


A CANADIAN KLONDIKER.

of certain ingredients, and not to weigh more than one pound. The present 3-lb bread bakers are making large profits at the expense of the consuming public in a deceiving manner. The way it is done is this: The so-called genuine home-made bread, being close-grained bread the baker can use more fall flour, which is cheaper than the patent flour used to make the ordinary bakers' bread. Then he adds ½ lb dard and ½ lb. sugar to every 15 loaves of bread he makes. The lard and sugar make it a little sweet and close-grained. Then he weighs the bread 3 lbs. in weight, so he gains 100 lbs, of dough on every 100 loaves he makes, at 3 lbs. That dough will turn out at least 30 loaves of bread at 3 lbs. each, and the baker will make an extra profit of \$3 on every 100 loaves he makes over and above the regular profit, except about 30c, cost of lard and sugar.

I demand, in the interest of the citizens of Toronto, that the City Council pass afbylaw making the standard weight of a Boaf of bread 4 lbs., no more no less. There is no honest ground for any baker to object to the above, and I think it will be a good law when it is passed, for the bakers as well as the citizens of Toronto.
