ESTABLISHED ORIGIN OF MAN

Simla, India, April 27-It has been definitely established that man originated from apes, according to an opinion expressed here today, by Dr. Alex Hrdlicka, of Washington, D.C., who has headed the expeditions of the U.S. National Museum of Anthropology to many parts of the world. He is here to examine the discovery recently made of five different species of fossils of anthrouoid apes in Ssevalik Hills. Addressing a representative gathering Dr. Hrdlicka urged India to undertake seriously, researches in the Ssevalik Hills, which he said might contain important evidence concerning the origin of the human race.

J., retired from the U.S. Navy, with the rank of Commander-in-Chief's Steward, at the Boston Navy Yard, after rounding out twenty years of faithful service; for which he carries official letters and citations for honest, efficient and faithful service. Prior to leaving the service, Mr. Diggs returned a week ago from an extensive cruise to Cuba, Haiti, and the Dominican Republic. He left Wednesday for his home, 178 Second Street, Englewood, New Jersey, from where he will be pleased to hear from any of his comrades and shipmates of former years. He served as Chief Steward to Admiral H. B. Wilson, Commander-in-Chief of the Atlantic Fleet on the Flagship, U.S.S. Pennsylvania until 1921, and since on the U.S.S. Preston.

Mr. Diggs tells many thrilling experiences of his sea life, including visits to the Near and Far East, Ausralia, New Zealand, Central and South America, Africa, and twice to the Holy Land and Calvary. 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Chicago Entertains Prince Kojo

Chicago is entertaining royalty in the person of Prince Kojo Trovalou-Houenou, the son of a line of kings who ruled the country of Dahomey, prior to the French conquest. The royal guest is president of the Universal League for the Welfare of the Black Race, and a native of West Africa. He has a Parisian educa-

"I feel like Columbus, since my visit among the colored people of America," he said. "America has the most intelligent, the most artistic and the kindest people of the whole black race, and it was a great discovery to me to realize the latent talent in my people here.

"America is not utilizing these forces that lie, like a gold mine, waiting for development," the prince continued.

"The most original art in America lies in the colored men and women. America needs the artistic impulse of her colored people to balance her economic and scientific leadership. However, I fear that America will never give her recognition to the genius in sculpture, painting, drama and dancing that abounds in her colored folk."

He was taken to Paris by his father at the age of 10, studied in Bordeaux College, received his degree and entered the University of Paris. He is a barrister at the Paris Court of Appeals and has a medical degree as well.

Negro Wrongly Executed, It is Said

Two Negroes have been executed, one electrocuted and one hanged, for assaults upon white women, of which a white boy is now under suspicion and is being held for Grand Jury action at Maryville, Tennessee.


One of the Negroes was Maurice Mays, whose case was fought by the Knoxville and other Tennessee Branches of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. \$1.50 Mays was accused of having murdered a white woman, and despite evidence that he was at home when the crime was committed, was convicted on circumstantial evidence and electrocuted.

> The second Negro was hanged in Alabama.

The white boy, now charged with the crime for which Mays died, is an employee of an aluminum concern. Comparison of the criminal's handwriting with the writing of the white boy in the company's books led to his arrest. In all 32 attacks have been made in the vicinity of Marryville, 8 women having been killed by their assailant when they screamed, and a number seriously injured. The first of the cases, that of Mrs. Bertie Lindsey, who was shot and killed, resulted in the conviction and execution of

The white boy is of a prominent family, and was once tried and acquitted of murder, and served in the world war.
