

(Mail and Empire) James R. Keene died a few days ago but scant attention has been paid to the passing of the "Gray Wolf of Wall Street," as he was called a few years ago, and the greatest owner and breeder of thoroughbred horses in the history of the United States.

As a rule Keene was a "bear," and in the past ten or fifteen years the going has been rather hard for the bears. His last big deal was in the Columbus and Hocking coal and iron securities in 1910. The coal collapsed, and dragged Keene into litigation.

He fell in love with Miss Daltingfield, whose brother was a United States judge, but their courtship was beset with difficulties, and the girl married in the face of opposition from the bride's family.

His first deals on the New York stock exchange were undertaken in 1862.

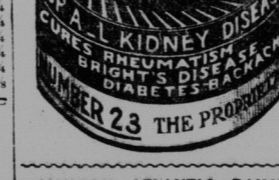
