SOME NBW SCHOOL BOOKS.


RING the present sea. son there have been a few changes in school books which affect the trade in Ontario, and these changes have been made by the Mis.ister of Education of this province. Two or three of the little backwoods retailers have been kicking up a fuss just because the said Minister of Education hasn's informed them of his plans in an official way, and that at the present tume they are using the cry of a famous U.S. Senator-"Where am I at ?" and there is no answer. This uncertainty is displeasing to those men-whom this same Minister has called-"the backbone of our country," classing them with the other laborers of our land.

Dealers probably expect too much-but it would seem that the Minister of Education would be doing bimself a favor if he would send notices of probable changes to Books AND Notions, add thus make them known to the retail trade generally. For instance there is an uncertainty as to when the new Drawing Books for High Schoel use will be ready, and consequently dealers do not know what quantities to purchase. The Minister of Education has been uniformally willing to furnish all such information when asked
directly for it, but is also careful not to tel! too much, about his "futures." But Books and Notions has no doubt that such information as is available would be given to this journal in a regular way, if booksellers would intumate to the Minister that such a plan is desirable.

Now as to the new High School Drawing Books, work has just been commenced on them by the publishers and there is little prospect that more than the first number will be issued before the end of the year. Deilers can therefore buy stock Ireely, as moit of the High Schools and Collegiate Institutes will no doubt use the old series throughout the year. A change at January would not be convenient.

A new edition of the Public School Arithmetic will be issued about the end of the year. The work is now in hand, but the old edition will have to be cleared up before the new one is placed on the market. Dealers may expect the new edition in f.nnuary.
The publishing of the new Public School text bouk "Physiology and Temperance" has been entrusted to the Methodist Bonk and Publishing House. It will contain about 200 pages, fully illustrated, and will sell at 25 cents. The trade may look for it towards the close of September. As the use of this book is made compulsory in the fourth and fifth forms a large demand is assured.

The Copp Clark Co. furnish the following information. They have issued an illustrated edition of the Lady of the Lake, with notes by Rolfe, the famed author of Shakespeare's works. They have also issued an annotated edition of Black's Goldsmith by F. H. Sykes. The price of these two books is 50 and 60 cents respectively. They have arranged tor a Canadian edition of N. F. Dupuis' Elementary Algebra. This book is by a professor at Queen's University at Kingston, and has been issued for some years by McMillan \& Co., New York. The edition will be $\$ \mathrm{r}$. They will also issue a dollar edition of Hall \& Knught's Elementary Algebra. A second edition of Virgil, bk. Il., with notes by Henderson and Hargarty, is now in press, the first edition having been exhausted before the schoois actually opened. They have in press a book entitled Canadian Historical Sketches, based upon the stories of New France by Miss Machar and F. G. Marquis. The latter is the editor of the volume, which is intended as a supplemen. tary text-book to give prominence to those romantic and surring events of Canadian history which are necessarily omitted in an outline school history.

Another book which will soon be put on the market is an Elementary Algebra to be published by the Rose Publishing Co. They
have just started on it, and it will not be published until some time in October, pos. sibly later.

Ontario dealers should remember that on and after July tst, iSg.t, The Public School History of England and Canada, by G. Mercer Adam and W. J. Robertson, shall cease to be authorized.

Sinclair's "First Year at School" has been authorized in Ontorio. This is a primary teacher's manual, and contains many valuable suggestions as to first language lessone, reading, number work, study of surroundings, manual training and moral training. It shows how kindergarten work may be blended with public school work. Mr. Sinclair is Princtpal of the Hamilton Model School.

The Education Department state that the Book-keeping Ilanks at present in use will be accepted by the examiners for 1894. This prectically means that for this term at all events the Blar.ks hitherto used will be in demand and can be disposed of. Most of the dealers maly already be aware that about two weeks ano the Education Department issued regulations to the effect that a new Book-keeping Illank would be required of "at least ten foolscap size or the equivalent thereof." Wholesalers had stocks of the kind used previously, and the retalers were loaded, hence a vigorous kick was made with the above result, and present stocks may now be worked off.

The following is the departmental requirements in the Commercial Course for the Primary. "Each candidate shall submit for examination his school work in Bookkeeping and Commercial Transactions, which shall consist of the following as a minimum :-Four Sets, each of at least ten foolscap pages or the equivalent thereof, and each comprising the necessary books of original entry with Ledger and Bill-Book. The sers shall consist of one in Single Entry and three in Double Entry, and the books of each Set, it written in a blank book, shall be entered together and shall be wholly separate from the others. The Single Entry Set shall be espectally suitable for farmers and artizans or for retal merchants and general traders, and shall employ the Cash Book, Journal, Ledger and Bill Book, in additoon to the necessary books of original entry. Une of the Double Entry Sets shall be suitable for retall merchants, and shall show transactions covering a period of two months of actual business, the l.edger being closed at the end of each month and a statement of re surces and liabilites shown. The second Double Entry Set shall be a Set in Parinership, embracing transactions in Commission and Brokerage ; and the thurd shall be a
continuation of the Single Entry Set, show. ing cleariy the transfer from Single to Double Entry. Any three accounts in the Single Entry Set shall be made in proper form and submilled to the exammerg. The candidates shall also submis at least two examples of each kind of commercial forms and correspondence pertining to the Sets. A descriptive index shall arcompany each of the four Sets, and the transactions in each Set shall be different from year to year."

## OUR EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM.

I$N$ this issue we present our readers whth the first complete list of educational works ever published. We should probably be ashamed for paying so much attention to Canadian publications as we have done this year, b. : like the small boy we "feel better when we are ashamed."
This is accompanied by a list of the educational text books authorized in the schools ul each province. This will also be useful to booksellers and publishers, and will make this issue still more useful and valuable as a reference number. It should be filed, as the edition is limited.
This information concerning our educa. tional system would not be complete without referring to the fact that several Canadian authors have produced books which have been found worthy of adinption in the schools of the United States. We would like to have gone into this matter inore thoroughly and shown to what extent this is so. But circumstances prevent this being done in the present issus and it must be deferred.
Canada has ant educational system which is surpassed by no nation in the world. It is not perfect by any means, and it is less perfect in Quebec than in any other of the pro. vinces. The greatest excelience has been allained in Ontario, but New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are almost equal. The other provinces have new systems which promise well.
The educatoonal works in use in Canada are the best, and they are admurably suited to the adranced system which obtaius. The length of the catalogue given in this issue shows how earnest Canadian educationists are in endeavoring to produce books suitable to the country. The future is bnght.

Canadian trade is good.

THE book thade in Cianada is sound and healithy, as in this way partikes of the seneral business prosperity of the country. Canada sells a great deal to the Unised States, and it is no wonder that people thoukhe that trade would slacken in sympatioy with the depression in that country. lut the effect has been almost nit, and despite the fact that collections are somewhat slow: trade is, as we have said, sound and healthy.
The harvest is nearly of and the result will be thil the ernp estumates will be sur-
passed by the actual production. It has been a prosperous year for the farming community, and this will continue the present prosperous trade among retail merchants generally.
There is ore thing that cannot be denied though, and that is that retailers of fancy soods are not buying so heavily as usual for the holiday trade. This is not a sign of danger, but is rather a sign of securty. The present financial stringency in the United States and Australia has taught Canadian to be careful, and this carefulness is being shown in the fact that buyers are very conservative. They are determined not to be caught napping. But there is alsu another reason for this conservative purchasing of fancy goods, as agairst an increased trade in books, stationery and sporting goods. This is found in the fact that the dry goods houses are taking part of the fancy goods trade, just as they are taking part of the stationery trade. The stationer and fancy goods dealer of to-day cannot sleep and hold his business. He has got to get up and hustle, for the enemy is on his track.

## WALL PAPER NOTES.

THE National Wall Paper Co. last year secured almost the entire trade of the country by offerling a to per cent. rebate to jobbers and retailers who purchased their supplies exclusively from the firms controlled by the trust a in sign yearly contracts to that effect. It is understood that the smaller combinations will take steps to test the legality of the contracts on the ground that they discriminate against numerous small dealers. In the meantime the follow. ing letter has been sent out by the president of the company :
"At a meeting of the directors, held on Friday, August 4, 1893, if was decided to increase the option for the coining season to 20 per rent., and the new option, in accordance with these terms, will be forwarded to the trade at once.
"It was also decided that but two prices should be made for the goods-a road prise and a quantity price. The quantity price to be 10 per cent. less than the road price. These prices, however, will not be made until our agents are ready to start out on the road. The date for the starting out of the traveling salesmen has not been determined upon as yet."

This letter gives retallers, apparenily, an equal chance with jobbers as far as the $=0$ percent. is concerned. The 10 per cent. depends on the quantuly bought. A retaiter Tho can secure a discount of 10 and 20 per cent. can equal any jobber. As one Toronto man remarked, "Tne jobbers of this country and of the Unted Staies are out of it to a great extent."

The W. J Gage Co. state that they have decided not to handle wall paper this season
on account of the unfavorable situation. C M. Taylor \& Co. are making preparations to handle trust goods, and will likely do so under special arrangements.

In sporting goods all the houses have done a good summet's trade, generally equal and in many cases in excess of that for the corresponding period last year. The majorily are now busy on lines of toys, etc., for the holiday trade, and the demand so tar is encouraging. Wall paper travelers are now all out, having commenced their tours early in July, and up to date their returns have been salisfactory, in fact compared with last year they show a noticeable improvement according to the reports made hy both the big manufacturing firms bere.

Mr. H. Brophy, the manager of the Montreal News Co., was up west during the month visiting the different centres in Ontario.

The Canada Paper Co. note a good demann for stationery and envelopes, and also for the heavy lines of wrapping paper, of which they make a specialty.
J. H. Jones \& Co. are busy on fall orders. They have had a verv good summer's trade in cricket supplies, bats, etc., also base:ball goods.

Mr. Foster, the business manager of Messrs. John C. Watson \& Co.. wall paper manufacturers, is out of town on a trip at present.

Porter, Tesky \& Co. say there is a big call for all lines of block games, of which they have a complete variety. The "Beauly blocks" especially are meeling with a good demand.

The recent storm firoded the North River to such an extent at Lachute that operations on the new flume at Messrs. J. C. Wilson \& Co.'s paper works had to be temporarily sus. pended,

The Montreal Playing Card Co. had their new samples out on the inarket sume time ago in over a dozen varielies. Orders on them are fair, especially from the districts east of Montreal.

The Montreal Paper Co. report business far during the month tor all lines of paper, and argue from this that general busuness should be good, as a call tor wrapping ete, should indicate a movement in other lines as well.

There is nothing like judicious instruction for the young, and Messrs. Porter, Tesky \& Co. think they have just the thing in this respect in a line of rubber balls they are offering. Each one of these forms a comnlete map of the world in miniature. The continents and countries are brought out on
a raised surface in different colors. The toy is certainly a useful novelty and already is having a good run.
The Montreal News Co. report a decided increase in the demand for the better class of novels during the month. Their lines will be represented at the coming exhibition here on the stands of Messrs. F. E. Phelan and Norman Murray.
The big warchouse of Messrs. H. A. Nelson \& Sons on St. Peter, is already putting in its attractive holiday appearance. The firm say that this has been a remarkably good summer for fishing tackle, sporting good, etc.

Peter Teskey \& Co rereived the other week an extensive and varied assortment of fagcy French hairpins in many handsome patterns. They anticipate a good call for these, as they are taking and are offering at moderate cost.
J. C. Wilson \& Co. are gelting up an entirely new set of candy boxes for the holiday trade in some different varieties. A special line that is offered as just the thing for small dealers, etc., is a $\$ 5$ case containing a full assortment of these goods.
E. B. Eddy ©Co.'s branch here note a big call for their patent wrapping paper holders in all sizes, fitted to hold anything from a role of hardware wrapping to the finest white druggist paper They are filling quite a few orders also for their lines of wood pulp pails.

Mr. J. C. Wilson, of J. C. Wilson \& Co, has gone away on a ten-days fishing trip to the grounds of the Wastigouche Fishing Club, of which he is a member. He is accompanied by several New Xork gentlemen, Messrs. H. J. Howlett, L. W. Walkley and A. E. Osborne.
R. Hy. Holland © Co. are offering numerous lines of cheap purses in the wallet and folder shapes at present, and running all the way from 35 c . per dozen up to $\$ 1.25$. A cheap line of toilet soap at 33 c . per dozen, a line of penholders at 40 . per dozen, and a lot of removable rubber-tipped pencils are among the other reductions this month.

Cameron, Currie \& Co. the dealers in advertising novelties in St. Paul Strect, intend rettring shortly. They are winding up their business at present and expect that It will take a month or two to do so. A more advantageous opening in another line of trade is the reason alleged fot their action.

The many friends here of Mr. Palmer who until recently was the manager of W. Drysdale \& Co.'s establishment on St. James Street, were quite anxious until news of the long overdue S. S. Sarnia was received. Mr. Palmer, who had severed his connection with W. Drysdale \& Co., was on his way across to visit his relations in England.

The Reinhardt Mig. Co. have nothing special to report in the way of new goods at present. They are very busy rushing forward goods on fall orders however, and note that the moderate cost of their line of felt
papetries, toilet boxes, etc., is inducing a good demand for them as they have had several "repeats."

Colin McArthur it Co. report that they are very busy on orders at present. Their travelers havebeen all out for some time now, and have met with very good encouragement. In fact the percentage so far is it excess of last year, and Mir. MicArthur says that present indications incline him to the belief that it will continue so.

Jno. Lovell \& Son's claxsified business directory for 1893.94 was issued the other week. It is a complete guide of the various business interests in Moritreal. A new tablet called "Silver star" is issued by The lirown liros. The paper is simular in texture to Eighlish parchment.

Octavo and quarto ; plain and ruled. Their wedding stationery comprises undoubtedly the best range on the market.

The W. J. Gage Co.'s travelers are all on the road and report very fair sales through. out the country in staple stationery. They are especially pushing blank books, which form a large portion of the output from the bindery of the establishment.

Nerlich \& Co. have a nice array of mechanical window figures, which are sure trade-drawers. Their advertisement on another page calls attention to their mechanical 25 -cent toys. Soldiers' and firemen's oulfits are a cheap and striking line.

Two new features are tound in the Copp, Clark Co's. fallbook catalogue. These are, first, a list of the books required for junior matriculation; and second, a list of the authorised text-books of Ontario. These are commendable and valuable features.
l'ost quarto and cap quarto exercise bcoks are shown in thick sizes by The Brown Bros. The values are undoubred, and the school and college trade take them fast. French and German office baskets have been a feature of their August trade.

The Copp, Clark Co. were open on Civic Holiday (Aug. a8th) from 8 a.m. 109.45 p.m. This was an effort to fill all country orders, of whlch there were a large number, o.l ac. count of that being the day most of the Ontario schools opened.

So great has been the pressure or the manufacturing department of the W. J. Gage Co that they have secured additional prem. ises and are now operaing two different binderies under their own management in order to cope with their largely increasing business.

Carloads of fancy goods are being opened upthe cream of the European manufactories. Their own warchouse has been improved with plate glass frouts.

Pencil compasses have become a neces. sity in schools where drawing, mapping, etc., are taught. Many devices bave been introduced, each having some particular merit,
but the general failing has been the want of a fastener to keep the divider in position. This has now been obviated by the "Lock action," patented, and Warwick \& Sons bave caught the trade on this really useful article which sells for $5 c$.

These are dainty in size, material and desinn. Tall and imposing centrepieces on stands are strikingly handsome in a range of prices from $\$ 6$ to $\$ 35$ each. Some are fully 5 feet high.
The most complete of trade catalogues is the one issued by H. A. Nelson © Sons. Its illustrations are numerous and admirably executed. The information is brief, yet complete in every particular. The arrangements of the book is good, and all complicathons are avoided. The number of articles that enumerated give an idea of the vast
stock carried by this firm. The dealer who orders from it, is sure of getling what he orders, and when he orders it. Nearly 5,000 copies have been distributed, and the firm will no doubt receive large orders for their lines of toys, games, sleds, musical instruments, toy furniture, chinaware, etc. As a book of reference it should be on every dealers desk.
One of the pretticst novelties we have seen for a long time is an article just imported by James A. Skinner \& Co. It is a small vase about 3 inches tall with a real live English oak tree growing in it. The vase is similar in slope to an ordinery hyacinthe glass, and the acorn is placed on the inp. The sample we saw has been growing for about 4 months and is now about 7 inches high, four of them placed round a center piece would make a very attractive ornament for a dinner table, and the most important feature about this decided novelty is that it can be retailed for 25 c . each acorn and all.
W. H. Smith, who has been intimately conrected with the business of Henry Smith, his father, whose fancy goods house on Bay street, in this city, is well known, is leaving and taking a position with H. A. Nelson \& Sons. He will probably do the city for them.

The "Leader" deserves the special attention of the trade, as it is undoubtedly the best twenty-five cent card in the market. These lines are perfect in every detail, and no dealer in such goods can afforit to delay an inspection.

The Toronto News Company is now receiving large orders for Christmas papers. In fact orders at this season never were so large nor so numerous. These was some trouble last year owing to the fact that some of the dry goois houses got hold of some few copies of the English illustrated papers and cut the price on them. This year, the manager, Mr. A. S. Irving has iried to make arrangements so that there will be no recurrence of this cutting. The News Co. being sole agenis for Canada, have a chance 10 keep these copies out of the dry goods stores so lar as the publishers and themselves are conrerned, but it is difficult to prevent some English jobbing house selling to the slashers. But even this will be prevented this year, and the Ximas paper business will remain a bonanza intact for the trade.

AFEW days ago, in a small country town, a meeting of the directers of a Mechanics' Institute was taking place. Incidentally one of the directors who was on the book committedremarked that it was a shame that they had no catalogue c: Canadian books to hand, and forthwith the committee began to enquire for a list. After some trouble a list was secured, and it was found to be the only complete list of Canadian books in print. It was found in the May number of Books and Notions.

If any person doubls the above we can give the name of the - but no one will doubt it Booksellers should make good use of the list when the Mechanics' Institute and other institutions are making their selections for the season's addation to their libraries.

## COMBINE IN WINDOW-SHADES.

FOR some time the prices of windowshades have been demoralised, owing to the great competition among the three Toront: hirms. Some time ago the old firm of McFarlane, Mckinley \& Co. dissolved, and Mr. McFarlane started a new factory. Then Mr. McKinley was burned out and was runging a temporary factory in North Toronto. Ar each of these two men desired the trade of the old firm, a wat of prices was induced. The other city firm, Gea. Hees, Son \&Co., were also trying to extend their trade.

Finally all three decided that the cutting had continued long enough, and a few weeks ago began to make arrangements for the adjusting of prices on something like the old basis. In the meantime Mr. Mckinley has surprised, and it isthought his business will be wound up. The cuttior is almost ovei, at any rate, and prices will soon go back to their old tevel. Dealers with small stocks should order at once.

## THE PRINCE OF INDIA.

THE Prince of India, or Why Constantinople Fell, is the title of the new book by General Lew Wallace. The author of the Ben Hur is the author of this new book, and this was sufficient to secure for the book an inspection at least. The first to inspect it were the reviewers, and the result bas been uniformally favorable to the work. The man who could described the chariot race as Lew Wallace describes it, could find few men bold enough to make an adverse criticism.
The book was issued simultaneously in the United States, Europe and Canada, and the Canadian copynght edition is a neat double volume issue which retails at $\$ 2.50$. The Methodist Book and Publishing House have produced a book which looks well on a book. seller's counter, and which will grace any ibrary. The issuing of such an edition in Canada is an event. But the fact that sn expensive an edition was more than half sold duning the first four days, proves a decided tendency towards a better class of novel. Dealers can draw many useful lessons from the manner in which the public are receiving this book. The book is not written for those shallow readers to whom one brok is as good as another. It is writtes for the class who know and appreciate merit and therefore are willing to pay a fair price for the product of genius.
The Prince of India is introduced to the reader in the opening chapter. He is the "Wandering Jew" of history-the man who insulted Chnst and was condemned to live on the earth untll His second advent. He is on his way, when the story opens, to visit the tomb of king Hiram, the contemporary of Solomen, and knowing its secret he is able to secure many of its treasures. These are what make him rich and antitie him afterwards to be called the Prince of Indin. This is 1595 , when the Waodering Jew was about 1,400 years of age Disgusted with religious contentions he retires to Cipango (probubly Japan) for a balf century, and ap-
pears again in 1445 with a new idea of a Universal Brotherhood of Man with God as its accordant principle, in which it will no matter whether Christ was the Messiah or Mohammed His prophet. The first glimpse of him now is on the road to Mecra with the caravans, where he has gone to study the Mohammedan faithful and see whether the greund is ready for the new seed he has to sow. From this on the book is a succession of oriental pictures, fathful and ample in detail. The pictorial quality which the author has displayed in his other books is bere given full freedom, and from the opening scene to the last event, the destruction of Constantinople, this quality finds a full utterance and a perfection of execution. Love, war and religion are blended with this picturing of the East as it was half a thousand years ago, when the Romans bad a Byzantune Empire, and the fall of whose capital was the final catastropie of Christianity in the East and marks the first success of the Turk in Europe. The picture of the Byzantine Empire just as it was about to fall shows the author as a student of history, intelligent and thorough. It was a huge task to draw an accurate picture of this period, but right nobly has he accomplished it and all the world will call him great.

The character of the Prince of India is 2 peculiar one, showing that the effect of the constant dealing with men through centuries of life is to constantly strengthen the mind without changing the morals of the man. He is an adept in human pature and a manipulator of kings. His lifetime of $1,4 \infty 0$ years made him conversant with all the religions of the world and all their sacred books. His aim was to create one grand Brotherhood, in which all minor details would be forgotten. But he, even he, loses his great idea when a Greek carries of his beautiful lreme ; and as a result of his anger, the Turk takes Constantinople.
It is a romance of great magnitude, and its conception and execution are worthy of all praise.

In each case the sheet of illustrations has an explanatory footnote, which will be found very useful as a memorandum to teachers. White enamelied ware is being pushecu more strongly than ever this season. It carefully handled there would be profit in these goods, but careless handling means $z$ heavy loss owing to the breakableness of the goods.
