Police and Unemployed Clash In Rhineland District

ONE KILLED IN RIOTING ON RHINE Police and the Unemployed Clash, When 20 are Injured. 700,000 ARE IDLE

(By Canadian Press.) Dusseldorf, Nov. 14.—A clash between the police and a crowd of the unemployed holding a demonstration occurred last night, causing the killing of one person and the wounding of twenty others. The demonstrations were resumed today, the crowds which paraded the streets all day yesterday, protesting against the unemployment situation resuming their tactics today.

In general they were orderly, but the singing of the "Internationale" was a feature of the demonstration. The police officials say they are not aware of the exact circumstances of last night's affair, in which the police fired on the unemployed.

In the unoccupied territory 700,000 persons unemployed and 1,500,000 persons working on short time are receiving assistance, while counting those not receiving assistance it is calculated that there are two million idle persons in the occupied territory. It is said that if dependents of the unemployed and those persons working on short time were included in the statistics at least one half of the population of the region would be shown to be unemployed.

ELECTIONS IN BRITAIN STIR NATION All Parties are Clearing the Decks for Hard Fought Campaign. LEADERS CONFIDENT Many Strong Statesmen are Lining Up With United Liberals.

H. N. MOORE (British United Press.) London, Nov. 14.—With the election day just three weeks away, all parties are hurriedly clearing the decks for the hardest fought campaign Britain has seen since the war, with the result more than usually important. Conservatives, while realising that their adoption of the protectionist policy will mean a loss of many supporters from their own ranks and has consolidated the Liberals, are facing their campaign and their confidence chiefly upon the general fear of a Labor government with its capital levy proposals and socialist ideas. Labor being the official opinion, the effort of the Conservative managers will be to focus public attention upon the choice between Labor and the present Government.

Party Conventions Held In Halifax Halifax, Nov. 14.—With both Liberal and Conservative parties holding conventions tomorrow evening to appoint candidates to contest the Halifax constituency in the approaching by-election made necessary by the appointment of Hon. A. K. Maclean to the Exchequer, the campaign will probably take on more interest than heretofore. Interest has centered to the present upon which of the various possible nominees in each party will be successful in the party convention.

Engineer George Hamilton of Lindsay, his mate, was badly scalded. Thomas McCabe of York, engineer on Number 99, was hurt about the head, and his fireman, J. Lavely, was also scalded. Conductor Archie Hoover of Lindsay, who was riding in the caboose, was thrown off and also injured.

NATION IS URGED TO RISK WAR Members of Pan-German Party Ask for Split With French. ASK FOR "DER TAG" Willing to Sacrifice Ruhr and Rhineland to Save the Empire.

BY CARL D. GROAT British United Press Cor. Berlin, Nov. 14.—Members of the Pan-German party today were pressing the Stresemann government to break with France even at the risk of war, it was learned from well-informed sources.

Loss of Rhineland Through this step might mean loss of the Ruhr and Rhineland the German Government would never admit their separation from the Reich and all Germany would consider their loss only temporary, it was said today. The loss of the subsidies to the population of the districts will cease by November 26, if the plan adopted yesterday in a conference between chancellor Stresemann and representatives of the occupied regions is carried out.

Sister Mary's KITCHEN CHOCOLATE CAKE

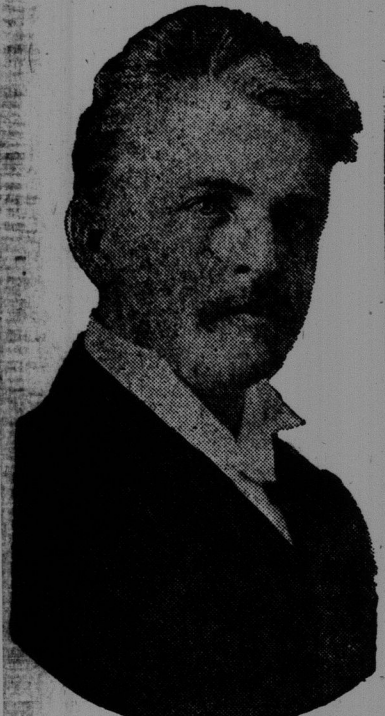

### MELLON TO ASK \$4,000,000 FOR FAST DRY FLEET

Treasury Secretary Plans Intensive Warfare on Coast Rum Runners.

Washington, Nov. 14—Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, provided Congress will back him, intends to clamp down the lid on the rum-running traffic along the coast. Details of swift patrol boats, well armed, for the Coast Guard will be put up to Congress and an appropriation of probably \$4,000,000 for this purpose will be asked. Secretary Mellon is considering a detailed plan to cope with rum running by increasing the number of scout boats. This plan has been worked out by the Coast Guard, customs service and prohibition unit.

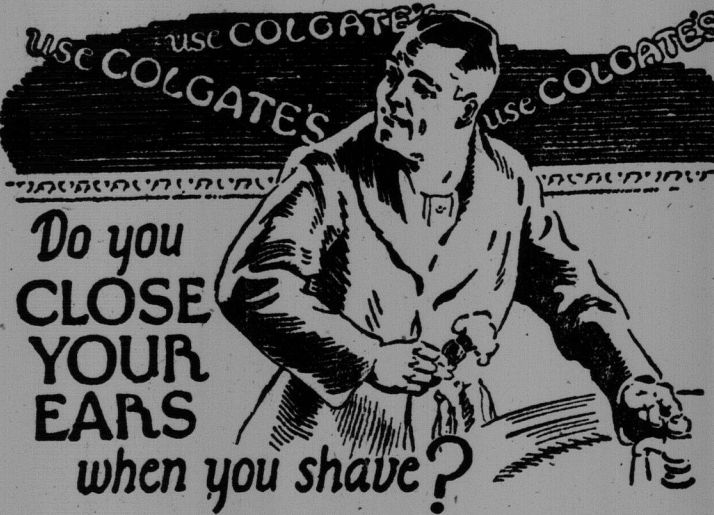
The estimates for coast patrol boats will be included in the budget in the Coast Guard estimate. It is recognized that the Government is now handicapped in coping with the speedy craft used by the rum runners. It is the understanding that Attorney General Daugherty in his annual report will back up the proposal to add to the Coast Guard fleet.

The Coast Guard has only twenty-three seagoing vessels capable of patrolling, and these craft have many other duties. If the three-mile limit increased the need for more patrol ships will be greater. A large number of the swiftest type of motorboats will be necessary. Moreover, it will be necessary to arm them with light guns.

The Treasury plan is likely to lead to controversy in Congress and charges by the wets that excessive appropriations for enforcement are sought.

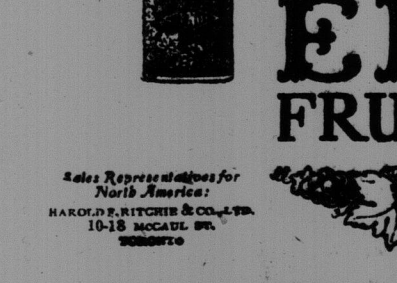

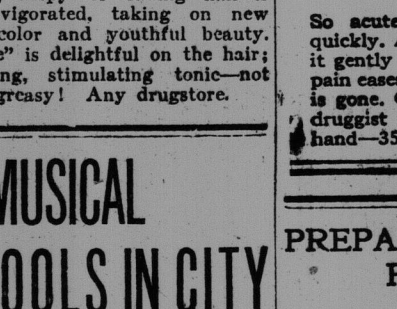

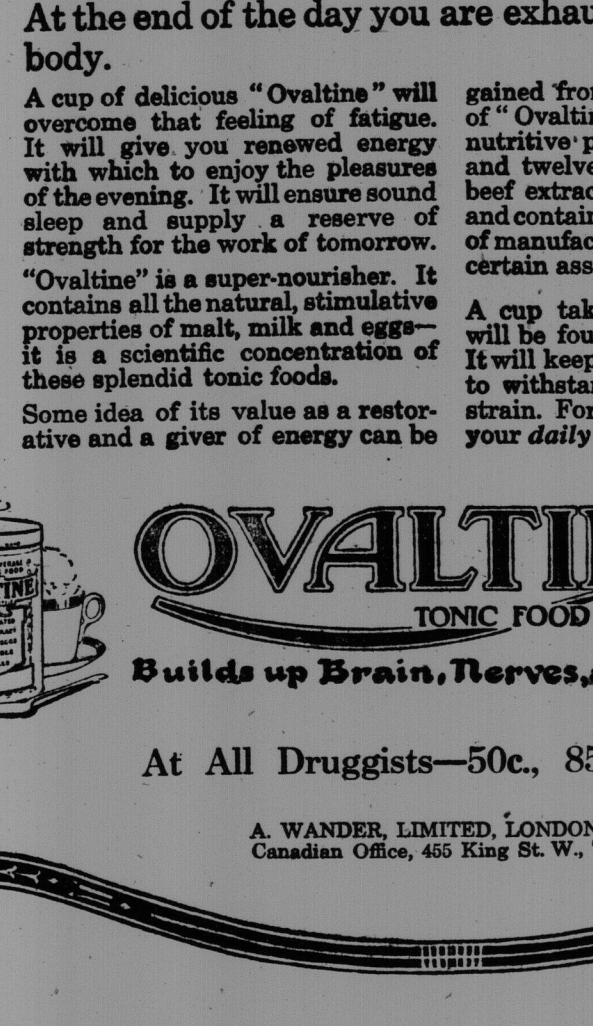

## MT. A. MINISTER HEARD AT MEETING

Rev. Dr. John Line Address Methodist Ministers at District Session.

The Methodist district meeting was held yesterday in the Portland Methodist church with a large number from outside the city attending. Rev. E. E. Styles, president of the N. B. and P. E. I. conference, was in the chair and led the opening devotions. At the morning session Rev. George F. Dawson, of Sussex, gave an address and the rest of the period was devoted to a discussion of the extension of district work. In the afternoon Rev. R. G. Fulton spoke on Evangelism within the district. Discussion followed this paper and motion, Rev. R. G. Fulton, Rev. J. M. Rice and Rev. F. I. Bertram were appointed a committee to draw plans for a simultaneous evangelistic campaign to be carried on throughout the district. The committee was to submit a report at the next meeting of the district.

Rev. Dr. John Line, of Mount Allison University, was then introduced and gave a timely address on the importance of the cultivation of the spiritual life by ministers, officers and church members. He stressed the importance of deepening the spiritual life in view of the approaching union and he also advocated a maritime "Northfield" conference of Christian workers. The meeting heartily endorsed this suggestion and pledged its support.

At the evening session prayer was offered by Rev. E. E. Styles and Rev. H. A. Goodwin and the scriptures were read by Rev. F. T. Bertram. Dr. Line gave an able sermon on the text, "I know that my Redeemer liveth." At the close of the session the Lord's Supper was administered.

## MORE OPPOSITION TO CHURCH UNION

Winnipeg, Nov. 13—Opposition to church union was expressed in a formal dissent presented to the Manitoba Presbyterian Synod today by R. G. Stewart and John McKay, president of the Winnipeg and Fort Arthur branches of the Presbyterian Church Association. An opportunity will be given later for a debate on the question, it was said by the moderator.

The dissenters denied emphatically that the question of church union had been settled, since the people who constitute the Presbyterian Church had not been consulted on the question in the form given to it in the enabling bills.

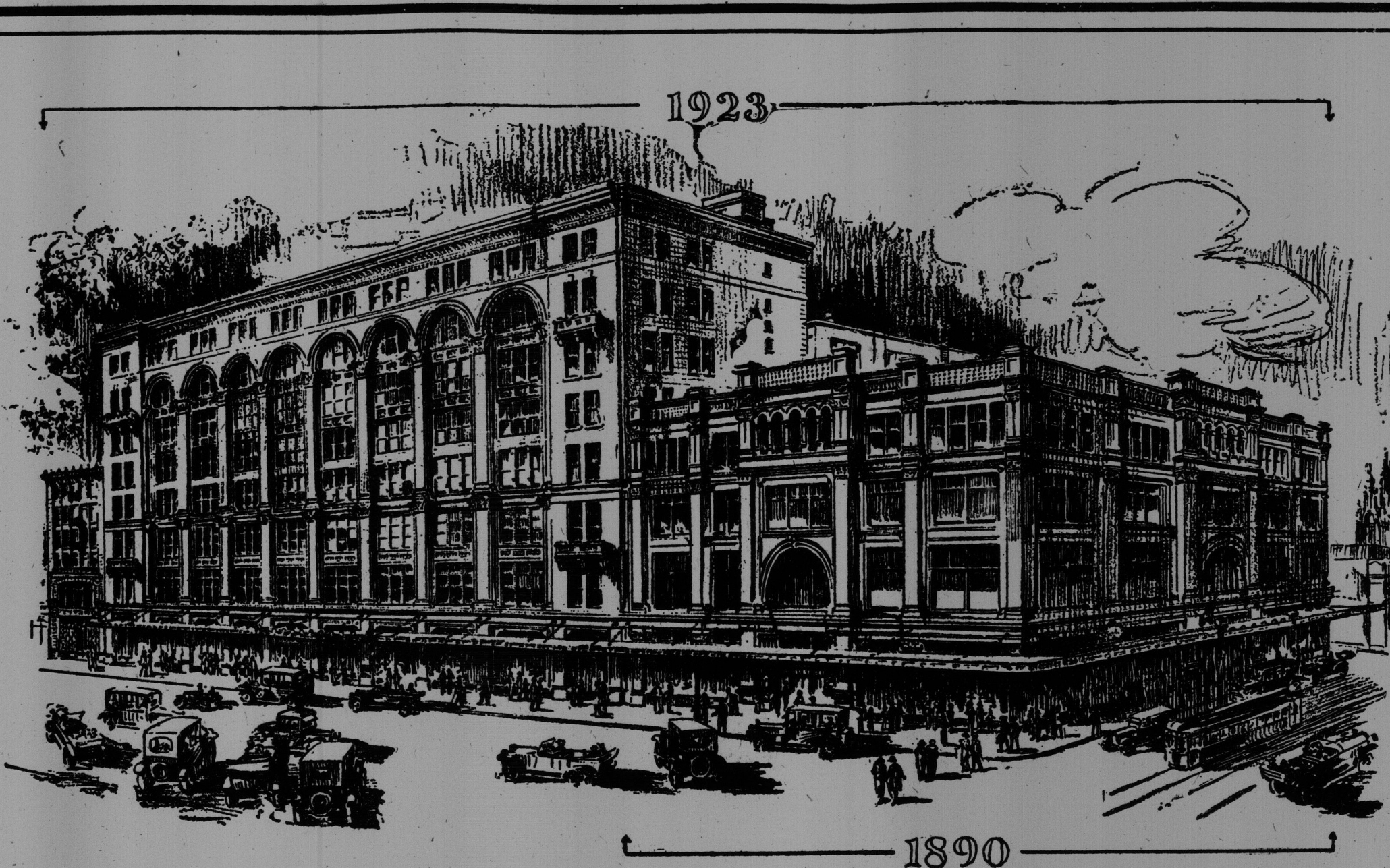
