The Mad Dog at Spring Hill.

NINE PERSONS BITTEN.

(From the Spring Hill Journal.)

No fewer than nine persons were bitten—some of them very severely—by a dog supposed to be very rabid, on last Wednesday, the 17th inst., when the whole community into a state of excitement and alarm. The first person bitten—namely—was Mr. G. Leadbetter, Mr. L. was driving on the Saltpetre road, home from work, following the wagon. When a little distance from Saltpetre, they overtook a dog which immediately attacked that of Mr. Leadbetter, who gave out of the wagon to beat the strange dog off, when it bit him on the calf of the leg and afterwards sprang at his throat, which however, it failed in catching, as Mr. L. had his coat buttoned up and a heavy comforter round his neck. Mr. L.'s dog then came to the assistance of his master, and George seized the opportunity to get into the wagon and drive off, the strange dog running ahead of them.

On coming to Saltpetre, the dog was again seen, and was followed by a pig which it had killed. It attempted to seize a son of Mr. Robert Gilroy who was fencing, but Mr. James Gilroy's dog showed the other dog a hole. The strange dog then ran towards Spring Hill, and flew at and bit a daughter of Mr. Timothy Leadbetter. Turning south at the corner of the Post Office, it bit a son of Mr. James Cudhea and flew at his dog. Mr. Cudhea saw the occurrence, but did not imagine the dog was mad. It then crossed easterly and bit a boy named Simpson and a son of Mr. Alex. Russell. Making its way towards the village it sprang at and bit Mr. Jas. Hawson (youngster) on the hand. He called out to some persons at a little distance, "that dog has bit me." Mr. Simon Fraser, teacher, on hearing this lifted his foot and kicked the dog right when it seized him by the foot, taking a piece clean out of his foot. Going towards the East Slope, it seized hold of a daughter of Mr. Clarys, threw her into the drain, lacerating her face, and probably might have injured her fatally had it not been for the timely assistance of Mr. Wm. Dick, who drove the beast off with a crowbar.

It now became apparent that the dog was mad, and the news soon spread. A number of persons threw stones at it, which it turned round and flew at the throat of Mr. Robert Armstrong, loader, who putting out his arm to defend himself, received a severe bite on the arm. The dog was made for the R. R., chased by a number of men on the "speedy" armed with guns. Mr. Cudhea taking the main road in pursuit, with his horse and wagon. Mr. Cudhea succeeded in overtaking the dog a few miles from S. Hill and shot it. The parties bitten procured medical assistance, had their wounds cauterized and remedies applied for the extraction of the poison. The girl Canty was very ill for two or three days, but seems to be recovering. Robert Armstrong's arm is much swollen, incapacitating him from work for a number of days. Mr. Cudhea's boy also suffered considerably. We trust the men employed here have been successful in extracting all the poison, and that there will be no unfavorable results. A number of dogs which were also bitten have been shot, and there are many who say that the shooting process may continue and are far too many dogs at present running at large.

Irish Affairs.

London, May 11.—Four men, Madden, King, Moran, and Waterfall, were arrested near Castlebar, County Mayo, under the Coercion Act. John Heffernan, a prominent Land Leager, was arrested at Cork under the Coercion Act.

Archbishop Croke, writing to Parnell, says, "You are the chosen trustful leader not alone of the Irish Parliamentary party, but of the Irish people, and I recognize you fully and faithfully as such. You state that your abstention from voting cannot influence the second reading of the Land Bill; its final acceptance or rejection cannot therefore arise until after it has been discussed in committee. Why take a step which, while it can do no good, may split the party and create the division you deplore?"

The Secretary of the Ballinacorney Branch of the Land League has been arrested under the Coercion Act.

In the House of Commons to-night Mr. Shaw advocated the suspension of evictions, and hoped that all the Irish members would unite to prevent the destruction of the Land Bill.

A bullet was fatally shot near Longtree on Wednesday night. Two arrests have been made of suspected assassins.

London, May 14.—The Land Bill makes little progress owing to the anxiety of members who know next to nothing about the land question, and who insist on making set speeches. Parnell has not spoken, but will probably on Thursday, when a division on the second reading will probably be taken. In the meantime, the condition of Ireland grows daily more alarming, and resistance to law is becoming more open and desperate. The Telegraph says:—"The rod of coercion has broken in the hands of authority, and disaffection shows that it has no power. What is the actual result? The answer lies in the ugly word 'anarchy.' The rod is at work and every day brings its batch of defiant outrages."

COAL ASHES FOR FERTILIZING.

The use of coal ashes mixed into

clayey soils has been found of

great benefit, and its value is vouch-

ed by many agriculturists. The Hus-

bandman reports an experiment made

with coal ashes, applied at the rate of

200 bushels to twenty square rods, or

ten bushels to the square rod. The

soil was compact and heavy. The

ashes were drawn on late in autumn,

and spread on the ground, which had

been recently plowed. The ground

was planted with garden vegetables.

The beneficial result was in correc-

tion of the heavy character of the

soil, the ashes acting mechanically

and not as manure, and producing

a satisfactory improvement.
