FACTS AND FANCIES.

To Brighten Carpets.

When a carpet begins to lose its colors, if warm water and ammonia are at once applied, they will restore them. Apply as follows: Into a pailful of warm water put about three or four tablespoonfuls of ammonia, and with a soft flannel cloth dipped in this ammonia water go over the entire carpet, rubbing vigorously. As each portion of the carpet within your reach is washed. This treatment will be found to have effectually renovated the carpet, except it contains certain shades of green which will pother ammonia (it is well to try a washel to see that it is well seasoned, and serve in cups, or on toast.

THE HARNESS .: At This Season of the Year Repair and Oil It Properly.

At this season do not neglect the harness. Take out all the strings, wires, nails and chains that have been used in cases of emergency, and have all the weak or broken places est, and copper does not injure leather as does iron. Have the harness repaired before putting a drop of oil repaired before putting a drop of oil on it. Take apart and put in a tub of warm water. Let it soak until the dirt starts easily. Use soap or soap powder. Wash each piece until clean, then place in such a position so it will drain. A small stiff brush is a good thing with which to start the dirt from the creases. By the time the last piece is washed, the first parts are ready to be blacked. Wipe off all water. Take one strap at a time on a board and with a at a time on a board and with a swab give both sides a going over, after which wipe thoroughly. As soon as each piece is blacked, lay it is a clean place.


A harness should be blacked and oiled before it has time to get very oiled before it has time to get very dry, for the water opens the pores of the leather and the oil "dries in" much better. As soon as all the har-ness is blacked, put on the oil, go-ing over each piece separately. Let the harness lie over night and the next day go over it again and work the strang through the hands, as this the straps through the hands, as this makes them more pliable. Good neatsfoot oil is best. If the straps are very stiff, add a little kerosene. Two parts of oil and one of kerosene with little kerosene are of kerosene with little kerosene are of kerosene. with a little lamp black make a good oil. But if the harness has been blacked as directed, the lamp black is not needed. Ten cents' worth of blacking will cover two harnesses. Two days is usually enough to get the oil well soaked in, then rub with old papers. If a finished job is de-sired, go over it with castile soap or Miller's dressing. The patent leather can be brightened up by using turpentine and a soft cloth, then rub dry with a clean one.




FIG. 1. GROUND PLAN. FIG. 2. CROSS SECTION berries and other small fruits, but the lower temperature makes them I picked the small fruits I needed for the table in the morning, cleaned them, and set the dish containing them in the refrigerator. They were so cool and nice, and we all seemed to relish them so much! A friend of strawberry time, remarked when I perature which gave them such a sary sweet, cool and delicious taste. She A vine may be grafted in 10 minutes, will make a tremendous growth the first season and bear a big crop of the improved variety the lets. On the ice they are safe for a week after the purchase. Cooked meats are kept in good condition until they are consumed. If the head of the house could only follow the daily waste that goes from his table. his pantry, and his dining-room, for the lack of ice, as his wife is obliged to, he would no longer delay the ice house and the refrigerator. The time within his reach. It requires but lit-tle mechanical skill to construct




POULTRY HOUSES. Two Plans Which Furnish Some Infermation for Those Who Intend to

tablishing poultry quarters on a farm is to select a location. A great deal depends on whether or not the selection is made judiciously and for interests of the fowls. 



HOME FROM THE WAR.

Twenty-sixth Left 400 Behind, Claimed by Bullets and Fever in Philippines.

San Francisco, April 20.-The overdue transport Garonne arrived today, bringing the officers and 849 men of the twentysixth volunteer infantry.

The Garonne sailed from Iloilo, Island of Panay, March 6. She had rough weather to Nagasaki, where she arrived March 16, but experienced the worst storm of the voyage March 30. She ran into a terrible gale that lasted three days. Furniture was pounded to pieces and a valuable piano in the main saloon was ruined. During this trying time the troops suffered greatly with the cold. The trans port had been making less than 200 miles a day and as the coal was nearly exhaust-

Commissioner Drake followed with his claims for the appointment of Mr. McKenney, stating that this was the best man for the position.

Commissioner Frink said that his idea had been to have the matter of qualification settled by an examination of the candidates, but this had been disregarded by the board. The motion for the appointment was then put. The vote on Mr. Gleeson's motion for the appointment of Patrick McKenney was a tie, the yeas being Commissioners Gleeson, Drake and Gallagher, and the nays Commissioners Gleeson, Berryman, Frink and Shaw; the chairman gaye the deciding vote against the motion.

Commissioner Frink then had his nomination for the appointment of Dr. Simon put before the meeting, and it was carried with the deciding vote of the chairman.

Commissioner Berryman then suggested that the secretary be instructed to notify the new inspector and for him to take his instructions, for the time being, from the chairman; also, that a committee be appointed to draw up rules of duties of the inspector and that they be presented to the board at the next meeting.






