



name of the king, he exercises an extensive sovereignty.

Hall Caine, whose social pretensions have not found favor with Lord and Lady Raglan, and who in fact has been unimercifully snubbed by them, has denounced the governor as "mentally unfit to hold his office." He has also assailed in a much similar fashion Lord MacDonnell, chairman of the royal commission appointed by the government to investigate the political and administrative conditions of the Isle of Man, and has finally wound up by declaring that the Manxmen themselves are incapable of telling the truth, and that they are adepts in the art of trimming the latter.

The crisis has been brought about by the petition of the Manxmen, including Hall Caine, to the crown, to annul the power of veto exercised by the legislative council, which, composed exclusively of appointees of the crown, fulfils the functions of the House of Lords in the Manx legislature, and has the power of killing all the measures of the lower chamber, known as the House of Keys. Financial autonomy is also asked for, likewise a curtailment of the privileges and prerogatives of the governor.

CHERRY PUDDING.

Two rounded cups of flour, two tea-epoons baking powder, one half teaspoon salt, three-fourths cup sugar, one egg, one cup water or milk, two tablespoons butter. Stir into this batter a pint of raw cher ries and bake in a mold in which the bat ter will stand about two inches deep with

PUFFS.

One cake yeast, 1-4 cup lukewarm water, 1-2 cup lukewarm milk, 1 pint sifted flour, white 3 eggs, 1-2 cup butter, 1 tablespoon granulated sugar, 1-4 teaspoon salt. Sift flour and salt into bowl, add to it the yeast that has previously been dissolved in the lukewarm water, then add the milk to make a soft batter. Set aside to use. When light, which will be in about 1 hour, add to it the whites of eggs beaten to a stiff froth and the sugar and butter thoroughly creamed. Beat thoroughly and pour into well-buttered patty pans. Let rise again for 10 minutes and bake in a hot oven for 20 minutes. This makes 1 dozen most excellent puffs. Takes about two hours in all.







Cut Off Mexican Concessions body w Chihuahua, Mex., June 15—Reforms immediately affecting millions of dollars worth of foreign property in Mexico were announced tonight. Governor Gonzales declared that under the new regime foreign concessions which might be regarded as monopolies would not be extended or renewed and that every legal effort would be made to restrict foreign monopolies now existing in Chihuahua, one of the richest states in minerals and timber.


