GERMANS ADVANCING—GERMANS WEAKENING

Enemy Giving Ground Northeast of Ypres—Italians Have Occupied 37 Villages

London, June 1.—The British troops are advancing on St. Julien, according to a message from the correspondent of the Daily Mail in Northern France. The German line is said to be greatly weakened and is giving ground northeast of Ypres before vigorous attacks which have been preceded by an effective bombardment of their trenches.

They have made desperate efforts to hold their positions and are said to have been ordered by the German headquarters staff to hold their ground at any cost. The correspondent says that the ground the Germans won a month ago is gradually being pierced at various points.

OCCUPY 37 VILLAGES

Udine, Italy, June 1.—Italian troops have occupied thirty-seven villages surrounding Corina, in the Ampezzo Valley.

ITALIANS PUT AUSTRIANS TO FLIGHT

Rome, June 1.—The following official statement of the operations was issued last night: "The advance of our troops beyond the Triento frontier continues and we have occupied the important heights of the mountain of S. Pietro, upon which the Austrians were on top of a certain fortification. On the afternoon of the 26th, a heavy engagement took place on the mountain of S. British Submarine's Visit Causes Terror—The Queen Elizabeth at Gibraltar—French Teach German Consul a Lesson

Athens, June 1.—The latest address from Constantinople is that the latter cruiser Saitid Selim, formerly the Saitid, has been virtually dismantled.

Recent developments at the Dardanelles are described as having cast a gloom over the Turkish capital, where a strong current of opinion is in favor of opening the straits and negotiating for peace.

During the recent British submarine raid in the Sea of Marmara, and off Constantinople, there was a condition of panic in the city. The people shouted that the Russians were coming, and vessels were hastily withdrawn to the far end of the Golden Horn. Troops on board transports were disembarked, and some guns were fired at the submarine.

Hellas and Greece continue to arrive at Dedeagach by rail. They report that Constantinople was raided by this raid.

One of the results was the dispatch of all the troops available to the Dardanelles.

The Queen Elizabeth.

New York, June 1.—The British super-dreadnought Queen Elizabeth is having her guns repaired and relined in Gibraltar. She had a number of shot holes in her funnels and in the superstructure, but none affecting her fighting power.

Shipping business at St. John is unusually active for the season of the year. The war has not seriously affected business in New Brunswick.

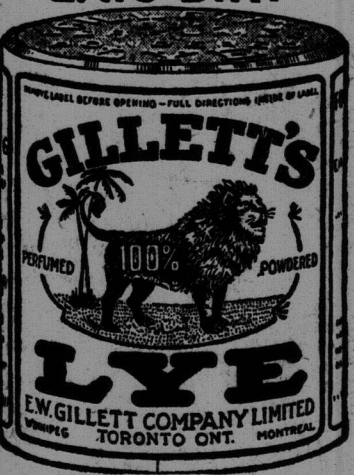
The citizens of St. John want the Princess street car service resumed without delay. Disputes can be settled without putting the people to any inconvenience.

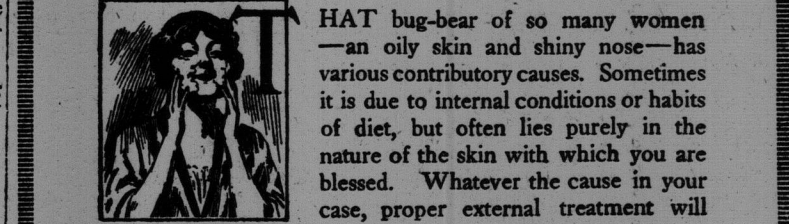

GERMANY'S POLICY UNJUSTIFIED

In the note of February 10 to Germany we had intimated that any sacrifice of American lives or ships in the war was one which would not be made. It is not admitting that neutral powers were renitent to the extent of being at fault, it may be said that they would have been justified in going much farther in February and March than they actually did go at that time in protesting against the proposed use of mines and submarines. The waters in which Germany undertook to operate were not British, but a part of the high seas, open for free and peaceful use, to the whole world. Many hundreds of vessels belonging to Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Holland were accustomed to use those waters. The commerce of South America, as well as of North America, was also affected. It might now be wished that a joint protest of the most vigorous kind, from all neutral nations, had been drafted and sent to the German government in February or March. That the policy was wholly wrong, irrespective of Germany's provocation, must be admitted by all clear-thinking people.—From 'The Progress of the World' in the American Review of Reviews for June.

TYPHUS DEATHS IN SERBIA WILL TOTAL 100,000

Already Three Quarters Of That Number Recorded

WORLD'S HELP IS NEEDED

Doctors Wanted and Medical Supplies Sadly Lacking—Some Canadian Red Cross Notes

Toronto, June 1.—For three months all Serbia has been one great charnel house of death and dying. Deaths to date have reached a grand total of 75,000. Through the epidemic of typhus is now declared to be under control, it is freely admitted that a grim harvest of 100,000 human beings will have been reaped before it can be entirely stamped out. When the war broke out there were all Serbia, with a population of 5,000,000 people, only 800 doctors. The service of all these had to go at once to the army, leaving the civilian population without medical help. Of this heroic little band of doctors, one-third have already fallen victims to the epidemic.

Women—Give up chocolates, bon-bons of all kinds, ice cream and soda water, and get down to self-sacrifice for one day.
Children—Give up candy, etc.
Families—Live on Belgian fare on the day of self-denial.
Then after these things are done, the men, women and children of St. John are asked to put the money thus saved into self-denial boxes, one of which will be placed before June 8 in every home and public place in our city.
These little boxes, with their mute appeal for the homeless, starving Belgians, will, it is hoped, be well filled as a result of self-denial practised by each member of the household, in which it is placed. The ladies, who leave the boxes will call for them on Friday and the contents of all counted, when it is earnestly hoped a substantial sum will be realized for the thousands of women and children in Belgium, who, today, stretch forth their gaunt, emaciated hands for the scraps thrown them by their cruel oppressors—the German soldiery.

A CANADIAN EXPERIMENT

The departure of H. R. MacMillan, Chief Forester of British Columbia, for Japan, China, India and Australia, as a special trade agent of the department of trade and commerce emphasizes a new sphere of activity for a Canadian forester. If the quest for new trade outlets for the British Columbia lumber mills proves successful, it will indicate a versatility of talent which the curriculum of forest schools perhaps did not take into account. Although Mr. MacMillan is the best Canadian state forester to put his shoulder to the selling end of forest production, the practice of thus using experts in some of the United States forest branches has been recognized for some time past.

(Halifax Echo.)

CANADA'S FORESTS FOR IMPERIAL USE

That the interests of the British Empire demand a fuller development of the forest resources of Canada and Newfoundland was urged by Charles Phillips in a paper read before the colonial section of the Royal Society of Arts in London, England, on May 4, Sir George Perley presided.

The speaker urged as a matter of extreme importance that Great Britain should endeavor to supplement its foreign sources of supply of raw materials for the making of paper with those awaiting development within the Empire. He pointed out that the present dependence on Norway and Sweden might involve a serious problem if either of these countries should become a foe. In the exhaustive survey of the timber resources of the Empire available for paper-making, it was shown that Canada and Newfoundland led the way, both in materials and process of manufacture, but it pointed out that the Dominion government recognized the importance of conservation.

Important Educational Matter

Toronto, May 31—An important gathering of heads of universities and colleges in Canada will be held here tomorrow to devise a scheme for fitting some Canadian university as a post-graduate centre. Formerly students went to the famous universities of Germany for post-graduate courses. It is now necessary to provide a suitable substitute at home.

Best Trapshooters There

The list of prize money for the Dominion Association shoot commencing June 8 is the largest ever put up. There will be a ladies' competition also. In two weeks from now there will take place at the Rockville rifle ranges, Ottawa, the greatest exhibition of trap-shooting ever witnessed in Canada. The annual tournament of the Dominion of Canada Trapshooting Association commences on Tuesday, June 8, and lasts until the following Friday. Among the best shots who have signified their intentions of being in Ottawa for the meet are Walter Ewing, of Montreal, the winner of the world's championship at the Olympic games a few years ago, and still reckoned one of Canada's leading trapshooters; also Joe Jennings, the winner of the tournament at Plochurst last year, and winner of the Grand Canadian Handicap in 1911. Some of the other crack shots attending will be W. T. Ely, Toronto; Mark Sprague, of Belleville; Harry Smith, of Chatham; W. Pickering, of Galt; E. W. Watson, of W. Barnes; J. Hunter, H. D. Baker, Nelson, Lopp and others from Hamilton, and W. H. Smith and T. Wigle from Kingsville. Montreal will be represented by such sterling shots as T. O. Lyall, Thomas Westlake, D. J. Kearney, C.
