## PARISH NOTES.

OFFERTORY.—August 2nd, \$30.26, and for Mission Fund \$1; 9th, \$27.15; 16th, \$28.53; 23rd, \$30.14; 30th, \$30.68. Total parochial, \$146.76. Corresponding period last year, \$148.10.

The Churchwardens find it necessary to request the attention of the Congregation to the amounts of the offertory as lately announced. There has

been rather a falling off, and the amounts received for some weeks past have been quite inadequate to the needs of the Parish.

THE RECTOR has had occasion to set out rather unexpectedly, and at very short notice, for a trip across the Atlantic. He sailed by the Urania, whose arrival in Liverpool was reported on Sunday, 30th August. The date of his return is at present uncertain, but will probably be about the middle of October.

REV. PROF. CLARK has returned to town, and will assume the principal charge of the Parish during the absence of the Rector.

REV. R. J. MOORE is going out of town for a short vacation.

THE MISSION HALL being now completed and in our possession, will be opened for Service immediately on the return of Mr. Moore from his vacation. Due notice will be given of the day, and it is hoped many of the Congregation will encourage the good work by their presence.

## THE IMPROVEMENTS.

The slating of the roof of the Church was completed during the past month. This is a substantial work of a permanent character, and we trust that it will last good for many years.

The new west windows have been put in position, and are much admired. They were made by N. T. Lyon & Co., from designs by Mr. R. C. Windeyer.

The plaster diaper work is nearly complete.

The decorating of the chancel, decided upon by the Committee, could not be proceeded with during the past month, as was intended, in consequence of Mr. Hovenden having other engagements. It is expected that he will be able to execute the work during the coming month.


Parish Workers can obtain copies of the "Vestry List," revised and corrected to November 1884, on application to Rector or Churchwardens.

The Revenue of this Parish is derived from the Offertory and Pew Rents, of which the former is relied upon as the principal source of income.

Offertory Envelopes will be supplied to those who are willing to contribute in this way to the maintenance of the Church and Ministry.

**PAROCHIAL NEEDS.**—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

1. Debt, \$3,500, should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would soon extinguish it.
2. The improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. \$3,000 is wanted for this, and would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
3. \$1,000 for the erection of the Phœbe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission.
4. Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$295 only.
