# DEATH ROLL AT 161 ENQUIRY IS BEGUN INTO CAUSE OF FIRE

Three Little Girls Had Been Playing in Closet in the Basement in Which There Was a Quantity of Lime and Sawdust.

## PUBLIC FUNDS TO BURY UNIDENTIFIED VICTIMS.

CLEVELAND, March 5.-Twentyfour hours after the disaster which swept into eternity approximately one-third of the school children of North Collinwood, the death roll numbered 161. Of these 131 had been identified at 161. Of these 131 had been identified at the Lake Shore morgue, while 30 bodies remain there is a condition of mutilation probably forever beyond the chances of recognition. The work of digging in the ruins of the schoolhouse in further search for remnants of children still missing, began with the break of day. Dawn found mothers and fathers waiting about to find their children's remains at the extemporized and fathers walting about to find their children's remains at the extemporized morgue. But little was brought forth during the day that would satisfy their longings and it is believed to night that all the bodies that can be removed from the ruins have been taken

Arrangements for the funerals of the victims were discussed to-night at a meeting attended by the mayor of Colmeeting attended by the mayor of Collinwood, members of the board of education, the clergy and the undertakers. The idea of having a public funeral of all the dead has been abandoned, althout it is probable that where it can be done bodies will be grouped in one church. The appointment of a relief committee by the Collinwood Board of Trade and town council to-day also is designed to care for the bodies of the unidentified dead, as well as assisting the bereaved parents. Should any of the parents desire to undertake the interment of one of the unrecognizable bundles of human flesh and bones, believing it may be his or her child, they will be permitted to do so. The remainder of the bodies will be laid side by side in the cemetery.

Result of Enquiry.

An investigation conducted by the Collinwood School Board, which lasted far into the night, at which a number of survivors of the herror told their stories, brought forth these facts:

not have its origin in the furnace or from the explosion of the heating boiler, but that it must have started under the stairway leading from the basement to the first floor of the school building. The janitor, Fred Herter, stoutly maintains there was no waste or rubbish there. The officials are trying to executely the name cials are trying to ascertain the names of the three girls who are reported to have been in the basement at the time the fire started and who are said by the janitor to have first noticed

The janitor, Fred Herter, three of whose children perished, declares that as yesterday was comparatively warm, maintained the fires at a lower rate than usual. Fearing he had not sufficiently warmed the building he was on his way to open the furnace drafts when he was met by the three little girls running from the basement, who told him there was a fire below. The school was overcrowded and quarters had been provided for the younger children in the attic. Strange it may seem, more of the pupils

Commenting on the increased prevalence of adenoids, J. Louis Wallace contributes to a recent issue of The Lancet some new ideas as to the etiology of this affection. He notes that it is difficult to find evidence of many cross indicating the previous existence of adenoids among people of 40 years of age and upwards, whereas it seems to be comparatively rare to find a family of children without at least one of its members having suffered from the disease. He took a census in a number of families whose habits he knew with regard to keeping the windows open in the sleeping rooms of their knew with regard to keeping the windows open in the sleeping rooms of their children. He found that of those who kept the windows shut at night there were five families having 26 children in all, and not one of these 26 children had ever suffered from adenoids. While of five families, having 19 children in all, who kept open windows at night thruout the year, eight of these children had suffered from adenoids sufficiently badly to have required operation. The writer is not disposed to lay too much emphasis on the showing of this particular census, but feels that a more complete knowledge on this possible effect of open windows on the growth of adenoids is worthy of further study. At Washington Surgeon-General Walter Wyman of the public health service submitted to Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou a "report of milk in its relation to public health." The report is the result of an investigation ordered by President Roosevelt and conducted by federal experts under the direction of Prof. M. J. Rosenau of the hygienic laboratory. In his introduction to the twenty-two treatises of the experts Dr. Wyman says that "it is recognized that gastro-intestinal disease is the largest single factor determining infant mortality. It has been the object of this work to include all available data showing the influence of milk as a carrier of infection and the measures necessary in consequence."

Dr. Wyman declares that the ideal milk, drawn from a cow with a healthy color and preserved from contamination, is not the milk of commerce, and he cites the fact that samples of market milk in New York showed 35,200,000 bacteria to the cubic centimeter; London 31,888,000. "Dr. Eager." he says, "gives figures to prove that the high infantile mortality may be attributed almost entirely to impure milk."




