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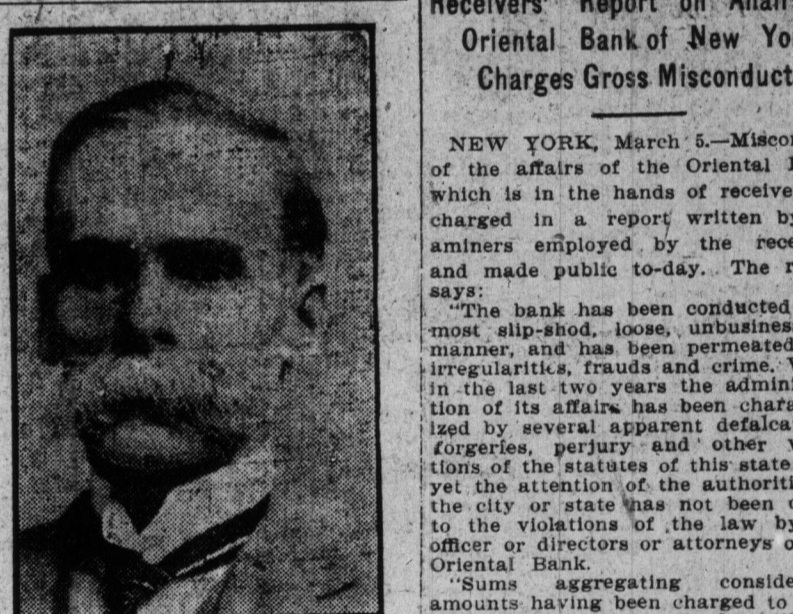

JAPAN AND CHINA SLASH.

PEKIN, March 5.—Japan is threatening force to recover the Japanese steamer Tatsu Maru, which is still retained by China at Huang Pu, on the west river. This vessel was seized at Macao by British customs officers on the charge that the cargo of arms and ammunition was intended for the Chinese revolutionists, who are engaged to sell the arms and ammunition captured from the Russians during the late war, and that she has handed over to ships for the Chinese market no less than 80,000 rifles.

BISHOP BACKS UP NEW PAPER French Papers in Montreal Aroused by Appearance of L'Action Sociale.

MONTREAL, March 5.—(Special.)—An interesting situation has developed in this province over the appearance of the new Quebec clerical newspaper called The Action Sociale, which has been the subject of two other newspapers—Le Soleil (Liberal), and L'Evenement (Conservative). It may be said that L'Action Sociale is the best French newspaper in the country, but up to a few days ago its operations were confined to the district of Quebec, and consequently little attention was paid the organ in Montreal, and as a matter of fact the name of the paper was never uttered in one of the other French papers.

A change, however, took place when the confere opened a branch office in this city.

Then Mr. Bruchesi issued a letter to the clergy and faithful of this district, asking them to subscribe, and otherwise encourage The Action Sociale, and probably for the first time in the history of the city the French newspapers absolutely declined to publish Mr. Bruchesi's letter in their columns.
