MORE AMERICAN HORSES. ix Cargoes of Animals Will Shipped to South Africa.

Philadelphia, Oct. 17 .- The Record's Lonon correspondent says: The governmen o-day entered into a fresh contract for the ourchase of several hundred horses and nules in America. The animals are to be shipped from New Orleans to South Africa during November. Negotiations have been completed by which six steamships, three of them owned by American companies, will begin the work of transporting the animals on Nov. 9.

These arrangements are the direct out come of the recent row between Lord Kitchener and the War Office. The dis-

Kitchener and the War Office. The dispute was referred to the King, and he decided in Kitchener's favor.

Instructions were to-day cabled to the British purchasing officers at Kansas City and New Orleans to purchase a large number of remounts and baggage mules, together with additional animals for the use of the new yeomanry regiments which will soon go to South Africa.

Plenty of animals are to be had in England, but past experience has shown the War Office authorities that the American horses and mules stand the trying South African climate better than those bred in this country. In addition to this, those who have tried both horses say that they prefer the lighter, wirier American animal, prefer the lighter, wirier American animal, which does not tire easily, and which is surer-footed in rough country.

WHAT CANADA MIGHT DO.

Trinidad would like to take more than 3 per cent. of her total import from Canada; and 4550 barrels of flour is not much for Canada to do in that matter, when the United States finds a market for 184,000 barrels. What is the matter with Canadian flour, anyhow?


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
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
