A semi-official statement issued yesterday at Berlin on the unemployment situation gives statistics showing that there are two million idle persons in the occupied territory. It is added that if dependents of the unemployed and those persons working on short time were included in the statistics at least one half of the population of the region would be shown to be nuemployed.

In the unoccupied territory 700,000 persons unemployed and 1,500,000 persons working on short time are receiving assistance, while counting those not receiving assistance it is calculated that more than a third of the total population is out of work. College Girl Bigger Than She Was In '84

New York, Nov. 14—The college girl is growing. Since 1884 she has sprouted an average of one and three-tenths inches. She also is putting on weight, her waist measurement is larger and even her lung capacity has improved.

These advancements are based on stratistics compiled at Vassar College by Miss Mabel Newcomer, economics department. The figures show that from 1884 to 1920 the weight of college girls increased from 123.8 to 125.8. The waist measurements dropped from 25 to 22 from 1884 to 1896, stood still for 10 years, then gradually increased until it reached 25 once more.

The general improvement in physical condition was attributed to the increased interest in athletics.

MELLON TO ASK \$4,000,000 FOR

Treasury Secretary Plans Intensive Warfare on Coast Rum Runners.

Washington, Nov. 14.—Secretary of he Treasury Mellon, provided Congress will back him, intends to clamp down the lid on the rum-running traf-fic along the coasts. Purchase of swift patrol boats, well armed, for the Coast

patrol boats, well armed, for the Coast Guard will be put up to Congress and an appropriation of probably \$4,000,000 for this purpose will be asked.

Secretary Mellon is considering a detailed plan to cope with rum running by increasing the number of scout boats. This plan has been worked out by the Coast Guard, customs service and prohibition unit.

The estimates for coast patrol boats

The estimates for coast patrol boats will be included in the budget in the Coast Guard estimates. It is recognized that the Government is now handicap-

that the Government is now handicapped in coping with the speedy craft used by the rum runners. It is the understanding that Attorney General Daugherty in his annual report will back up the proposal to add to the Coast Guard fleet.

The Coast Guard has only twenty-three seagoing vessels capable of patrolling, and these craft have many other duties. If the three-mile limit is increased the need for more patrol ships will be greater. A large number of the swiftest type of motorboats will be necessary to arm them with light guns. Against these reductions the programme provides taxation increases by limitation of the deduction of capital losses to 12½ per cent. of the loss and limitation of the deduction from gross income for interest paid during the year and for losses, not of a business character, to the amount the sum of these items exceeds tax exempt income of the taxpayer. It is proposed also to tax community property income of the spouse having control of the income.

"A soldiers' bonus would postpone
tax reduction not for one but for
many years to come. It would mean
an increase rather than a decrease in
taxes, for in the long run it could be
paid only out of moneys collected by
the government from the people in the
form of taxes.

Reducing Expenses "Throughout its consideration of the problem, the treasury has proceeded on the theory that the country would prefer a substantial reduction of taxation to the increased taxes that would necessarily follow from a soldiers' bonus, and I have faith to believe that it is justified in that understanding."

Mr. Mellon expressed confidence that the ordinary expenses of the government would be reduced during the current fiscal year to a total of not more than \$8,500,000,000, of which about \$500,000,000 will be fixed charges on account of the sinking fund and other retirements of the debt.

Declaring it appeared that for this year and for the next four or five years there should be a surplus of something more than \$800,000,000 a year over and above expenditures chargeable to the ordinary budget, including the fixed debt charges payable out of current revenues, the treasury head asserted that "this gives a reasonable margin not merely for tax revision but also for tax reduction."
