

MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

HELD IN THE

SYDENHAM STREET METHODIST CHURCH, KINGSTON.

ORGANIZATION OF CONFERENCE, MAY 28th, 1885.

THE SECOND SESSION of the MONTREAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church was opened in the Sydenham Street Methodist Church, in the City of Kingston, Province of Ontario, on Thursday, May 28th, 1885, at 10 a.m.,—the General Superintendent, Rev. A. CARMAN, D.D., being in the Chair.

The General Superintendent read the 58th chapter of Isaiah and the 12th chapter of the Epistle to the Romans, the Rev. William Galbraith, LL.B., announced the 535th hymn, and the Revs. William Scott and W. H. Graham offered prayer.

The General Superintendent delivered an earnest and practical address, directing the attention of the Conference to various subjects of Connexional importance.

The Secretary, Rev. WILLIAM BLAIR, B.A., then called the Roll, which is as follows. (See Appendices II. and III.)

The Conference Prayer-Meeting was commenced at 11 o'clock and continued till 12.

The General Superintendent directed the Conference to proceed to the election by ballot of a President, whereupon the Rev. LE Roy Hooker was chosen.

The Conference next proceeded to the election of a Secretary. The ballot resulted in the election of Rev. James Allen, M.A.

The Secretary nominated Revs. WILLIAM JACKSON and ALBERT R. ORSER, Assistant Secretaries; and the Rev. WILLIAM PHILP, Journal Secretary.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS.

Your Committee begs leave to report, that a resolution from the Waterloo District, recommending changes in the present Schedules, as issued from the Book Room, has been considered, and, with a view to bringing the matter before the General Conference,

it is respectfully referred to the next Annual Conference.

Finding this year some improvement on the previous year's, but that there are still some cases of incomplete returns, your Committee kindly urges the advisability of having the District Schedules ready for publication before coming to Conference, in which case the Committee on Statistics will be able to present their completed report to the Conference not later than the morning session of the second day.

There is an increase in the total membership of 1,441.

CONTINGENT FUND.

CONSTITUTION.

I. Name.

This Conference shall have a Contingent Fund, as required by Article 479, Sec. 4, of the Discipline, to be called "The Contingent Fund of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church."

II. Object.

The objects of this Fund shall be:

1. To defray the extraordinary expenses incurred in the service of the Church.

2. To relieve cases of special affliction on Circuits.

3. The surplus, if any, to be used as the Conference may direct.

III. Sources of Income.

1. Collections to be taken up on all Circuits and Missions in the month of September in each year.

2. The public collections taken up at each Annual Conference.

IV. Committee.

This Committee shall elect seven Ministers and seven Laymen, who shall be the Contingent Fund Committee for the Conference.

1. It shall be the duty of this Committee to consider all claims properly presented to it, and appropriate to their proper objects the funds placed at their disposal, and report the same in full to the Conference.

2. This Committee shall meet annually at the seat of Conference, at such times as the Conference may direct, and appoint a Chairman and Secretary from among themselves, and recommend a Treasurer and Auditors to be appointed by the Conference.

3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a book in which he shall record the proceedings of all meetings of the Committee, and sign all orders upon the Treasurer which have been authorized

by the Committee.

4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all moneys contributed to this Fund, and make such disbursements as have been authorized by the Committee and signed by the Secretary of the same.

5. It shall be the duty of the Auditors to examine the accounts of the Treasurer annually, and present their report to the Com-

mittee.

V. Regulations.

1. The Financial Secretaries shall pay over the moneys of this Fund to the Annual Conference Treasurer on the day before Conference.

2. All applications for grants from this Fund shall be presented to the Committee by the Chairman of the District from which the claim is made, or by such other person as he may appoint to

represent his District.

3. No application for special claims shall be entertained by this Committee unless they have passed the Fourth Quarterly Official Meeting of the Circuit or Mission, have been signed by the Recording Steward of the same and recommended by the District Meeting. Such claims shall be entertained only from men in the active work.

4. All applications for expenses incurred in the general work, or for claims not otherwise specified, shall be submitted to the

Committee in detail for their investigation and approval.

5. In cases of ministerial supply on account of affliction, where the Circuits are competent the expenses of such supply shall be paid by such Circuits; and in no case shall the Committee consider any claim for more than the salary of a single minister.

CONSTITUTION OF THE LOCAL MISSIONARY BOARD OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

1. The Missionary Board of the Montreal Conference shall consist of the President and Secretary of the Annual Conference, the Superintendents of Districts, and a Treasurer to be appointed by the Conference, one Layman from each District to be appointed by the May District Meeting, as the Discipline directs, and any additional Laymen required to make the number equal to that of the Ministers shall be appointed by the Annual Conference.

2. The Board shall meet at the call of the President as early as practicable after the meeting of the General Missionary Board, and shall appropriate to the missionary work of the Conference the money placed at its disposal by the General Missionary Board.

3. The Board may appoint sub-Committees to transact any special business which may arise between the Annual Meetings of the Board, or to carry out any decisions of the Board in regard to missionary work. All sub-Committees shall report their proceed-

ings to the Board of the Conference for approval or otherwise; but the sub-Committees shall not set aside or interfere with any of the officers in charge by appointment of the Conference, but shall act in concert with such officers.

4. The Treasurer shall remit to the Treasurer of the General Missionary Board all moneys coming into his possession for missionary purposes, or pay the same under direction of the aforesaid Treasurer to persons employed in the missionary work of the Conference.

CHILDREN'S FUND.

CONSTITUTION.

The Fund shall be denominated "The Children's Fund of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church," and is established for the purpose of providing more effectively and uniformly for the payment of the disciplinary allowances of the children of our ministers, and of equalizing the claims for this object of the several Circuits and Missions of our work.

Committee.

The Committee for the management of this Fund shall be composed of the Financial Secretaries, together with a Secretary-Treasurer, to be annually nominated by the Committee and appointed by the Conference. The Committee shall meet annually at the place of holding the Conference, one day previous to its commencement, and at such other times as may be deemed necessary.

It shall be the duty of the Committee:

1. To appoint annually a Chairman to preside at its meetings.

2. To appoint annually two Auditors to examine the accounts

and report to the Committee.

3. To prepare an annual report of the state of the Fund, which, with the Treasurer's report, shall be published in Minutes of Conference.

Income.

1. The income of this Fund shall be raised upon the several Circuits and Missions, according to a vote recommended by the Committee and approved of by the Conference, and this amount shall be the first claim upon the income of each Circuit or Mission.

2. The number of members for which each Circuit or District shall be responsible shall be that returned to the previous Conference, with such alterations only as are caused by the change of boundaries previously sanctioned by the Conference, or such as are exempted by Conference.

3. The Financial Secretaries shall be the Treasurers of the Children's Fund for their respective Districts, and shall make a correct

record in their District books at each May District Meeting, of the name, age and date of birth of each claimant upon the Fund for whom payment is made, a similar record of those whose claims are prospective for the coming year, and the number of members on each Circuit for the past year, and the number of members to be reported to the ensuing Conference.

4. A schedule containing suitable columns for these records, which have been furnished by the Secretary-Treasurer, shall be filled by each Financial Secretary and handed to the Secretary-

Treasurer the day previous to the opening of Conference.

5. The Financial Secretary shall not, at the May District Meeting, place upon the list of prospective claimants the name of any child born after the 15th day of May in the then current year; nor shall any such child be included in the estimates for the ensuing year, nor be paid for by any Treasurer; nor will the claim of any child be admitted whose name was not reported to the Financial Secretary at the previous May District Meeting; nor shall any claimant receive more than eighteen payments.

6. Each minister having children claimants upon this Fund shall, at the Financial District Meeting, furnish the Financial Secretary

with a list of their names, ages, and dates of birth.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee, having carefully examined the condition of the various financial and spiritual interests of the Church, in connection with the work of the past Conference year, has much pleasure in reporting as follows:—

1st. That the various connexional funds have generally been well sustained, and in some instances a considerable increase is reported.

2nd. That by the Divine blessing upon the regular preaching of the Word, and the special evangelistic services held on many Circuits, there is a very considerable increase in Church membership; and that among the subjects of grateful rejoicing in that regard are the continuous manifestations of gracious converting power in connection with the work of the ministry, and the large proportion of our membership who are rejoicing in the clear witness and abounding grace of full salvation.

3rd. That there is a most gratifying increase in the number of our Sabbath-schools, the aggregate attendance of pupils, the circulation of our own periodicals, the volumes in our libraries, the number of pupils who have signed the total abstinence pledge, and, best of all, in the number of conversions among the pupils during the year. A great work for our country, for Methodism, and for the kingdom of Christ, is being done in this department of our labours.

4th. That there is on all our Circuits and Missions a conviction, constantly growing wider and more intense, of the paramount importance of higher education, and an unfaltering determination to perpetuate in our educational policy the union of careful religious instruction and oversight with the most liberal intellectual culture.

5th. That there is cause for devout thanksgiving in the success which has attended the labours of our ministry in the promotion of the passage of the Scott Act; and further, abundant occasion for justifiable pride in the fact that the success of the prohibition campaign throughout the whole Dominion has been so largely due to the aggressive attitude and earnest labours of the Methodist Church

6th. That there is cause for devout thanksgiving in the tidings of prosperity from our Foreign, Domestic, French, and Indian mission fields; and that in the latter, amid the confusion, disaster, and bloodshed of a foolish and wicked rebellion, the Christianity and loyalty of our converted Indians have been so nobly vindicated; and that the providence of Almighty God has guarded the lives of our missionaries and the general interests of our cause.

In conclusion, your Committee respectfully submits the follow-

That, so far as possible, arrangements be made at the Financial District Meetings for revival services on all the Circuits and Missions of each District, and that deputations of the brethren be appointed to assist at the same.

That a deputation consisting of the District Superintendent and two laymen from within the bounds of the District be appointed to visit each Circuit or Mission from which a deficiency is reported for the past year, and confer with the Official Board and the people generally with a view to securing more liberal contributions towards

pastoral support.

That in all political elections held within the bounds of this Conference for the return of members of the House of Commons, our ministers and people shall consider themselves solemnly obligated, in loyalty to the Church and the State, to God and to humanity, to refuse their support to every candidate who is not pledged to maintain in their integrity the laws which guarantee to us the sanctity of the Christian Sabbath, and the right and power to totally prohibit the licensed liquor traffic.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

In submitting the Annual Report your Committee find that gratifying progress has been made in almost every department of our Sabbath-school work.

We note an increase in the number of teachers, Sabbath-school

scholars, and average attendance.

The circulation of our Sabbath-school papers has increased over 30 per cent.; and we find that many more of our schools are using the catechism; still there is great room for improvement in this respect.

We are glad to find that there is a large increase in the amounts

raised for missions and for Sabbath-school purposes.

It is especially gratifying to report a large increase in the number of conversions during the year and in the number meeting in class.

The temperance agitation, which has so stirred the public mind of our country during the year, has evidently found its way into our Sabbath-schools, as we find a good increase in the number of

those who have taken the total abstinence pledge.

Your Committee recommend that where possible our schools be kept open during the whole year, and that an earnest effort be made to introduce our own Sabbath-school literature in all our schools.

We have only one regret, that it is not found possible to organize schools at all our preaching appointments; and wherever it can be done, we would urge the extension of this work.

In summing up the Sabbath-school work of the year we thank

REPORT OF EVANGELISTIC SOCIETY.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE EVANGELISTIC SOCIETY OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH:

Dear Brethren,—At the close of the third year of your Society's existence, your Evangelist, in presenting his report, desires to express his devout gratitude to Almighty God for the mercies vouchsafed. Not an appointment has been missed through ill-health or any other circumstance. The following places have been visited during the year, viz.: Vankleek Hill, Pembroke, North Gower, Dunham, Clarenceville, Granby, Waterloo, South Stukely, Melbourne, Brockville (George Street), Mallorytown, Toledo, North Augusta, Portage du Fort, Ottawa (King Street), Delta, and Winchester Camp-meeting. In every place much good has been done; and in some places remarkable revivals of religion have taken place.

Your Evangelist desires to express his thankfulness to the brethren in charge of the places where he laboured, for the exceeding kindness shown, and the hearty co-operation of the people generally.

He would also mention the great sympathy and interest in his work of the Secretary-Treasurer of the Society, the Rev. A. B. Chambers, LL.B.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The foregoing report was read by the Agent of the Society, and adopted by the Conference.

The Rev. A. B. Chambers, LL.B., read the financial report of the Evangelistic Society, which showed that the Circuits where the

Evangelist had laboured had contributed \$783.40, and the members of the Society \$104, leaving a deficiency on the year's operations of \$181.99.

The following recommendations from the Society were adopted by the Conference:—

1. That the Society be continued. 2. That the Stationing Committee be requested to appoint the Rev. D. Winter Agent of the Society. 3. That the Montreal ministers be a committee to direct the movements of the agent.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

The Church Property Committee respectfully submit the following as their Report on the several cases submitted by the Conference:

REPORT No. I.

MONTREAL DISTRICT.

St. Leonards.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees to sell the old Methodist church in the neighbourhood of St. Leonards, proceeds to be applied to Church improvement on the Montreal Third Circuit.

Huntingdon.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees to sell the parsonage of the Circuit, the proceeds being applied towards the erection of a new parsonage on that Circuit.

Lachute.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees of parsonage lot to sell the same, applying the proceeds towards the reduction of the debt on the church in said Circuit.

Montreal 6th.—Your Committee recommend that the Trustees of the Sherbrooke Street Church be permitted to sell the vacant lot on the N. E. of the church, applying the proceeds towards a reduction of the debt thereon,—the remonstrance from certain of the Trustees having received consideration.

KINGSTON DISTRICT.

Sydenham.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees to sell both parsonages on the Circuit, the proceeds to be applied towards the purchase of another parsonage. Also that the vacant lot be sold, applying proceeds to the parsonage.

Seeley's Bay Circuit—Eatonville Church.—Your Committee recommend that permission be given to the Trustees to sell accord-

ing to the direction given by a joint meeting of the Trustees and the District Committee, or to dispose of it to the Circuit authorities to be used as a parsonage, on condition that the Circuit pay the Trustees the amount of debt now upon the church.

Verona.—Your Committee recommend that permission be given to the Trustees of the late Primitive Methodist Church to sell the same, proceeds being applied towards purchasing a parsonage. Also that permission be given to the Trustees to sell a certain portion of their church lot, proceeds to be applied towards adding to the lot in another direction.

Gananoque.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees of the late M. E. Church to sell the property, proceeds to be applied towards debt on the church now occupied by the united congregation.

Collinsby Circuit—Bath Road Church.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to sell the Bath Road Church, applying the proceeds towards the debt on the parsonage.

Lansdowne West Circuit.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to sell the parsonage property, applying proceeds towards debt.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.

Addison.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees of the late C. M. Church in the village of Addison to dispose of the same, proceeds being applied towards the debt on the church retained for use.

Lyn.—Your Committee cannot recommend the request of the Trustees of this Circuit for permission to sell the late M. E. Church, at all events, until more definite information is furnished as to the disposition of the proceeds.

Frankville and Toledo.—Your Committee recommend that permission be given to sell the late C. M. Church and church lot in the village of Toledo, and apply the proceeds thereof towards the erection of sheds at the Brick Church.

PERTH DISTRICT.

Pakenham.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees to sell the old parsonage, proceeds being applied towards the debt on the new parsonage.

Arnprior.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to sell the late M. E. Church and parsonage; also a church in McNab township. Proceeds of each sale to be applied towards a new parsonage on the Circuit.

Lombardy.—Your Committee recommend that permission be given to sell or dispose of part of the parsonage lot in the village in exchange for other church or parsonage property.

OTTAWA DISTRICT.

Carp.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to sell the South Line Church, proceeds of sale being applied towards the parsonage on the Circuit—the letter from Mr. Ashfield against the sale having been considered.

Billings' Bridge and Nepean.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees to sell the former M. E. Church at Britannia to Mr. John McAmmond, for the sum of \$125, to cover his claim on the said property.

Ottawa (Metropolitan Church).—Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution in this matter, viz:

"Your Committee deeply regret that it is found necessary to recommend the Conference to grant permission for the sale of the Metropolitan Church in the City of Ottawa. While recommending that permission, the Committee disapprove of the measures followed by the Trustees of the said Church with a view to accomplish their purpose to sell. Impatient to relieve themselves from pecuniary responsibility, and indifferent to the interests of united Methodism, they have ignored the action of the united Official Boards of the Methodist Church in Ottawa, and have disregarded the opinions and proposals of the last Annual Conference, which were reiterated and confirmed by the Special Committee of the Conference last The sincere and persistent efforts of the President of the Conference and Superintendent of the Ottawa District to afford relief and save the property were contravened; and therefore, the Committee recommend that before the seal of the Conference and the signature of the President and Secretary of Conference be attached to the instrument of permission to sell, the accounts of the Trustees of the said Church shall be submitted to competent Auditors, selected by the Rev. William Hansford, at present of Ottawa; and any balance after paying all just indebtedness on the premises shall be paid over to the proper authorities as provided by the Basis of Union."

Your Committee further recommend that a copy of the foregoing be sent by the Secretary of Conference to the Trustees of said Church, who shall report to the Secretary of Conference their compliance with the foregoing.

It was on motion Resolved to amend the Report of the Memorial Committee on the Metropolitan Church, Ottawa, as follows:—

"And further, that the report of the said Auditors be submitted to the Conference Special Committee next fall."

MATILDA DISTRICT.

Chesterville Circuit.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees of the parsonage of the late M. E.

Church to sell the same, applying the proceeds to the payment of

debts due thereon, and on the late M. E. Church.

Also that permission be given to the Trustees of a building lot belonging to the late C. M. Church to sell the same, applying the proceeds towards the payment for land recently purchased.

Also that permission be granted to the Trustees of the late C. M.

Church to sell the same.

West Winchester Circuit.—Your Committee recommend that permission be given to the Trustees of the late M. E. Church to sell the same, applying the proceeds towards debt on new church.

Also that the Trustees be permitted to sell the Brick Church when the new church is completed, applying the proceeds towards the

debt on the new church.

Also that the Trustees of the Stone Church have permission to deed to the Municipality of Winchester a strip of the church lot twelve feet wide, extending the whole length of the lot, along St. Lawrence Street, for the purpose of widening said street: provided that such deed be not executed unless all the property holders on both sides of St. Lawrence Street, from Church Street to the centre of the concession, convey a strip twelve feet wide from their properties fronting on St. Lawrence Street to the said Municipality, thus joining in a general movement for widening said street.

Aultsville Circuit.—Your Committee recommend that the Trustees of the late M. E. Church be permitted to sell the building and contents, (not the land), applying the proceeds to any repairs re-

quired on the church retained.

Also that permission be granted to the Trustees of the late M. E. parsonage to sell the same, applying the proceeds to pay the debt thereon, and the balance to be divided between the Aultsville and Gallinger congregations in the proportion in which each congregation contributed to the erection of such parsonage, and to be used for parsonage purposes only.

Matilda Circuit.—Your Committee cannot recommend the sale of the Rose Church, as the application for the disposing of the funds arising from such sale is not in accordance with the terms of

the Basis of Union.

Iroquois Circuit.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees of the late M. E. Church to sell the church and also the parsonage, the proceeds being applied, in the first place, towards paying all debts on the properties sold, and then on those retained for use; the balance to be divided equally, and paid to the Trustees of the Iroquois Circuit and Matilda Circuit; the expense of shingling the Iroquois parsonage not to be included as a debt; and that the amount allotted to the Iroquois Circuit be requested to be paid over to the Trust Relief Fund.

Cardinal Circuit.—Your Committee recommend that the Trus-

tees of the late M. E. Church at Ventnor have permission to sell the same, applying the proceeds towards the payment of the existing debt, and the balance towards the erection of a new parsonage

Morrisburg Circuit.—Your Committee recommend that the Trustees of the late M. E. Church be permitted to sell the same, applying the proceeds thereof towards the debt thereon.

Also that no action be taken at present with reference to the

church lot at Mariatown.

PEMBROKE DISTRICT.

Beachburg.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to sell the property of the late M. E. Church in the village, applying the proceeds, first, to pay the debts on both properties, the balance to repair or enlarge the other Methodist Church in the village; they also recommend that the parsonage be sold and \$50 given to the Cobden Circuit, applying the balance towards a new parsonage on the property of the late C. M. Church.

Renfrew.—Your Committee recommend that permission be given to the Trustees of the late M. E. parsonage in Horton, to sell the same, applying the proceeds equally between a parsonage for Haley's Station, and repairs and improvements in connection with the Horton Church.

Your Committee also recommend that permission be given for the sale of one of the Methodist Churches, applying the proceeds towards the debt of the other.

Portage du Fort.—Your Committee recommend that permission be granted to sell the church at Blackwell, applying the proceeds towards the church at Ross.

Cobden and Locksley.—Your Committee recommend that permission be given to the Trustees for the sale of the parsonage formerly used by the German Mission, applying proceeds towards the Cobden parsonage.

ST. LAWRENCE CENTRAL CAMP GROUND.

Your Committee have had before them the memorial from the Trustees, and having given careful consideration to the verbal statements made to them by several of the Trustees, submit for the approval of the Conference the following:—

1st. That your Committee, having fully considered the memorial of the Trustees of the St. Lawrence Central Camp Ground, and heard from the Trustees the present financial condition of the Institution, and the moral and spiritual result hitherto apparent from the enterprise, your Committee recommend the Conference to give to the Trustees its moral support, and, as far as practicable, to render such aid as will enable them to carry forward their enterprise to a successful issue, entertaining as we do the opinion that

2nd. Your Committee recommend the Conference to regard the St. Lawrence Central Camp Ground as eminently fitted by its situation to become henceforth a Camp Ground where, annually, meetings shall be held for the revival of religion, and the holding of an Annual Sunday-school Parliament, and for the advancement of Temperance legislation; that a Committee be appointed by the Conference to carry into effect these resolutions, and it is recommended that the Superintendent of the Brockville District be Chairman of the Camp Ground Camp Meeting Committee.

3rd. That with a view to bring the property of the St. Lawrence Central Camp Ground under the direct control and supervision of the Montreal Conference, your Committee recommend that a Committee be appointed, consisting of the Rev. W. I. Shaw, and A. L. Morden, Esq., whose duty it shall be to consider and determine on the course necessary to be taken, in order to place the title of the estate on Trustees to be appointed by the Conference, and who as such may obtain legislative incorporation in such form as the case may require. The said Committee to report not later than the Conference of 1886, or to report to the President of the Conference, if the said Committee agree to apply to the next meeting of the Ontario Legislature for incorporation.

That in the prosecution of his work he has reported to this Committee that \$3,882 has been secured in cash and subscriptions from the following localities, viz.:—Kingston, \$1,125; Montreal, \$976; Ottawa, \$340; Prescott, \$400; Morrisburg, \$550; West Winchester, \$70; Iroquois, \$125; Lynn, \$58; Mallorytown, \$138; Sherbrooke, \$40; Lennoxville, \$10; Pembroke, \$50; total, \$3,882 (not including Mr. Mavety's list). It is the judgment of your Committee that a further sum of at least \$9,000 should be collected during the year within the bounds of this Conference, with the distinct understanding that the work is to be prosecuted on the line of the plan of the General Conference Special Committee.

Your Committee recommend that the Stationing Committee appoint an agent, to give as much time as possible to this work, and that during his absence from his Circuit a suitable supply be furnished.

Your Committee further recommend that the prompt and hearty co-operation of the several Superintendents of the Circuits be given to the agent in the prosecution of his work.

Your Committee also recommend that the Rev. J. E. Mavety be requested to secure all the available funds for the old subscription list of the Kingston Third Church.

QUEBEC DISTRICT.

Levis.—Your Committee recommend that the Trustees of the church on this Circuit have permission to sell the same, applying the proceeds as follows:—Two-thirds of the same to be given to be Church in Quebec, and the other three to be paid to the Trust Relief Fund.

Windsor Mills.—Your Committee recommend that the Trustees of the church on this Circuit have permission to sell the same, applying the proceeds towards the erection of a church in a more suitable place.

Sherbrooke.—Your Committee recommend that the Trustees of the church on this Circuit have permission to dispose of the church and parsonages, the proceeds to be applied towards the erection of more suitable buildings.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE TO THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

Your Committee appointed "to enquire, about the Christmas holidays, into the working expenses of the College, and if it be found that there is a prospect of a deficiency at the end of the year, to combine in one person the offices of Governor and Prin-

cipal for the following year" (see Minutes of Conference p. 32), beg leave to report:

1. At the call of the President of the Conference they met in the City of Montreal, on Tuesday, the 15th of January last, and

passed the following resolution, viz.:

"That, believing that the intention of the Conference was to carry out the suggestions and wishes of the Trustee Board of Stanstead College as expressed in a resolution adopted by the Board, (see Minutes of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada p. 51,) appointing a Committee "to make arrangements for securing the proper person, and uniting in him the offices of Governor and Principal after this year;" and believing that it was the intention of the Conference that this Committee afterwards appointed (see Minutes of Conference, p. 32) should be empowered to secure the services of a suitable person in whom to unite the offices of Governor and Principal, this Committee does hereby undertake to perform such duty to the best of its ability."

2. Your Committee found that the Trustees had already, for financial reasons, accepted the resignation of the Governor, and had assigned the duties of the Governor to the Principal for the balance of the present scholastic year; and believing that it was the intention of the Conference to empower this Committee to make the changes recited in the resolution for the current year, if necessary, as well as for the next, your Committee confirmed by resolutions the action of the Trustees, believing the same to be necessary.

3. Your Committee found, on investigation, that, under the dual administration, there was a prospective deficiency of over \$900. In their judgment it was necessary and expedient that hereafter the offices of Governor and Principal should be united in

one person, who should reside in the College.

4. Your Committee communicated with the Rev. A. Lee Holmes, M.A., for the purpose of ascertaining whether he would be willing to accept the position of Governor and Principal, with residence in the College, for the year 1885-6.

Mr. Holmes' final reply was that, owing to the ill-health of his family, it would be impossible for him to assume the duties of the combined offices or to reside in the College, and that he must

decline the position.

f

5. Your Committee then corresponded with others, and finally offered the position to the Rev. Dr. Kennedy, of Sackville, at a salary of \$600, with board and residence for four, and educational facilities such as the College may afford for two.

6. Dr. Kennedy has accepted the position, subject to the action of the Stationing Committee and ratification of the Conference.

ANNUAL REPORT OF STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

The Trustees of the Stanstead Wesleyan College, in presenting their Annual Report, are glad to inform the Conference that the results of the year are, on the whole, gratifying.

The Principal's Report shows that the number of pupils enrolled

in all departments during the year has been 122.

The progress of the students has been very satisfactory. A large number have obtained diplomas as teachers, and, in nearly every case, of the first class in their respective grades.

The health of the inmates of the College during the year has been exceptionally good, and is an occasion of gratitude to your

Trustees.

The financial statements supplied by the Governor, Mr. Saunders, and the Principal, Mr. Holmes, show that, after applying the income from the Endowment Fund and the Government Grant on Current Expense Acount, the expenses exceeded the revenue for the first part of the year by about \$200, and that, as the result of retrenchments effected at about the time of the Christmas holidays, the revenue has exceeded the expense during the last part of the year by about the same sum; so that on the work of the whole year, the Conference will be pleased to learn, it is reasonably certain there will be, if no surplus, at any rate no deficit.

DEBT.

The total present debt of the College, including principal, and interest accruing, is \$12460, while the available subscriptions cannot safely be estimated at over \$500. The Trustees regret that the debt is so large. They have done their utmost to entirely liquidate it, but the large sums of money annually consumed in interest and the constantly recurring annual deficits in the current finances of the College, which have had largely to be provided for out of the Debt Fund, have rendered it impracticable. The Trustees have given the question of the debt their serious consideration, and now desire the earnest attention of the Conference to the same subject.

If the debt could be at once paid it would be a benediction, and would secure for the College a future of great usefulness; but if it is inexpedient to make such an effort at the present time, then the interest charges must, in some way, be provided for.

The Trustees, therefore, submit for your consideration the fol-

lowing resolution adopted by the Board, viz:—

"Whereas the total indebtedness, interest and principal, of the College is said to be \$12460.46; and

"Whereas the annual interest is said to be \$822, and

"Whereas there is no apparent available income with which to meet the annual charge, and

"Whereas it is essential to the existence of the College that the

annual interest obligations be promptly met; therefore,

"Resolved,—That we respectfully request the Conference to give its sanction and assistance to the formation of an Interest Guarantee Fund, whereby at least one hundred and fifty shares of \$8 each, payable half-yearly, for a term of three years, can be subscribed in order to provide the payment of the interest charges on the debt at present existing."

The present face value of the unpaid Subscription List is \$5407.62, and of this amount it is hoped that a fair proportion can be collected during the next year.

ENDOWMENT INVESTMENT FUND.

The Conference will be glad to learn that we have already invested in good solid securities the sum of \$13566.73, yielding a revenue of \$825.23. To this must be added the sum of \$1684.09 awaiting investment, making a total of invested funds of \$15250.82,

which will yield an income of \$926.27.

The Governor, the Rev. Dr. Saunders, felt, during the year, that it was necessary for him to resign; and the Trustees felt that, in view of the financial condition of the College, no course was open to them but to accept the resignation, and to transfer the responsibilities and duties of the office of Governor to the Principal, who consented to discharge them for the balance of the scholastic year.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE.

In the changes in the staff, which have been necessitated by adopting the principle that hereafter the offices of Governor and Principal must be united in one person, and he be resident in the College, the Trustees report that the Rev. A. Lee Holmes has felt unable to comply with the conditions of the appointment, and, after twelve years of faithful service, he ceases to be the Principal.

As you have been advised by the Report of the Special Committee, the position of Governor and Principal has been offered to the Rev. Dr. Kennedy, of Sackville, N. B., and has been accepted by him, subject to your ratification; and with a view to increasing the attractiveness of the College as a home for young ladies, Mrs. Kennedy is to become the head of the Domestic Department.

Other changes have been made which, it is believed, will materially strengthen the staff, particularly in Music and French.

The Course of Study has also been revised, and such changes made as the Trustees believe will, without impairing the efficiency of the College, keep, so far as the ordinary expenses are concerned, the annual expenditure within the income.

The Trustees now deem it their duty to call the attention of the Conference to the material condition of the College buildings. By reason of lapse of time and limited expenditure in past years, the building has necessarily suffered, and repairs, more or less extensive, should now be made. The following resolution, unanimously adopted by the Trustees, is therefore submitted for the consideration of the Conference.

"Resolved,—That we deem it our duty to inform the Conference that we cannot reasonably hope for the enlarged patronage so necessary to the success of the College, unless the Board be enabled to make considerable changes and improvements in the heating apparatus and sanitary arrangements, as well as various repairs on the College building. And we therefore respectfully request the Conference to favour the Trustee Board with definite instructions touching said improvements and the measures for meeting the necessary outlay."

Your Trustees have had their attention frequently directed to the desirableness of a radical change in the character of the College, and although they are by no means prepared to express an opinion that changes are either expedient or necessary, yet they submit for the consideration of the Conference the following resolution which was adopted at a Special Meeting of the Board, held in Montreal on 15th of January last:—

"That the Trustees are of opinion that the question of changing Stanstead Wesleyan College from a mixed school, as at present conducted, to a Ladies' College, which has been discussed by the Trustees to-day, is one which deserves the serious consideration of the Montreal Conference at its next session."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.

Your Committee, having had under consideration the several memorials referred to them, beg leave to submit the following report:—

1. The memorial of the Rev. William Scott, respecting the future of the Oka Indians. After a lengthy conversation, the following resolution was passed:

"Resolved,—That this Committee are not in possession of sufficient data to recommend the Conference to grant the prayer of the memorial."

2. The memorial of the Montreal District, concerning the formation of a Home Mission for Montreal. Your Committee recommend the Conference to adopt the prayer of the memorial,

with the exception of the request of a thousand dollars from the Missionary Board. Your Committee recommend that the sum asked for be only five hundred dollars.

(The report of the Committee was amended so as to read one

thousand dollars instead of five hundred dollars.)

3. Memorial from the Kingston District, concerning the relationship of children to the Church. Your Committee recommend the Conference to adopt the prayer of the memorial; and that the Conference request the Ministers to give special attention to the carrying out of the directions of *Discipline* (pp. 37, 38), in this regard.

4. Touching the memorial from the Pembroke District, on University Federation, your Committee beg leave to report that they do not see their way clear to recommend any course of action, owing to the very unsettled state of opinion on this subject.

(The report, as amended, was adopted by the Conference.)

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT.

The Committee recommend that the following method of entertaining the Conference shall be observed:—

1. The local Billeting Committee, under the direction of the pastor or pastors of the place where the Conference is held, shall

ascertain how many billets in private houses are available.

2. Having determined what will be the probable attendance at Conference, as indicated by the attendance of previous years, arrangements will be made on the most favourable terms for securing for such members of Conference as may not be entertained gratuitously in private houses, accommodation in suitable hotels and boarding-houses. This accommodation shall be at the charge of the Billeting Committee.

3. To meet the aforesaid charge, there shall be levied equally upon all attending Conference such an assessment as may be necessary. Such assessment to be paid to the Secretary of the Billeting Committee immediately upon the arrival of the delegate

at the seat of Conference.

4. As early as possible in the month of May the Committee shall send a circular to every minister, informing him of the

amount of the assessment.

5. Copies of this circular shall be sent to the Superintendents of Districts, to be delivered by the District Secretary to the laymen elected to attend Conference, immediately after said election.

6. A printed list of billets shall, as heretofore, be sent to

HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

Resolved,—That in view of the very defective provision for the comfort and treatment of the insane in the Province of Quebec, as testified to by several experts, and long felt to be a very serious grievance, especially to the Protestant community, this Conference desires to express its deep interest in the efforts now being made by the promoters of the Protestant Hospital for the Insane, of the City of Montreal, and trusts these gentlemen will not relax their endeavours until an Institution in which the patients shall have the benefit of the most recent therapeutic skill, and the solace of such religious consolation as they prefer, shall be an accomplished fact.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Moved by the Rev. A. B. Chambers, seconded by the Rev. William Ryan, and

Resolved,—That in the judgment of this Conference the legislation of the General Conference held in Hamilton, A.D. 1882, re the Superannuation Fund, was not, and cannot be regarded as retro-active.

MUTILATION OF THE CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT.

Moved by the Rev. D. V. Lucas, M.A., seconded by the Rev. Dr.

Douglas, and

Resolved,—That we, the ministers and laymen of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church, representing Methodism throughout the Province of Quebec and the eastern portion of the Province of Ontario, assembled in annual Conference at the City of Kingston, being deeply impressed with the baneful effects of the sale of alcohol in the form of beverage, and always in sympathy with any measures calculated to restrict or prohibit the sale of such beverage, and having confidence in the Canada Temperance Act of 1878 as a measure wisely framed for this end, desire to express our very great regret that our legislators of the Canadian Senate should have passed a resolution looking towards the exemption of certain alcoholic compounds from the prohibitory operations of the said Canada Temperance Act.

And we desire further to express our sincere hope that the House of Commons, composed of the people's chosen representatives, may not concur in the proposed change which would in our opinion

virtually destroy the Act as a prohibitory measure.

Seeing the Canada Temperance Act has been so fully endorsed by the people of Canada as to have been successfully carried in sixty-five out of seventy-five contests, and to have received in its favour a majority of 45,000 out of an aggregate vote of 200,000, we would regard such a measure as proposed by the Senate, if concurred in by the House, as a direct thrust at the most valued element of political liberty, viz., legislation in harmony with the will of the majority.

For the reasons stated, and from a sense of duty to our country, our families and those under our pastoral care, we pledge ourselves to oppose with determined purpose, and with all the influence and power we possess, any attempt made by our legislators or others to destroy or injure an Act in the adoption of which, by so many counties and cities in Canada our people and ourselves have so largely co-operated at very considerable sacrifice of time and con-

venience.

We cannot think that our representatives in Parliament will be so far forgetful of the duty which they owe to their constituents as to concur in the very objectionable measure proposed. If, however, such a calamity should befall our present temperance movement as their concurrence would bring, we shall feel that those who have deliberately set themselves against so clear a manifestation of the popular will, are unworthy of the honourable position of legislators for a free and enlightened people, and shall govern ourselves accordingly in the time to come.

BILLETING OF CONFERENCE.

Resolved,—That henceforth the Billeting Committee of this Conference billet as many members of the Conference as possible in the usual way, and that accommodation be provided in private houses and hotels for the remaining members, at a stipulated rate, and that the amount necessary to pay the board of those not freely billeted be assessed pro rata upon all the members attending.

EQUALIZATION OF STIPENDS.

Moved by the Rev. Wm. Scott, seconded by Dr. Lavell, and

Resolved,—That the Conference desires to express its thankfulness to Dr. Sutherland for calling our attention to a possible proposition for the purpose of diminishing the inequalities of ministerial income on the principle of levelling up, and whatever form of sustenation may be adopted, this Conference sincerely trusts that some plan will be adopted by the General Conference to lessen the burdens which have been borne by many, and that thereafter there shall be a reasonable equalization of missionary and ministerial salaries.

The following resolution which passed the Conference last year was reaffirmed and ordered to be printed in the minutes.

Moved by the Rev. T. G. Williams, and seconded by Rev. George

McRitchie,—

That inasmuch as in many parts of the Dominion of Canada the Protestant population is unable to maintain in each locality the ministers necessary to supply each separate denomination there represented with the Gospel without aid from the mission funds of the Churches; and whereas in many places one minister could supply the Gospel ordinances to people now divided into separate congregations, thus avoiding unnecessary expenditure of missionary money and a waste of ministerial force, therefore

Resolved,—That this Conference appoint a Committee whose duty it shall be to confer with any Committee or Committees which may be appointed by the other Conferences of the Methodist Church, or by the Courts of other Protestant Churches, for the purpose of preparing a plan to submit to the General Conference of the Methodist Church and the proper Courts of the other Churches appointing such Committees, by which the consolidation of the forces of our common Protestantism may be effected and our resources husbanded for the more economical and, at the same time, more extended prosecution of the work of God among the people residing in those sections of our Dominion where the denominations there represented are not able separately to support the minister among them.

The following Committee was appointed in harmony with the

foregoing resolution:-

The President of the Conference, Revs. T. G. Williams, Wm. Scott, J. E. Mavety, Geo. McRitchie, Wm. Hansford.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Board of the Superannuation Fund, and unanimously recommended to the several Annual Conferences for their adoption and for publication in the Minutes of the Conferences:-

1. Resolved,—That the names and addresses of the Treasurers of the Fund be published in the Minutes of each Annual Conference, the names and addresses of the Superannuated Ministers and of all widows who are claimants on the Fund; also the names and dates of birth of all children of deceased ministers whose widows are now claimants on the Fund (the children being under sixteen years of age), be published in the Minutes of the Conferences to which they respectively belong.

2. That each Annual Conference forward to the Clerical Treasurer, through its Secretary, immediately at the close of the Conference, a certified copy of the tables containing the amounts raised for Ministerial Support and Connexional collections on each Circuit and Mission, omitting the Children's Fund, and any special

MODE OF EXAMINATION FOR THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE

Candidates of our ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of Candidates shall be held in each District, under the supervision of the Chairman and the Examiners resident on the District, on the third Wednesday in April in each year; and at such place as the Chairman shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairman not later than the second Wednesday in April in each year. The answers to the papers shall be sent by the Chairman to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman of each District the name of any Candidate or Probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he has attained, but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the Candidate or Probationer has completed it; and, further, no certificate shall be issued unless the Candidate has reached the passing point of thirty-five per cent. in all subjects, except in cases where the papers have failed to come to hand.

That the Conference direct that existing regulations relating to the time and manner of examinations be imperatively observed, and more especially that it be deemed absolutely peremptory that the examinations be held on the same day throughout the whole Conference, and that all the young men in any District writing on any given subject write at the same hour.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE

MINISTERS OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE

TO THE

MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH UNDER THEIR CARE.

Dearly Beloved Brethren,—Assembled in the ancient City of Kingston (the historic Fort Frontenac of early French occupation), and holding our sessions in a noble church erected by the untiring energy and far-seeing wisdom of the Rev. Dr. Rice, who so lately was summoned from the duties of Senior General Superintendent of our consolidated Methodism to the rest that remaineth for the peop'e of God, we send you warmest Christian greetings. While we would remind you that we are appointed as "overseers of the flock," we remind ourselves that we are "your servants for Jesus' sake."

The Insurrection in the North-West has brought two things to the surface: 1st. The fidelity of all our Methodist Indians; 2nd. The exuberant loyalty of our Canadian people. In the Minutes of our proceedings will be found devout acknowledgments of the mercy of God, who hath, in a measure, restored peace to us; our tender sympathy with the wounded and bereaved; and our hearty admiration of the bravery and endurance of our volunteer soldiers, who so vigorously responded to their country's call, and exposed their lives in the high places of the field.

Within the immediate borders of our own Conference this has been a year of peace; of prosperity also, as the increase of over 1,400 in our membership clearly indicates.

The Union so happily consummated twelve months ago has borne abundant fruit, and by degrees the new circuit arrangements are being happily adjusted. In many places gracious revivals have added to the Church, and indicated the Divine approval. During the year some churches, whose retention was not deemed desirable, have been sold. By this means and by the Trust Relief Fund—

which we hope will yet be largely augmented—many Trustees have been relieved from threatened loss.

While we counsel you, if you would "keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace," to avoid the rancour of party politics, we beseech you to "have no fellowship with the works of darkness;" and solemnly to avail yourselves of every influence—social, religious, and political—by which the cause of God may be advanced.

Making the franchise—the fruit and symbol of your civil freedom—a subject of thanksgiving to the Almighty and of fervent prayer, strike with all the energy of the ballot the enemies of God and humanity, so that it shall come to pass that no man whose course on the Sanctity of the Sabbath and the Liquor Question is hostile or uncertain, shall be your representative in the highest councils of the nation.

The Rev. George Meacham, D.D., and the Rev. Charles S. Eby, D.D., two of your honoured and successful Missionaries from Japan, are now home on furlough. Abundant labours there, in evangelizing and training native helpers, have necessitated at least temporary rest. In their absence, four male and two female missionaries "hold the fort." Miss Spencer and Miss Cartmell are the pioneers of our noble Woman's Missionary Society. Your increasing contributions to this and to our other missions show the enlarging of your sympathetic help. Can we not this year aim at carrying out the modest suggestion of our Missionary Secretary of "one cent a day from every member of the Church?"

Two millions, nearly, of French Canadians, increasing in rapid ratio, imperil the existence of many of our feeble Protestant settlements in the Province of Quebec. Heroic are the efforts of the small band of devoted and persecuted evangelists under our enthusiastic brother, the Rev. Louis N. Beaudry. The Conference has determined further to aid these workers by the employment of colporteurs during the present year.

We congratulate the Church on the growing efficiency of our Educational Institutions. Victoria University still lives in the loyal interest and confidence of our people, and is blessing our country with the inestimable benefits of a high education based upon Christian truth and principle. In the consideration of the future relations of the institution to the University system of Ontario, it is expected that such conclusions will be reached as will be honourable and satisfactory to our Church.

The Wesleyan Theological College, in Montreal, is manifestly growing in the favour and confidence of both our ministers and laity. To theological students it is becoming increasingly attrac-

We regard with confidence the labours of its instructors as aiming at combining with an earnest, practical, Christian spirit, unswerving loyalty to the doctrines of Methodism. The institution is, we believe, of great benefit to the Church in taking its place with kindred institutions of three other evangelical Churches as a witness for the truth in the great commercial and tropolis of the Dominion.

The Stanstead Wesleyan College, we should not forget, is to be regarded by us with special interest and liberality, as the responsibility of its management now completely devolves upon the Montreal Conference. We trust that it will receive from our people the increased patronage and support which its thorough educational work deserves.

Let us in this age of materialism and "science falsely so called," induce as many bright-minded youths as possible to gain that serene summit of a Christian education on which men may lift up their heads above the enemies of the truth round about.

Many of the older members of our Church have watched with deep interest and satisfaction the growth and prosperity of our Book and Publishing House in Toronto, with its branches in Montreal and Halifax.

Consecrated to the development of intelligence and piety, this establishment has done a great work during the past half century. The Methodist Magazine, Christian Guardian, Banner, Missionary Outlook, with numerous Sunday School Publications better adapted for our schools than the productions of any rival house, and a multitude of such works as would have gladdened the heart of our venerable Founder, issue in an ever-increasing volume to enrich our land. Those homes where our connexional paper is a weekly visitor are kept informed about every living question which affects our Church; are cheered with accounts of revival in our own and other communions; and are furnished with news of our doings which can come to them through no other channel. As you would drive from your tables tainted food, so, dear brethren, keep from your family circles pernicious literature. See what books and papers your children read. Provide them with the best. would not have them polluted and poisoned.

"Forsake not the assembling of yourselves together." Remember that reverence for God is the foundation of all acceptable worship. Cultivate a cheerful piety. Consecrate your substance and yourselves to the Lord. Band together for aggressive effort. "All at it, and always at it," was a combination of words that used to describe the early Methodists. Let it be also true of us. The
