THE ROYAL PHYSICIAN DESCRIBES.

Prevented From Attending Garrison Church Parade at Aldershot on Sunday.

London, June 15.—King Edward to-day is suffering from a chill, which has prevented His Majesty from attending to-day's church parade of the Aldershot garrison.

The chill came as a result of his prolonged stay outdoors last night upon the occasion of the torchlight tattoo. His Majesty's chill is a slight one, accompanied by symptoms of lumbago.

The weather last night was extremely cold, and in various intervals before His Majesty left the brigade recreation ground, King Edward returned to his apartments chilled from the unwelcome exposure.

These reports of His Majesty's illness have naturally caused apprehension, but there is apparently no reason to anticipate serious results. An authentic statement from Aldershot this evening is to the effect that King Edward is slightly indisposed, but that his indisposition is not of a serious nature.

Sir Francis Laking, physician-in-ordinary to His Majesty, was summoned to Aldershot early this morning. He prescribed for the King and recommended that to-day be spent in perfect quiet. Queen Alexandra and the other members of the royal family attended the services at church, but remained in the royal apartments for the rest of the day.

It has been learned that the King arose this afternoon. This is considered a good reason for hoping that the indisposition is only temporary. No official bulletin concerning His Majesty's condition has been issued.

If King Edward does not improve by to-morrow, the Prince of Wales will receive the salutes of the troops on behalf of His Majesty. The court doctor is expected to issue a bulletin to-night publishing the following official announcement: "King Edward was unable to leave his room to-day owing to an attack of lumbago caused by a chill."

Sir Francis Laking was in attendance upon His Majesty this morning, and found the King much better. The latest report is that King Edward will be able to attend the review.

OIL TO SUCCEED COAL.

Probable That U.S. Navy Will Adopt the Liquid Fuel.

Washington, June 15.—Admiral Melville announced to-day a notable advance in oil fuel for the navy, which involves the adoption of a new type of boiler with which a coal-burning boiler will be replaced by a steam boiler which will burn oil. A board of engineers under his direction has succeeded in producing one-third more steam from a standard boiler with oil than was possible with the best coal, and it is thought that the use of liquid fuel on the point of tremendous development for marine purposes, in careful tests, extending over a long period, will show that the use of oil as a fuel has been accurately determined, and in the last week the same result has been shown in the preliminary series of exhaustive tests, which will last several months.

Both the oil and the coal-burning boiler have astonished the skilled experimenters, and while the wild claims of oil-burners are not to be taken too literally, it seems highly probable that oil fuel will supersede coal as a controlling element of naval warfare.

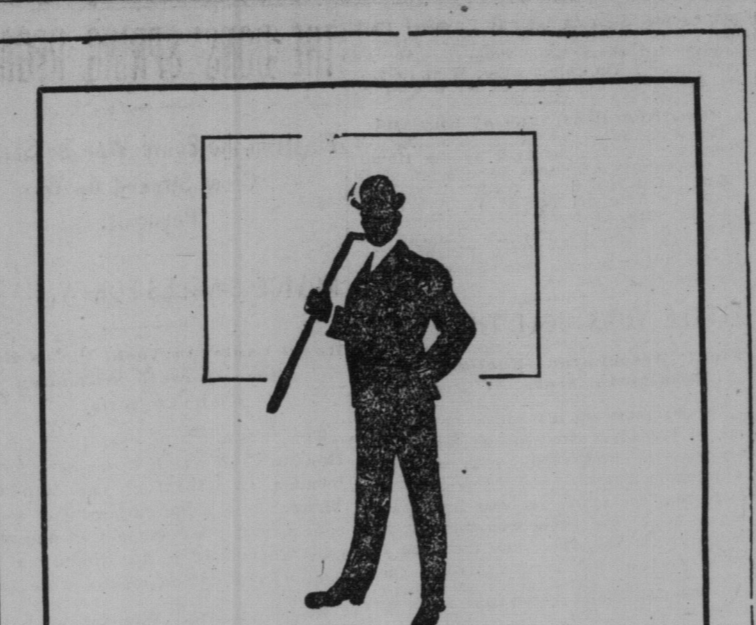

That is the way it feels for you know I have been in Washington so much, and I have so many good friends on the other side, that the new appointment is merely a return to pleasant associations. And everything has been so nice. I have received countless letters and cable messages of congratulation from America—so many that I am really astonished to find how many friends I have got there. When Americans like me they are certainly like you, and they have the reverse virtue of hating well. I shall be glad when I'm in Washington once again."

But Vandercook, who was a member of the club, Santos-Dumont wrote a number of farewells, because, having no skill with swords or pistols, he considered an 'accident' possible."

A special excursion train will be run from Toronto to Muskoka and return, and many distinguished citizens are to take part in the proceedings. Saturday's meeting was presided over by Chief Justice Sir W. R. Meredith, and among other present were W. J. Gage, Hugh Blain, J. Crabbe, Dr. N. A. Powell and the secretary, J. S. Robertson. A number of checks are to be built on the grounds of the Free Hospital to meet the growing calls for admission—six to patients entering weekly. A large addition to the Muskoka Cottage Sanitarium, estimated to cost over four hundred thousand dollars, is now being completed. The financial responsibilities of the association are heavy, but the trustees are pushing forward the work with faith that the needed funds to meet all demands will be forthcoming.

Night Better Than Day.

London, June 15.—Marconi, referring to February's experiments, which readable messages were received aboard a ship 1500 miles from Cornwall, said that the indications were received at a distance of 2000 miles, said that at distances of over 700 miles signals were transmitted by daylight, while those sent at night remained strong up to a distance of 1500 miles, and were of a much more reliable nature. 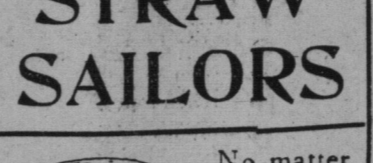
