NOMINATION DAY PROCEEDINGS HERE

Two Candidates Nominated to Contest Seat—Public Meeting After.

Nomination day proceedings here Tuesday were unusually quiet. Returning Officer James B. Stewart held his court at the Oddfellows Hall from 12 to 1 o'clock and at the last minute hour declared two nominations duly filed, viz: Pius Michael, Liberal, and William S. Montgomery, Conservative.

A poll was demanded and the court then adjourned. In the meantime a large crowd had gathered at the Open House where the candidates and others were to speak.

Messrs. John Hargreaves and D. A. Stewart were chosen joint chairmen. Mr. Pius Michael was the first speaker and he was given a great reception and was frequently applauded. He spoke in both English and French.

He was followed by W. S. Montgomery who in a labored address endeavored to show why he and the Melgren party should be favored with the suffrage of the electors.

Mr. H. McCreary, of Dalhousie, was the next speaker. This was his first appearance on the platform here and his reception was most flattering. He scored point after point against Mr. Montgomery and was frequently applauded.

Mr. A. T. LeBlanc was the next speaker and he also played Mr. Montgomery to a finish, being frequently and loudly applauded. He also paid his respects to Messrs. Baxter, Smith and Jones.

SPRINKLER SYSTEM SAVED PLANT

McLennan Foundry Moulding Shop Caught on Fire Monday Evening.

The automatic sprinkler system installed in the McLennan Foundry & Machine Works undeniably prevented a serious fire at that plant Monday evening.

About 7:45 an alarm was rung in from box 81 and the department responded promptly. It was found that the moulding shop of the above works was on fire. The sprinkler system had practically extinguished the fire except high up in the rafters. The chemicals soon extinguished the blaze.

Damage was confined to rafters, interior walls and ceiling, and washed away by the rain.

HYDRO ELECTRIC REPORT GOOD

Engineer Says Upsalquitch Can Supply Plenty Power for Our Needs.

It will be remembered that in September Mr. W. H. Mahon, C. E. of the Dominion Water Powers branch visited Campbellton. He viewed a number of power sites and gave it as his opinion that the Great Falls, Upsalquitch, was the most feasible one. In company with Town Engineer R. R. Beebe he visited this site, took levels and now his report as follows has been received.

Report of H. W. Mahon. Upsalquitch River—Great Falls. Location—About five miles above Upsalquitch station and immediately below mouth of Boland Brook. Also 12 miles from town of Campbellton.

Accessibility—By boat up river from Upsalquitch station or about three miles by road from Napier Station.

General Scheme—A dam at the head of rapids located on an outcrop of rock. Total length of dam would be about 900 feet, 600 feet of which would only be 5 feet high, and 300 feet with an average depth of 35 feet.

The power house to be located at the foot of the rapids, well protected from ice. About 300 feet of pipe line would be required.

HEAD—40 feet. WATER SUPPLY—Drainage area 790 square miles. ABSOLUTE MINIMUM—132 sec. ft. ORDINARY MINIMUM—217 sec. ft. ORDINARY MAXIMUM—613 sec. ft.

STORAGE—There are no large lakes on the drainage basin, and it is not known if there are any economical storage sites. There is an excellent dam site on Boland brook with a long stretch of still water above, but a survey would have to be made to find out if economical storage could be obtained.

The river above the power site has fairly steep banks, but as the lower part does not rise very fast the water will flood back far enough to give sufficient storage for daily fluctuations with only a small draw down.

REMARKS—The town of Campbellton is now being supplied with electric light and power by a gas producer plant which is loaded to capacity. An investigation of the possible power sites in the vicinity of the town was made in September and the site described above was considered to be the most economical site for a amount of power required. A suitable fishway would have to be built as salmon go up this river in fairly large quantities.

SOURCES OF DATA—Run-off records at Upsalquitch station and other investigations by Dominion Water Power Branch.

The above report was read at the town council meeting and was discussed at some length. Coun. Belle-Isle spoke of a site on the Main river at Big Cross Point which at no greater expenditure was estimated would give much more power. The whole matter was left over until Mr. Foss could come to Campbellton to discuss it.

While it would be advantageous to Campbellton to get as much power as possible we feel strongly that no time should be lost in getting the Upsalquitch project under way. The fishing lease on this river expires in March 1932, and if renewed might prejudice the town's interests.

In regard to the Main river there are so many valuable fishing rights which are owned by wealthy fishermen that it would mean years of delay in fighting them to obtain power privileges. While we think Campbellton's rights should count more than the pleasure of a few Americans, yet with the money behind the latter, it would be a costly fight. Let us grasp at what is offered and not go chasing shadows.

COUNCIL MEETING MONDAY EVENING

Much Accumulated Business Put Through—Electric Light Affairs.

A meeting of the Town Council, the first since Sept. 27th was held Monday evening. His Worship Mayor McKay presiding. There were present Coun. Belle-Isle, Patterson, St. Onge, Duncan, Moors, Bissett and Chamberlain. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Several communications re the Central street subway were read and laid on the table. This matter seems to be progressing favorably.

The Mother Superior of the Hotel Dieu Hospital wrote several letters re Thomas Dunn, a T. B. patient who was sent to that institution some months ago. Dunn is not a resident of Restigouche or of this district and as he is well treated refuses to give any information as to his proper domicile. This patient is a serious problem. He cannot be turned out of doors, yet the Hotel Dieu Hospital should not keep him, and there is no other available institution to which he can be sent. Clearly he is not a town charge, but what can be done with him. The matter was referred to the Town Solicitor for advice as to what steps to take.

Another group of citizens are asking for adjustment of their assessments. These were referred to the Assessment and Appeal Committee.

The N. B. Power commission submitted report of engineer on Upsalquitch power proposition. See report elsewhere.

Fred Maltais still claims the town owes him \$15.00 for rent of lot for fire hose shed. Offered to accept tax receipt \$11.00 in settlement. Referred to Public Property and Streets Committee.

Residents of Arran Street are asking for street lights. Referred to Electric Light Committee.

A very large number of departmental accounts were passed, and the usual committee reports for September and October.

Coun. Bissett reported recommending that the W. H. Miller Co. Ltd., be granted electric current for 35-40 H.P. at regular rates, they to erect transmission line—Recommendation adopted and solicitor authorized to draft agreement.

The subway matter was taken up and His Worship was authorized to press further in regard to this matter.

His Worship also reported that the legal transfer of the I. N. R. property to the town was about completed. Coun. Belle-Isle devoted much time to the criticism of the management of the electric light department, and had at the power house. He was even more anxious than to be called to order several times. Coun. Moors moved that the Town purchase \$12,000 Victory bonds 1934 with the sinking fund now on deposit at the bank—Carried.

Coun. Belle-Isle moved that a fence be erected around and a cover over the surplus pile of coal which could not be held in the regular coal shed at the power house.

Coun. Bissett moved in amendment that this matter be referred to the Electric Light Committee with power to amend. Amendment carried. The council then adjourned.

HYPOPHOSPHITES HERE YESTERDAY

Discuss Feasibility of Developing Upsalquitch and Other Sites.

Dr. E. A. Smith and C. O. Foss, C. E. of the N. B. Hydro Commission with K. H. Smith, C. E. of the Dominion Water Power branch were in town last evening and met the members of the Town Council in committee to discuss Hydro development for this district.

The recent survey of the Upsalquitch was gone into and Mr. Foss was of the opinion that it would not be worth while developing because of the excessive cost per H.P. He strongly advised the Council to take power from the Nepisiquit development.

The matter was thoroughly discussed from all points and a report will be submitted to the next meeting of the council.

DECREASE OF RAILWAY FREIGHT RATES. Ottawa, Nov. 22—A general reduction of ten per cent in freight rates on all steam roads under the jurisdiction of the Board of Railway Commissioners will go into effect on Dec. 1, it was announced by Chief Commissioner F. B. Carvell this afternoon.

GREAT BRITAIN. London, Nov. 23—The council of agriculture yesterday by a vote of 47 to 11 adopted a resolution pressing the government to maintain the regulations providing for the slaughter of cattle at the port of entry.

Sir A. Grigith-Boscawen, minister of agriculture, told the meeting that the matter would very soon be dealt with by the cabinet.

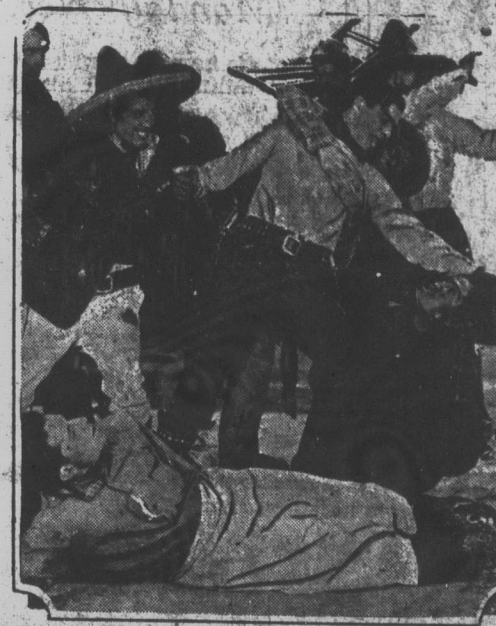

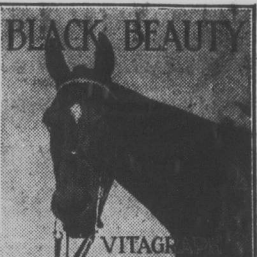
