The Mad Dog at Spring Hill.

NINE PERSONS BITTEN.

(From the Spring Hill Journal.) No fewer than nine persons were bitten-some of them very severelyby a dog supposed to be very rabid, on last Wednesday, the occurrence throwing the whole community into a state of excitement and alarm. The first person bitten-slightly-was Mr. G. Leadbetter. Mr. L. was driving on the Saltsprings road, homewards, his dog following the waggon. When a little distance from Saltsprings, they overtook a dog which immediately attacked that of Mr. Leadbetter, who got out of the waggon to beat the strange dog off, when it bit him on the calf of the leg and afterwards sprang at his throat, which, however, it failed in catching, as Mr. L. had his coat buttoned up and a heavy comfor-ter round his neck. Mr. L's dog then came to the assistance of his master, and George seized the opportunity to get into the waggon and drive off, the

strange dog running ahead of them. On coming to Saltsprings, the dog was again seen, sucking the blood of a pig which it had killed. It attempt-ed to seize a son of Mr. Robt. Gilroy hole. The strange dog then ran to-wards Spring Hill, and flew at and bit a daughter of Mr. Timothy Leadbetter. Turning south at the corner of the Post Office, it bit a son of Mr. James Cudhea and flew at his dog. Mr. Cadhea saw the occurrence, but did not imagine the dog was mad. It then crossed easterly and bit a boy named Simpson and a son of Mr. Alex. Russell. Making its way towards the village it sprung at and bit Mr. Jas. Hewson (younger) on the hand. He called out to some persons at a little distance, "that dog has bit me." Mr. Simon Fraser, teacher, on hearing this lifted his foot to give the dog a kick, when it seized him by the foot, taking a piece clean ont of his boot. 
