London, Oct. 14.—A British official statement issued tonight tells of the latest offensive by the British troops between La Bassee and Arras.

A letter received from Pte. R. Lay-with ton Colborne of the 14th Royal Mounted Rifles to his brother, F. C. Colborne of the C. P. R., gives a vivid descrip-

glum.

I have just received your parcel of papers at six p.m. as I came off duty. Have just finished reading them and can asure you I was glad to get them. Well, I have been here in the firing line since September first and just about know what it is like. Say, I can't begin to tell you, and we are at present in the quietest part of the western front. We landed in Havre, France, about the first (I guess, as you annot keep run of the days) and ere sent from the Canadian base as there to the front, a two-day and one night journey by train, then about a five-hour march. We went right into the firing trench. Say, maybe I wasn't a little shaky, a continual fire of rifles, machine guns and heavy artililery. It sure is a case of "keep your head down."

We are in the trenches for fifteen days at a time, five days in firing trench, five in the supports and five days' rest. If we didn't get this rest I think some of the fellows would go nuts sure. It is so nerve racking.

We are shifted along the lines to different places every now and again. This last time we only had one day's rest. The Allies are advancing all along the line at this front, and we expect to move at any time. Then there will sure be something doing. I hope and pray, and wish you would all do the same, that I will come through all right. We all sleep in dug-outs in the side of the trench and cook our own meals. The grub is O. K. and most of the dug-outs roomy and dry. We sleep with the whole equipment on, boots, hat and everythins. Only chance to remove them is when we go back to the billets and bath. That means a bath every month.



The first great objective of the stalian campaign is on the eve of accomplishment, according to advices received here today from the Italian front. The powerful stronghold at Gorizia is being bombarded from the north, west and south and its fall is considered imminent.

The fortress has been called the Port Arthur of Europe and the Italian artillery and infantry have rivalled the energy and spirit of sacrifice of the Japanese troops of bringing the mighty fortress into subjection.

The magnitude of the task was realized from the beginning of the war by Count Cadorna, the Italian generalissimo, and the statement was attributed to him that it would require five months to reduce the fortress. The Italian campaign was opened on last May 25.

Gorizia is the key to Trieste and che Istrian peninsula, the eastern are in the Istrian provinces. That region comprises one of the most precious elements of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, its principal seaports, arsenals and commercial outlets.

Nature and artifice have made of Gorizia a stronghold of extraordinary strength. Beyond the Isonzo River, which flowes some ten miles distant from the Italian boundary, is a precipitous mountain wall, at the south of which lies Gorizia, located in the hollow of an amphitheatre of hills, fortified by the Austrians with all the art of modern engineering.

It had been considered a practically impregnable position. Its chief defences to the south are on the great Carso plateau, while to the north the mountain wall runs nearly twenty miles to the strongly defended fortness of Talmino. miles to the strongly defended toreress of Tolmino.

forces. The capture of the fortress
will lay the road open to the immediate occupation of Trieste, twenty-two


