the Convent of the Sacred Heart, at Sault au Recollet, is dead. It was only some three weeks ago that her father, Hon. Henry Starnes, heard that she was so ill that her life was despaired of. She died from a cancer in the stomach. The deceased lady, who was Mr. Starnes' second daughter, had been in that convent for thirty years, having entered it when only ten years of age. She pronounced her final vows and took the cross fifteen years ago in Paris. She had the honor of being the first Canadian elected to the position of Superioress-General. The funeral took place Tuesday morning at the Sacred Heart Convent, where the remains were interred.
