WRECKED SAILORS WILL USE JAPAN HAD TO MAKE AMENDS

Censure Was Not Impressive Enough for Misbehaving Wild Men of Formosa.

Washington, D. C., April 13.—Batal Tobacco savages in Formosa caused the death of eight members of the crew of the American ship Benjamin Sevall, and treated other members of the crew in a cruel manner when that ship was wrecked in Formosan waters some time ago.

The story is told in official correspondence published at the state department today. When the Japanese government's attitude regarding the incident was inquired, it replied that the government of Formosa would "efficiently and promptly" consider the same, and warn them not to repeat such misconduct again in the future.

The American government then suggested that several of the native chiefs known to have been implicated in the incident be imprisoned until some of the Formosan officials could master their dialect and make them understand what they were being punished.

MUNICIPALITIES, BEWARE. Mr. Caracallen Against Practice of Spending First and Then Getting Leave.

At the private bill committee yesterday, Chairman Caracallen strongly denounced the practice among municipalities of spending money which had not been voted and then coming to the legislature for an act to consolidate their floating debt and issue debentures.

He said they would not be allowed to come here to get these invalid certificates until they had paid up their floating debt and issued debentures.

This pronouncement was provoked by an application by the Town of Meaford, which had spent \$500 in buying land for the G. T. R. and extending its line to Meaford.

Mr. Caracallen said that he would not allow the town to get its certificate until it had paid up its floating debt and issued debentures.
