Benjamin Hammersley, the subject of this brief notice, was born at Langton, Staffordshire Potteries, England, on the 27th March, 1828. Having been a scholar in the Sabbath School of the Methodist New Connexion Society at the above mentioned place, he was thus favored with religious instruction, and early became the subject of saving grace. He seems to have possessed fair qualifications for usefulness; hence he soon engaged in the work of calling sinners to repentance. His labors were very acceptable, and were owned of God in the salvation of souls. For some years he filled with credit the office of Local Preacher, when, in the year 1857, he offered himself to our English Missionary Committee for the Canadian field, and was accepted. He was stationed on the Southampton Circuit, where he preached but a few times when his health failed him. His medical adviser recommended a change of air; he therefore removed to Goderich, where for a season he appeared to improve, and his friends entertained hopes of his ultimate recovery. But these were sadly delusive. On Sunday, October 31, 1857, he was summoned to the spirit land, leaving a heart-broken wife and two small children to contend with the ills of life.

Brother Hammersley was a man gentle and amiable in his disposition: he was studious, industrious and p ayerful. As a preacher he was practical, his aim being to save souls. Nor did he labor in vain, or spend his strength for nought. May our end, like his, be peaceful and triumphant.

XII. That Eatonville, in the township of Normanby, be taken up as a new Mission, and that a preacher be stationed thereon.

XIX. That while this Conference disclaims any right or wish to interfere with the political opinions of any of our ministers or members, it cannot but regret that the Rev. N. C. Gowan, during the excitement of the last election, should have written a letter to a political adversary which this Conference deems intemperate, ill-judged, wanting in proper taste, and inconsistent with the moderation and dignity of a Christian minister; and the Conference strongly advises all our ministers to keep aloof from the public agitation of party politics.

XXII. That believing as we do, that even the moderate use of Alcoholic Liquors, under ordinary circumstances, is detrimental to the piety of the church, and a stumbling block in the way of sinners: this Conference recommends all our members to adhere strictly to the principle of total abstinence, that in this respect they may shun even the appearance of evil.

XXIII. That it is the opinion of this Conference that an interchange of mutual visits, by way of deputation between the Connexion in Canada and England, would be highly serviceable to all our interests; and, to this end, resolves that this Conference open a correspondence with the English Missionary Committee, to ascertain whether such an arrangement would be desirable to them; and that the business be left in the hands of the Annual Committee, as to detail; and that the Rev. T. Goldsmith be appointed as the deputation, and that he proceed to England at such time as may be found most suitable after corresponding with England.

XXIV. That this Conference has marked with deep regret the continued and shameful desecration of God's holy day during the past year, not only on the part of private individuals, but also of incorporated bodies, especially Steamboat, Canal and Railway companies, by keeping boats, cars, &c., in active operation during the sacred hours of the Sabbath, who have in this way trampled on the law of God and outraged the most sacred rights of man: and we do hope that the time is not far distant when the proper authorities will take active measures to prevent this demoralizing and soul-destroying evil.

XXV. That members omitting to meet in class one quarter without assigning a satisfactory reason to the Leaders' Meeting, or to the Preacher and Leader where there is no Leaders' Meeting, shall be visited and admonished; and if they afterwards wilfully neglect for the same period they shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, when the

Leader shall state the circumstance to his class for its information. But should they withdraw while guilty of practices which rendered them liable to expulsion, they shall be excluded by the Preacher, in the presence of the society of which they were members, unless the Leaders' Meeting or society shall judge such procedure inexpedient.

N.B.—This resolution to be submitted for the approbation of the Quarterly Meeting Boards throughout the Connexion, to report thereon to next Conference.

James Hales, who, after more than twenty-years of devoted and self-denying labors, and having courageously and faithfully worn his armor until the last hour, was suddenly taken from the field of conflict and toil to the better world, "where the wicked cease from troubling and the weary are at rest."

XXXI. That in view of the painful dispensation of Divine Providence, by which the Connexion has sustained the loss of a youthful, active and promising minister, the Rev. B. Hammersley, who preached but a few months ere he fell a victim to disease and death; this Conference, while it resignedly bows to the will of heaven, would tender its prayerful sympathies to his wife and family.

XXXII. That this Conference cannot but recognize, with expressions of strongest gratitude, their high appreciation of the faithful and indefatigable services of the Rev. J. H. 5. That the *Evangelical Witness* be published weekly, commencing the 1st Jan., 1859, the same size as the *Canada Christian Advocate*. The price to be 10s., paid in advance; 12s. 6d., in six months; 15s., after the expiration of the year.

6. That no less a sum than \$20 be raised on each Circuit, for the purchase of the press, types, &c.; and that any surplus accruing from such efforts shall be appropriated, under the direction of the next Conference, for the furtherance of the same objects.

#### BENEFICENT FUND.

5. That the sum of £5 be paid to the widow of our late brother, the Rev. J. Hales, for funeral expenses.
6. That the Rev. T. Rump be declared superannuated, and having paid into the fund for 20 years, he shall receive £18 per annum.
7. That the 3rd resolution of the Committee, declaring that the constitution of this society does not admit of any allowance being paid to the Rev. W. Robinson, and that he ought to refund the ten pounds paid him by mistake, be adopted.
8. That the report of the Committee, recommending the Rev. J. Seymour, sen., be admitted as a member of this society, by his paying the sum of \$180 into the Fund in three equal instalments. The first, to be paid before the close of the present Conference year; the second, within two years hence, bearing interest; the last instalment to remain, bearing interest on his own personal security, thus entitling him to the same relation to the society as those who have traveled and paid twenty years, be adopted.
9. That all notes bear 8 per cent interest in future.
10. That the Treasurer be authorised to loan all surplus funds in his hands to the General Superintendent on proper security, for Connexional purposes.

DEAR BRETHREN IN CHRIST:—Through the infinite mercy of God we have been permitted to meet again in our annual Conference, after a year that will long be remembered in this Province; a year characterized, on the one hand, by the mania of wild speculation, sad disclosures of public and private fraud, and that fearful financial crash which almost buried commerce in ruins; and, on the other hand, by that conscious feeling experienced by thousands, that in the tide of iniquity and storms of calamity, God only can be his people's "anchor, refuge, sun and shield"—that sense of sin before Jehovah—that deep solicitude to be washed in the blood of Jesus, and that mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit which has so gloriously visited this western world, perhaps unequalled since the day of Pentecost. From all, we must say,

God moves in a mysterious way,  
His wonders to perform.

Out of the chaos of a mysterious year God has graciously brought forth a new and better state of things; hence our prospects in this province were never so bright as at the present moment. In the glorious revival which visited America, we have not been passed over; 718 precious souls have been converted and enrolled in our churches; 565 as members, and 153 under its watch care. What reason for gratitude for the past, and united and personal dedication afresh to God, and full resolve to labor for his glory. While, especially his hand is opening to us a great door, which no man can shut, in the North West of this great continent, occupied hitherto by the Hudson Bay Company, and which is now filling with amazing rapidity by emigration. This will call for renewed and enlarged efforts, both by the churches in our father-land and Canada. We cannot stand still, that would be death; we must, and by the grace of God we shall, urge on in the open path of duty to glory, and scatter broad-cast the seed of divine truth over this vast wilderness, and confidently look forward to the time when North America shall become a fruitful garden, and, in its turn, send forth the heralds of salvation to other lands.

We have been called to mourn the loss, by death, of two of our brethren in the ministry, during the last Conference year. Rev. J. Hales, who has been one of our oldest and most successful ministers, whose praise is in all the churches. He labored for twenty-five years in the mission field in this province, fell gloriously with his armor on, but now rests from his labors, and his works shall follow him. Rev. B. Hammersley was sent out last year by the English Conference. He was a young man of much promise. He entered the field, and faithfully prepared for the work. The Master accepted the sacrifice, said it was enough, and our brother entered glory. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord."

Our ranks have been increased by the Rev. J. Shuttleworth, who is highly esteemed and loved by all his ministerial brethren, and our long-tried, worthy Bro. J. Seymour has joined us at this Conference. May he long live to work for God and his church.

Promising young men have also been added to our itinerancy.

Amidst the stagnation of trade which has very seriously affected our finances, yet six chapels and four parsonages have been built during the year, and four chapels and two parsonages are now in the course of erection. A printing press also has been purchased, and an enlarged weekly journal is now to be published.

Our esteemed Superintendent, the Rev. J. H. Robinson, and the Assistant Superintendent, the Rev. W. McClure, continue to be daily more esteemed and beloved by their ministerial brethren and our churches—they live in our hearts.

The present Conference has been peculiarly characterized by the influence of the Holy Spirit, both in its public religious exercises, and private duties. Best of all, God is with us.—"Brethren pray for us, that the word of God may have free course and be glorified, even as it is with you." In conclusion, we beg to assure you of our continued and even increased attachment to you, and the great principles which are peculiarly characteristic of the body both here and in the father-land; and as an evidence of our desire for closer and increased co-operation, we have appointed our well-beloved brother, the Rev. T. Goldsmith, as a deputation to convey to you a more correct knowledge of our sympathies and work, than could readily be obtained from our annual and more formal address.

Finally, brethren, farewell; the God of love and peace be with you. Amen.
