MINUTES  
OF THE  
TORONTO CONFERENCE  
OF  
THE METHODIST CHURCH.

The SIXTH SESSION of the TORONTO ANNUAL CONFERENCE opened in the Broadway Tabernacle, Toronto, on Thursday, June 13, 1889, at 9 a.m. The Conference prayer-meeting, lasting from 9 to 10 a.m., was conducted by Rev. E. A. STAFFORD, D.D., President of the Conference.

At 10 a.m., the General Superintendent, Rev. Dr. CARMAN, took the chair, and proceeded to organize the Conference. The Conference was opened by singing Hymn 359, and reading of Psalm 121, and 2 Timothy, 2nd chapter, and prayer by the Rev. Dr. STAFFORD, President.

General Superintendent Carman addressed the Conference.

The Roll of Ministerial members was called, and the names of the Laymen elected by the District Meetings, when 158 Ministers and 101 Laymen answered to their names.

#### MEMORIAL FROM THE LAY DELEGATES.

The Lay Delegates to the Toronto Annual Conference of 1889, assembled in special session, respectfully memorialize the said Conference to adopt the following:—The memorial of the Toronto Annual Conference of 1889, to the General Conference, next ensuing, to the following purpose and effect:—

1. That provision be made for the regular meeting of the lay section of each Conference, both Annual and General, at an early period thereof.
2. That the ministerial members of each Annual Conference shall hold their special session—for the consideration of the fifteen questions in paragraph 152, of the Discipline affecting the ministerial relation—in advance of the meeting of the full Conference: such special session to be presided over by the retiring President.
3. That a record be kept of the attendance at Conference, of laymen, and published in the minutes: and that any delegate who neglects to attend, and is not excused, shall be ineligible for election as a delegate for the succeeding year.
4. That laymen shall be equally eligible with ministers for all offices or positions in the Church, except those requiring the performance of ministerial functions; and that the laity shall enjoy equitable representation upon all Conference or Connexional Committees.
5. That the stationing of ministers shall be done by a Board that shall be so constituted as to be personally disinterested; and that shall exercise jurisdiction over a wider area than at present, to overcome the difficulty attending transfers.
6. That a Church may invite a minister to its pastorate, and support the same by personal representations, through a deputation, to the Stationing Board.

7. That provision be made for appeal from the decision of the Superintendent of a Circuit, or the Chairman of a District, upon a question of law, or the interpretation or administration of the Discipline.

8. That Young People's Associations shall be recognized as a department of church work; and that provision be made therefor in the Discipline.

9. That the membership of Trustee Boards shall be revised annually.

10. That to impart a more representative character to the Quarterly Official Boards, the following changes be made:—

(a) That stewards be elected annually by the church members over eighteen years of age.

(b) That leaders be elected annually by their classes.

(c) That the Superintendent of the Sunday-school be elected annually by the Sabbath-school Committee.

All these elections to require a majority vote, and to be by ballot, without nomination.

And your Lay Delegates further request that this be a direction to the Secretary of this Conference, to embody this memorial in the minutes.

In regard to the memorial from the Collingwood District, requesting this Conference to ask all the District Meetings of May, 1890, to express their opinion on the propriety of memorializing the General Conference to so amend the law that the Delegates to our Annual Conference be elected by the Quarterly Boards, your Committee recommend that the prayer of the petitioners be granted.

5. In regard to the memorial from the Bracebridge District, asking this Annual Conference to memorialize the General Conference to so amend the Discipline as to allow each District to elect one Lay Delegate to the Stationing Committee, instead of the one Ministerial Delegate; as now elected, your Committee recommend no change.

## REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have great pleasure in submitting another Annual Report respecting the Sunday-schools within the bounds of the Toronto Conference. It is encouraging to notice that the amount received by the Treasurer for Sunday-school extension (\$435.04), exceeds that of all former years. It is also encouraging to note an increase of eleven in the number of schools. The increase in the number of scholars exceeds one thousand; also, one thousand more scholars are reported to meet in class than were reported last year, and the number learning the Catechism is more than last year.

Your Committee beg most respectfully to make the following suggestions:—

1. Let the Conference insist that the Methodist Catechisms shall be more regularly taught.

2. Your Committee would also strongly recommend that, as far as possible, the Ministers should regularly visit the Sunday-schools, and once a quarter at least, preach a sermon, or deliver an address, in every Congregation for the Sunday-school.

3. Your Committee would recommend most strongly that a Temperance pledge should be introduced into every Sunday-school, and teachers and scholars should all be urged to sign such pledge. They would also recommend the formation of Bands of Hope in all our Schools.

4. Your Committee rejoice in the increased circulation of Methodist literature in our Sunday-schools, and hope the time is near when they will not be excluded by the introduction of foreign publications, to the exclusion of our own papers. More care should be taken to recommend the latter.

5. Your Committee would call special attention to the importance of encouraging the missionary spirit in our Sunday-schools. Every Sunday-school, especially in cities, should have at least one Missionary School under its care. It is a gratifying fact that the sum of \$2,117.31 is reported as having been raised for Missions by the Sunday-schools of Toronto Conference; but could not more be done? Let at least one collection be taken in every School each month for Mission purposes.

6. One other suggestion:—As the great design of the Sunday-school is to lead the children to Christ, your Committee would beg most respectfully to recommend the formation of juvenile classes, with a view to gather the children into the Church.

Finally, your Committee recommend that E. Barrass should be re-elected Secretary-Treasurer.

## SUPERANNUATION FUND.

*Treasurer's Report for the year ending July 31st, 1888.*

I have pleasure in again presenting to the Board the Annual Exhibit of the state of the Fund.



Although the past year has been one of great stringency in money matters, the income of the Fund has been sufficient to meet the claims of the year, and to pay off the balance against the Fund, with which the year was commenced. The amounts apportioned to the several Districts have been paid, with comparatively trifling exceptions, and the claimants have received their full allowances. I am sorry, however, to say that quite a number of our most poorly paid ministers have been compelled to make up deficiencies which should have been paid by their Circuits; but so willingly has this been done, in obedience to the law of the Church, that in few instances have I heard any complaint. The estimates for the coming year have been very carefully made, and I venture, with some hesitation, to recommend that the percentage be no higher than 6%, the same as last year, although that may leave a small deficiency against the Fund. The coming year will be a trying one, arising from several causes. The amount of assessable income has not materially increased. The number of additional claimants is greater than usual, and their claims exceptionally heavy. There will probably be a falling off in the Interest account, as we will have to make a change in the securities of a considerable amount of our investments, and the interest has been very closely collected.

## GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

*Report of the Treasurer for the year ending August 31st, 1888.*

In the years preceding the General Conference of 1886 the salaries of the General Superintendents were paid in part by the Missionary and Educational Funds, on the ground that the advocacy of the chief officers of the Church did very materially benefit these departments of our Church work.

According to the then existing law, the Fund paid only \$2,000 annually for the above purpose, or at the rate of \$8,000 for the full quadrennium. The legislation of the General Conference of 1886 (I think, unwisely) enacted that the whole amount required for the above purpose should be paid by the Fund, which amount during the quadrennium is \$18,400, an increase of \$10,400 during the four years on this one item.

The General Conference, through the Financial Committee, provided for meeting this increased claim, by apportioning to the several Annual Conferences, on what they considered an equitable basis, such sums as they deemed necessary to meet these claims, and the Conferences, through their representatives, accepted such apportionments. (See Journal, page 251.)

The following tabulated statement will show how far the several Conferences have been successful, up to the 1st of September, 1888, in raising the amounts required from them respectively:

The reduction of the debt is proceeding very slowly, as the total amount received from year to year is so little above what is necessary to pay interest. It is earnestly hoped that the collections for the coming year will be on a much more liberal scale. A full report will be sent out to all the ministers, as soon after Conference as possible.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The recognition of the sacred rest of the Lord's Day, and the legal enactments of cessation from labor in the affairs of the world on that day, constitute an indispensable security for the national acknowledgment and public worship of Almighty God.

A large measure of observance of the sacred day in our country, with the legal protection thereof, has been obtained, and also preserved by public teaching, by agitation, by petition to the heads of legislation and administration, and incessant watchfulness and repeated and often renewed remonstrance.

Efforts towards securing the needful petitioning are more likely to be carried through, if forms of petition are put into the hands of parties who may reasonably be expected to get the work done.

That consideration may, perhaps, explain the fact that the recommendation of our last Conference to send memorials from every Circuit to the Legislatures, on some important points, has been entirely and universally neglected.

The Alliance for the protection and due observance of the Lord's Day, formed at Ottawa, April, 1888, has secured from the two greatest railways of the country—the Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific—apparently cordial and sincere assurance of their purpose and earnest endeavors to reduce labor and travel on those roads within the smallest possible limits.

Your Committee would respectfully recommend:—

1. That representations be made to the proper authorities, by the President and Secretary of the Conference, for the discontinuance of military and other public parades on the Lord's Day, which tend to secularize this sacred day of rest, and distract the Sunday-schools, and dissipate the sanctifying influences of the holy day.

2. That this Conference now appoint delegates as our representatives in the Alliance for the protection and due observance of the Lord's Day, and that our representatives be instructed to call special attention to such action as may be necessary to effect the closing of all canals and post-offices, and cessation from the running of steam-boats, and from railroad labor, as far as possible on the Lord's Day.

3. That all our ministers, sometime during the year, teach the people the scriptural nature, purpose and duties of the day of sacred rest, especially making clear to the people the impropriety of Sabbath visitings, funerals, etc.

4. That in order to stimulate unity of action, and mutual help and encouragement, the question be brought up at the May District Meeting, not as a trial or disciplinary question, but in the conversation on the State of the Work, how the Sabbath is observed, and how the people have been taught about it in every Circuit.

The amount of money placed at the disposal of your Committee by the Treasurer was \$1,034, being somewhat less than the amount of last year. Your Committee are glad to report that it has been able to meet all the proper claims presented, making reduction but in one case of personal affliction, following its precedent in the case of claims for funeral expenses.

Your Committee would call the attention of this Conference, and all the members of this Church within its bounds, to the necessity for increased liberality in supporting the Fund. The proper cases relieved by the Fund are such as commend themselves, not only to the good judgment, but sympathetic heart.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee would recommend the following :—

1. That the trustees of Dovercourt Circuit be permitted to sell their church property, with the view of building near Bloor Street; also to sell a vacant lot, and apply the proceeds to the reduction of the church debt.
2. That Clinton Street Church be permitted to sell the land in the rear and to the south of the lot on which the church is built. Proceeds to be applied on mortgage.
3. That the trustees of Parkdale be permitted to sell their church property, if necessary. Proceeds to be applied to the erection of a more commodious building in a new place.
4. That Euclid Avenue Church trustees be permitted to sell. Proceeds to be applied towards a new and larger church.
5. That the trustees of Kinghorn Church be permitted to sell. Proceeds to be applied on a new church.
6. That the trustees of Rich Hill Church be permitted to sell. Proceeds to be applied on a new church.
7. That the trustees of Hillsdale Church be permitted to sell. Proceeds towards a new church, now being erected.
8. That the sale of the Thorinbury Music Hall by the trustees of the Methodist Church be confirmed, and the usual documents be given, as the money has already been paid on the debt of the church now used by the congregation.
9. That the trustees of the old Highland Creek Church be permitted to sell. Proceeds to be applied towards a new church.
10. That the trustees of the Ebenezer Church, Scarboro' Circuit, be permitted to sell. Proceeds to be applied towards a new church.
11. That the trustees of the Claremont Church be permitted to sell the church and lot in Claremont. Proceeds to be applied towards a new church.
12. That the trustees of Zion Church, St. Clair Avenue, Toronto West District, be permitted to sell the present church lot. Proceeds to be applied in building a new and larger church.
13. *Resolved*,—That, in the opinion of this Committee the reference of the dispute between the Quarterly Boards of Islington and Cooksville to this Conference is premature, and we, therefore, deem it unwise to take any action.

14. *Resolved*,—That the amount of \$605, now held in the interest of the late Scarborough West Circuit for parsonage purposes, be distributed as follows:—To Don Mills, \$100; to Christie's, \$130; to Providence, \$275; to Malcom, \$100. In every case the money is to be used exclusively for parsonage purposes in the Circuit to which the appointment belongs, and that Dr. Stafford be appointed to see after the payment of the money to the respective Circuits.

15. *Resolved*,—That the trustees be permitted to sell two lots in the town plot of Muskokaville. Proceeds to be applied towards the debt on the parsonage and church property at Uffington.

16. *Resolved*,—That the trustees of the church at Little Current be recommended to the favorable consideration of the Parsonage and Church Trust and Loan Fund for a loan of \$500.

17. *Resolved*,—That the trustees of the parsonage of the Brampton West Circuit be permitted to sell their parsonage property. Proceeds to be applied to the purchase of a more suitable property.

18. *Resolved*,—That the Trustees of Sitzer's Church be permitted to sell the lot on which the church stands, and apply the proceeds towards a new church at Inglewood.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Notwithstanding the energetic efforts of the various temperance organizations on behalf of the temperance cause, we regret to state that in all places where the repeal of the Scott Act has been voted upon it has been carried. This change in sentiment in regard to the Act did not arise from any change of interest in the temperance cause, but from the inability of temperance advocates and others to see the good accomplished by the Act. That the Scott Act was not an entire failure, may be established from the fact that it reduced the commitments to jail for drunkenness to one-fourth what they were under the license law. This repeal of the Act, instead of discouraging temperance advocates, should incite them to double their efforts towards the suppression of this great evil.

We strongly recommend that every minister and congregation use their influence towards securing total prohibition, as the only effectual method for suppressing the liquor traffic. And for the better securing of this end, we would recommend the extension of the Franchise to our women; and further to support no candidate for Parliament who will not pledge himself to vote for total prohibition. As early as 1736 Lord Chesterfield, in a speech before the House of Lords, maintained that: "luxury might be taxed; but vice must be suppressed and the use of what is hurtful prohibited."

We believe that evil in any form should not be licensed, but abolished. Since the evil of intemperance is going on continually, we do not think that one sermon on the subject in three hundred and sixty-five days is sufficient to keep the consciences of our people awake; but that the subject be frequently referred to in the pulpit.

We recommend:

1st. That all Sunday School scholars be induced to sign the pledge, on the ground that prevention is better than cure; we also recommend that the use of tobacco be discountenanced, and would favor having a penalty imposed upon those who sell the noxious weed to minors.

2nd. That none but unfermented wine be used for Sacramental purposes, believing this to be the wine used by our Saviour referred to in the New Testament as, "The cup," "The fruit of the vine," "The cup of the Lord," etc.

3rd. That the item in the "General Rules" of our Church which forbids the use of intoxicants, except in the case of extreme necessity, be firmly but mildly enforced; and that the attention of all members at the time of their reception be specially directed to this rule.

We deprecate the granting of permits for the introduction of liquor into the North-West Territories, and strongly recommend the enforcement of the prohibitory law.

We regret that some physicians, in their ordinary practice, still recommend to their patients the use of intoxicating liquor; but we rejoice that many of the highest medical authorities discard its use, and pronounce it more injurious than beneficial. We would also recommend that the textbook on this subject, recently authorized by the Department of Education, be used in all our public schools, and that this be a subject for examination.

Your Committee recommend that four delegates be appointed to attend the meeting of the Dominion Alliance, to be held in Toronto in the month of September next, and that Rev. Wm. Galbraith, LL.B., Ph.B., Rev. Wm. J. Hunter, D.D., G. F. Marter, Esq., M.P.P., and M. S. Beggs, Esq., comprise the delegation; also, that Rev. A. M. Phillips, B.D., and T. M. Edmonson, Esq., be appointed provisional delegates.

We recommend the appointment of a Standing Committee on Temperance, consisting of three ministers and three laymen, whose duty it shall be to watch legislation on the Temperance question, to bring to the notice of the Church any matters of importance on this subject, and to co-operate with any similar committee or temperance organization in securing the total abolition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, the following gentlemen to comprise the Committee:—Revs. Dr. Johnston, Wm. Galbraith, LL.B., A. M. Phillips, B.D., and Messrs. Dr. Ogden, J. J. MacLaren, LL.D., and T. M. Edmonson, Esq.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

In reviewing the work of the past year, and contemplating its present condition, it behooves us to render devout thanksgiving to Almighty God for the prosperity we have enjoyed, and the harmony that now prevails within our bounds; evidencing the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace. Rural and urban Districts bear testimony by their growth in numbers and spirituality, that our ministers are successfully prosecuting the work of "spreading scriptural holiness throughout the land;" but it is in

our Metropolitan Districts that our beloved Methodism has achieved its most rapid expansion. This great and growing city of Toronto has afforded many opportunities for extending the borders of our Zion; and the manifest blessing of God that here has rested upon our Church work, demonstrates its adaptation to the varied needs of the great multitudes that throng our places of worship. This brings with it the grateful reflection that, whether laboring in sparse settlements, upon arduous mission fields, or ministering to crowded congregations in the cultured metropolis, our preachers have been graciously owned of God as faithful ministers of the New Testament. We rejoice that over 2,000 have been added to the membership of this Conference during the past year; and the dedication of seventeen new and commodious edifices for the worship of God—most of them beautiful temples—gives assurance that our people are alert to accommodate the rapidly multiplying congregations. This liberality towards local church enterprises is an earnest of richer things in store, and, coupled with the generous support that has been accorded to Connexional Funds and projects, indicates that of many of our members it can be said, "they have done what they could." "Oh! that all might catch the flame! "Personal consecration. This means the purse as well as the person; and we recommend our preachers to give the people timely reminders that "Faith without works is dead."

We would call attention to the *hiatus* which in many cases exists between the Sunday-school and the Church, so that converted children in our schools find no stepping-stone between the Sunday-school class and the Society class. We commend to our clergy and laity the earnest effort to remedy this defect, possibly by the method suggested in the Discipline, so that the children under their care may be guarded and guided through the interesting but perilous period of youth, to the great gain and good of themselves and the Church. In connection with our Educational work, your Committee would urge that prompt payment be made of the amounts already promised and due to the Federation project, and that others who are favorable to this movement, and have not already contributed, should lose no time in giving it their tangible support by generous donations. God has been pleased to give great prosperity to our mission in Japan. The absence from this Conference of Rev. Dr. Sutherland, our General Missionary Secretary, arises from the fact that now he is fulfilling a Christian embassy to that far land; and ere he returns he will greet these "Isles of the Sea" as the latest accession to our noble sisterhood of Conferences. Thus dawns a new era for Japan; and as we bid her God-speed, it is with the fervent prayer that in the final congress of nations, this people, redeemed by the precious blood of Christ, may

"Bring forth the royal diadem,  
And crown Him Lord of all."

The card-table, the dance, the theatre, the race-course, and kindred indulgences and resorts, under many modifications and blandishments, menace the spirituality of the young and unwary. Let our members stoutly oppose these pernicious indulgences, both by word and example, and especially see that households that cherish the designation "Methodist Homes," shall be preserved inviolate against the encroachments of this multifarious and subtle enemy. The remedy is at hand in "vital godliness," which, ramify-

ing through the daily life, the home associations, and the social relations of our membership, will permit no compromise with wrong; feeling we are "doing a great work and cannot come down." To secure the rapid extension of our work and to develop the gifts of our people, there are many agencies worthy of special emphasis. Evangelists, local preachers, exhorters and prayer-leaders, cottage meetings and tract distribution. These have done grand work in the past, and by the lively exercise of their diversity of talent we, too, shall grow in zeal, efficiency and power. *Duly accredited* evangelists might be profitably employed in helping to build up the feeblers fields, and thus strengthen the hands and encourage the hearts of our underpaid and struggling ministers. We would warn our people against the worldliness and extravagance too apt to spring from growing wealth, which rob religion of its simplicity and holy zeal, and substitute ostentation and formality. It becomes us as members and churches to "receive with meekness the Word," and "lay aside every weight," so that we may "obtain the prize."

#### REPORT OF THE STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

The District Secretaries constituting, by a standing resolution of Conference, the Statistical Committee, have pleasure in reporting to the Conference, as follows:—

1. Each District Secretary was present to assist in meeting the desire of the Conference in relation to the statistics.

2. The total number of ministers and preachers in the active work, within the bounds of this Conference, is 198. These supply Circuits and Stations, embracing a total membership of some 39,000, showing a net increase of over 2,000. That this increase is not larger is owing in part to the fact that 5,915 members have removed, many of them to the North-West, where they have not been lost to our Church, but have found a wider field for Christian activity.

3. We note that \$7,000 of an increase in ministerial stipends is reported, and yet we regret to have to disclose the fact that there are thirty-six faithful servants of the Master, toiling principally on the most difficult Circuits and Missions, who have received less than \$500 from all sources.

4. The Connexional Funds stand thus:—

5. We report that nine out of thirteen Districts have dealt with the Jesuit question, several having forwarded resolutions to be considered by this Conference, while all give evidence of continued loyalty to the old-time

Methodist principles, "Equal Rights" to all, but special privileges to none.

6. Finally, your Committee has experienced considerable difficulty in tabulating the Statistics through the incompleteness and lateness of returns, and your Committee would urge the Conference to call the attention of the Chairmen of Districts to the requirement of the Discipline ordering the preservation of the records of each District in a special District Book.

#### REPORT OF SUSTENTATION FUND.

Your Committee on the Sustentation Fund has had before it, for consideration, the deficiencies of 33 ministers and probationers, amounting to \$5,800. This amount is necessary to give married men \$600, single ordained men \$300, probationers \$200. The income this year is \$1,166, an increase of \$240, which the Committee thankfully acknowledge, but which is far below the necessities of the case, only 23% of the deficiency being available for distribution. The basis of \$500 for married men was agreed upon, not rigidly adhered to, as every case was decided solely upon its own merits. The following are the recommendations of the Committee to the Conference:—

1. That in computing all claims on this Fund, a uniform sum of \$60 shall be allowed for horse keep.

2. All sums raised for this Fund be paid to the Financial Secretaries of Districts, and by them to the Treasurer of the Fund.

You will be pleased to see the prominence we give to Biblical Studies, Evidences of Christianity, Mental and Moral Science—and in this respect, as indeed in all others, we are workers together with you.

We have had a prosperous year educationally, and will graduate, on the 17th, a good class of over a dozen in the different departments. We trust that we may have your active endorsement.

#### REPORT OF THE ALMA LADIES' COLLEGE.

DEAR FATHERS AND BROTHERS,—We are grateful to a kind Providence, that has preserved the lives and blessed the labors of our teachers and students through another year. The completion and opening of McLachlin Hall marks an epoch in the history of our school. The building is not only of surpassing beauty, but most admirably adapted to the needs of collegiate work. It has so increased the capacity of the College that at least seventy more resident students can now be received, besides giving us a chapel with seating capacity of five hundred, some six additional class-rooms and an art gallery, which has been pronounced the finest in the Province.

Our enrolment has been one hundred and seventy-five students—one hundred and forty residents and thirty-five day pupils. Of the total enrolment, fifteen come from the United States. Our attendance was somewhat lessened by the prevalence of small-pox epidemic in an adjoining community.

Our Natural Science Department has been enlarged and more efficiently equipped. Our Music Department was never better attended or more firmly established in public favor. Our Commercial Department continues to attract and qualify young women for efficient services in business life. Our full Literary Course is giving young women an intellectual training of a thoroughly liberal and distinctively Christian character.

Our Art Department, with its new gallery and apparatus, is attracting students from all parts of Ontario, and in the recent departmental examinations more than maintained its former high reputation—Alma winning one hundred and eight certificates in all, taking the only four full advanced certificates given in the Province, and winning in addition two gold medal certificates.

There has been subscribed nearly \$12,000—St. Thomas contributing \$5,000. Over \$6,000 of the amount subscribed has been paid. The total expenditure incurred to date on new building is \$19,000.

The Board highly appreciates the expressions of confidence made by this Conference, as well as the hearty co-operation of many individual members thereof, and has derived much benefit from the advice and counsel of the associate members appointed by this Conference.

#### REPORT OF ALBERT COLLEGE.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHERN,—The report of the Albert College for the present year is as follows:—

There have been in attendance 152 students—112 male, and 40 females—representing nearly every Province in the Dominion, also several of the adjoining States.

Albert College is proving itself to be, as expressed by Chancellor Burwash, "The right arm of strength of Victoria." Last year, out of 50 candidates for matriculation into "Victoria," "Albert" prepared one-half, and this year, out of about 70, it prepared 28.

A prominent feature of the College work is the preparation of candidates for the preliminary examination of the Methodist Church. The first class prepared at Albert College was in the College year 1885-6, and since that time the number of such students in attendance has increased annually. Special classes are organized to meet their wants, and attention is given to prepare them especially for their examinations. Besides this, candidates have now the very great advantage of writing on their examination at the College building.

The Academy of Music, School of Art, Business College, and School of Elocution, are in charge of specialists and graduates of acknowledged teaching ability.

Full diploma courses are offered in each of these departments. In all departments—Art, Music, Business, Elocution—the College is thoroughly equipped, and is meeting with unqualified success.

A deep religious feeling has prevailed in the College throughout the entire year. This is largely owing to the noble work done by the students in the Y. M. C. A.

The College Missionary Societies have taken on a new zeal during the present year. Fourteen young men have volunteered for foreign mission work. One of their number has been chosen for the work in Africa, and the students have already secured over one-half of the \$1,100 needed to sustain him in that field.

It will be remembered that Albert College must secure its financial support entirely through its students, so that we are confident that the ministers of the Methodist Church will, in every possible way, aid in increasing its attendance. An effort is being made to secure 200 students for the coming year.

## REPORT OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY FOR 1888-9.

The number of students in attendance at Cobourg in Arts and Theology, the number of unrolled students in Law, and the number of Medical students attending our affiliated Colleges in Toronto and Montreal have been larger than ever. The total number of students has been 674, and of this 176 have been in Arts and 56 in Theology. The graduates this year, in the various faculties, numbered 105. The prospects for this coming year are bright. We have already received notice of nearly 70 matriculants in Arts, of which about 30 are from our noble Albert College.

The educational work of the year has been eminently satisfactory. Faithful work on the part of the professors has been responded to by faithful work on the part of the students, consequently few men have failed in examination; the average results have been excellent, and many candidates have secured remarkably high marks.

A thoroughly good, harmonious, and loyal spirit has prevailed throughout the year. Class-meeting and prayer-meeting have not been forgotten. With few exceptions, the students are members of the Church and consistent earnest Christians. The Students' Missionary Society has during the year sent out one of its members, a distinguished graduate of 1888, as a missionary teacher to Japan.

The financial aspect is the dark side of this Report. The cash endowment is \$145,000. The annual income from endowment, fees, and Educational Society, is \$19,000; and the annual expenditure, including interest on the debt, is \$23,000. How to stop this gap, how to adequately increase this endowment, how to put our work upon a wise, firm, and permanent basis for time to come—this is the problem which we commend to the prudence, the prayers, and the generosity of the Methodist people.

## REPORT OF ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Board of Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College have very great pleasure in presenting this, their Fourteenth Annual Report.

Our aim has been to raise the standard of education in this College, above that of any other similar institution in this country, to make it in every way as thorough and comprehensive as the best schools abroad, and to furnish to young ladies, desiring a collegiate education, opportunities equal to those provided for young men.

In our College of Literature and Science, and in our Schools of Music, Fine Art, and Elocution, each important department has its own professor, and our facilities for instruction afford unsurpassed advantages. No expense has been spared in providing superior instruments and apparatus for the effectual teaching of each subject, while our magnificent College buildings, ample lawns and grounds, render college life homelike and attractive.

Our College of Literature and Science embraces difficult branches of collegiate study, and the staff comprises the Principal, Rev. J. J. Hare, Ph.D., the lady Principal, Miss Adams, M.L.A., and five efficient assistants; besides Dr. Haanel, of Victoria University, who visits the College each week throughout the year, and gives lectures and experiments in Natural

Science. The equipment comprises a large refracting telescope, the finest of its kind in the Dominion, a compound microscope, and a working laboratory for students that is only equalled in University halls.

The School of Music is under the direction of Prof. J. W. F. Harrison, assisted by Prof. Bayley, Mrs Bradley and four other able teachers. It is with gratification we mention that this year we have been enabled to equip this department with entirely new pianofortes, twenty-two in number, including three Concert Grand and three Cabinet Grand Pianofortes, also a large new Orchestral Organ, the most complete of its class.

The School of Fine Art is under the direction of Prof. L. R. O'Brien, President of the Royal Canadian Academy, assisted by Miss Windett, Associate of the Royal Canadian Academy, and two competent teachers of Drawing and Art Needle-work.

The School of Elocution is presided over by Miss Graham, gold medalist from the Philadelphia School of Oratory.

Social culture and deportment, too often overlooked in a lady's education, are special features in our college work.

In addition, we provide a Commercial School, in which are taught Book-keeping, Telegraphy, Phonography, and Type-writing, in connection with which we have lately added to the College a Caligraph writing machine.

A system of physical training, including Calisthenics and Riding, is also provided—such as skating, tobogganing, lawn-tennis, croquet, etc.

We are pleased to be able to report an increase of income during the year, it having exceeded \$23 000. The number of pupils enrolled was 160.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ANTI-JESUIT AGGRESSION  
AND PRISON REFORM.

Your Committee, having considered the communication from the Prisoners' Aid Association, recommend that the following resolution be adopted:—

That this Conference desires to express its cordial sympathy with the philanthropic efforts of the Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada, to reform our prison system, and to aid and encourage such discharged prisoners as may have determined to lead a new life; and that the following members of this Conference be a standing committee to assist in obtaining such legislation as may be necessary better to carry out these desirable objects with power to add to their number: Rev. L. Hooker, Convener; Dr. Stafford, Dr. Johnston, Messrs. J. J. Maclaren, E. Gurney, Warring Kennedy.

Whereas the Legislature of the Province of Quebec incorporated the Society of Jesus in 1887, in contravention of Imperial Statutes; and whereas the said Legislature of the Province of Quebec did, in July, 1888, pass an Act for the settlement of the Jesuits' Estates, in which the Pope of Rome is accorded civil rights within the Dominion of Canada, and his authority to interfere in civil affairs is unblushingly conceded, and the validity of the said Act is made dependent on his sanction; and whereas by the said Act the sum of \$400,000 is taken from the public funds of the Province and placed at the disposal of the Pope, on the sole condition that the money shall be used exclusively in the Province; and whereas the said Act provides that in commemoration of this settlement of the Jesuits Estate the Laprarie Common, a part of the public domain, be transferred to the Society of Jesus; and whereas the interest of the confederated Provinces of this Dominion are inseparably connected, it becomes the imperative duty of all good citizens to oppose legislation which is derogatory to the Crown, and which imperils the peace and prosperity of the State.

*Therefore resolved*,—That we hereby enter our earnest and emphatic protest against the incorporation and endowment of this alien Society, whose history for three hundred years proves it to be a traitor to every country that gives it refuge, the foe of liberty, the oppressor of conscience, and the destroyer of morality. We protest against such legislation, embodying as it does the claim of the Pope to civil rights in this country, and the acknowledgment of such rights by the Act in question, and of his authority to sanction the Acts of a Canadian Legislature; and, furthermore, we hereby put on record our deep regret at the action of the Federal Government in deciding to leave the Act to its operation, and at the vote of 188 members of the House of Commons, refusing to ask the Governor in Council to disallow the Act; and, our regret is intensified by the subsequent determined refusal of the Government to refer the constitutionality of the Act to the legal courts for adjudication and decision.

We, therefore, urge all Christian and patriotic people identified with our Church to sink party considerations and to unite for the defence and maintenance of our civil and religious liberties, and to return to the next Parliament trusted representatives who will not fail us in our efforts to resist the ever-increasing aggressions of the Pope of Rome. And we hereby

- (12) What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the past year?
- (13) What Probationers are on the list of reserve?

2nd. To classify and arrange the memorials and resolutions from the several Districts in such manner, that when presented to Conference, they may be readily and intelligently referred to an appropriate Committee, or acted upon by the Conference as it may direct.

3rd. Having selected a suitable Secretary, shall through him be prepared to report to the Conference at the call of the chair. The report to be read from the platform, and in such manner that the pleasure of the Conference may be ascertained on each item presented.

4th. That, to facilitate the work, each District Secretary prepare, previous to coming to Conference, separate copies of all memorials and resolutions referred by his District to the Conference.

5th. That for convenience, the Secretary of the Tabulating Committee shall be *ex-officio* an Assistant Secretary of Conference.

6th. Prepare and present the Report on Statistics.

## PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE

TORONTO CONFERENCE TO THE MEMBERS OF THE  
METHODIST CHURCH UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—Assembled again in our Annual Conference, we address to you a few words of congratulation and counsel. We recognize that your interests are ours. There will, therefore, be mutual rejoicing at our successes, and sorrow at our shortcomings and failures.

It will, doubtless, be gratifying to you to learn that our net increase in membership during the past year is 1,947. Although we lay more stress upon the genuineness of the conversions, and upon the faithfulness of the subsequent lives, than upon the mere increase in numbers, yet it is a cause of great thankfulness to our Divine Master that, after making deductions for deaths and withdrawals, we can report so large a net increase.

Our Connexional Funds have been fairly well sustained. There has been especial liberality on the part of our people in contributing toward the erection of beautiful and commodious churches, and in paying the indebtedness on those previously constructed. Happy are we if these chaste material structures are emblems of the spiritual beauty and strength of our beloved Zion.

But we earnestly exhort you not to be satisfied with the maintenance of the local church with which you are identified. Catch the spirit of our noble founder, and persuade yourselves, in a certain sense, "the world is your parish." "Let the mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus," who made an infinite sacrifice that He might save the lost, and who ever went about doing good. Seek to merit the grand eulogy the Master pronounced upon Mary, when He said, "She hath done what she could." We belong to Christ, He is our Master; and, therefore, we should say, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" Our gracious Master has not left us without an answer to this important and practical question. The fair inference from His parables, and other teachings, is, that our responsibility is measured by our ability and opportunity. The wealth of the Church is a talent that should be used in sustaining efficiently all the various interests of the Church at home, and in extending the Kingdom of Christ in the regions beyond.

We earnestly exhort you to maintain cheerfulness, purity and piety in the home life. The home is the first form of the Church, and has an important influence upon the children, the Church and the nation. See to it, that Christian principles are inculcated by precept and by example. Do not mistake pleasantry for sin, nor longfacedness for piety. "Provoke not your children to wrath; but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord."

Impress upon their minds by your teachings, and especially by your conduct, that it is more important for them to be godly, than to be wealthy, or to enter into the honors their fellowmen may bestow.

We also urge you to sustain the Church of Christ in all her interests.

Attend the various means of grace regularly, and take your children with you. If it be true, as some say, the children cannot understand the sermon, the attendance of children in large numbers upon public worship, would doubtless soon change the methods of the preacher, or prove that children understand more of what is said than we are wont to think. Remember the prayer-meeting is yours, and that the class-meeting will help you in your religious life, and enable you to help others. Sympathize with your pastor, and heartily co-operate with him in promoting all the interests of the Church.

Bear in mind that the Sabbath-school is an important auxiliary of the Church, and should be maintained in thorough efficiency. You will be pleased to learn that encouraging growth is reported in all departments of Sabbath-school work.

During the past two years about four hundred new schools have been established, and a still larger number of weak schools have been aided by means of the Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund. The Sunday-school periodical literature sent out from our own Book Room, has greatly increased in circulation as well as improved in character. It has now a circulation of over 300,000 copies annually. We believe these periodicals are equal to or superior in literary merit to any other of their class, and are better adapted to the wants of our children than are any others. We very urgently advise you to take our own periodicals for your schools.

In reference to Sabbath-school work, our responsibility is very great, because in the Province of Ontario the number of scholars and teachers in connection with our schools considerably exceeds the number under the control of all the other Protestant denominations taken together. Give attention to the children and young people, that they may be retained in the Sabbath-school and in the Church.

It is our deliberate judgment, that the repeal of the Scott Act is not an indication that the Temperance sentiment is declining. We believe the Act accomplished the purpose for which it was established, viz. : the testing of public opinion in reference to the liquor traffic. In fact, it did much more than this ; it undoubtedly restrained, to a marked degree, the consumption of strong drink ; but for various reasons, which we need not here account, it was difficult fully and satisfactorily to enforce it. We trust you will join heartily in the demand of the Temperance sentiment of the hour, and use all legitimate efforts to have this demand heeded, viz. : a total prohibition of the manufacture and importation of strong drink.

We commend to your intelligent consideration, and to your liberal support, the educational interests of our Church. We exhort you to avoid bigotry and fanaticism, but to stand firmly by your constitutional rights, and to resist and resent the unjust encroachment of any alien power.

Our annual gathering, we believe, has drawn us more closely together in the bonds of Christian brotherhood. We have found the representatives you have sent to the Annual Conference brethren beloved. They are intelligent and shrewd business men, as well as kind and courteous. We are thankful for the unity that has characterized our Conference, and trust it may extend throughout the heritage of God.

And now, dearly beloved brethren, "we commend you to God, and to the Word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among them which are sanctified."
