

A TORY DEPEAT IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

MONCTON, N. E., Feb. 16.—The Conservatives received a staggering blow in Westmoreland county on Saturday. A bye-election took place in the county to fill the vacancies in the Provincial Legislature. The Opposition, or Conservative, candidates were Mr. Stevens, editor of the Moncton Times, and Mr. Powell, solicitor and confidental agent of Josiah Wood, the former Dominion member. Both Opposition candidates were elected a year ago by 700 majority. The Provincial Government candidates were J. A. McQueen, straight People's Candidate dates were J. A. McQueen, straight Liberal, and Mr. Killam, an independent supporter of the Liberal party. In this county, unlike most Provincial constituencies, the Provincial fighting lines are Dominion lines. The Conservatives declared publicly that this would be a test election as to Dominion polities, and the election as to Dominion politics, and the whole force of the Dominson Government machine, and the Intercolonial Railway, was thrown against the Provincial Government candidates, but the Conservative majority in Moncton city and parish was reduced from between 600 and 700 to 193, and the ceneral result is that McQueen. of Cardwell, and Elgin Myers, Q.C., was reduced from between 600 and 700 to 193, and the general result is that McQueen, the straight Liberal, heads the poll by a good majority. The second place is doubtful between Killam and Powell, with the chances in favor of Killam, while Editor Stevens is away down at the bottom of the list. The result has not only restored the prestige of the Blair Government, but has encouraged the Liberal party to make in-

prestige of the Blair Government, but has encouraged the Liberal party to make increased effort in the Dominion contest.





HISTORY REPEATING ITSELF. To some men it has always been fascinating sophism that by paying more than is actually necessary for everything all around, Dick enriches Tom, while Tom at the same time enriches Dick. If any such men exist in London, and they heard Mr. Jury's speech on Saturday night, or it they read it in the ADVERTISER to-day, they need no longer have any misgivings on the subject.

Mr. Jury's exposition of the effect of so-called "protection" on employment and wages was a clear statement of facts, the result of intelligent study and actual experience as a workingman. Mr. Jury told the mass meeting in the City Hall, what the workingmen have long since learned in the best school, that no matter how high taxes on imports are placed, or how much benefit these imposts may confer upon some manufacturers, under no circumstances does a "protective" tariff increase the wages of the workers or add to their employment. On the contrary, the practical result is to increase the cost of production and decrease wasumption, thus reducing the demand for labor. The effect of the high tax policy on the stove trade was adduced as a case in point. No more pertinent examples of the absurdity of the contention that "protective" tariffs help the stove operatives could have been given than the experiences of the workmen in the Gurney establishment at Toronto and of the stove molders in Hamilton under combine management. It was an eye-opener to many artisans outside the trade, but we are assured a perfectly correct representation of the lamentable condition of the business at the pres-

Mr. Jury was pretty severe in his dene decrees, and to keep it there. no matter how strongly a needy purchaser may protest, while affording no protection to workmen from outside competition in labor. There is no tax keeping out labor; there is no protection to labor; there has been, as Mr. Edward Blake recently pointed out, a premium against it in the shape of the expenditure of large sums of money paid out to assist workmen and children from the slums of the great old world cities to come to Canada to compete with our workmen and keep wages down. Now, why should the workmen tolerate this? Why should the workmen condone the past record of Hon. John Carling, under whose auspices the expenditures for immigration have been made ! Why should they longer indorse a system which, while it robs them of a large portion of their earnings for the benefit of the millionaire combinesters is impotent to increase their wages or to give them steady employment? The only thing that can effect that is cheap raw material, cheapened production, and a measure of unrestricted trade with our neighbors that shall widen the market of Canadian producers, increase the prosperity of the people and their purchasing power, and at the same time aid in the speedy settlement of our vacant lands and the development of our marvelously rich natural resources.

Some interested citizens object to this policy. They are either directly interested in one or other of the combines, or they are to a greater or less extent influenced by these men, who are ordinarily good citizens, but who are loathe to give up their special privileges, just as the British land owners parted with the utmost reluctance with their Government-granted right to collect a tax from the food of the people.

History repeats itself in one other aspect of the case. In the years immediately preceding the abolition of the corn laws-those most' obnoxious "protective" duties-the workers in Great Britain were in a terrible condition of poverty. Many thousands of them were idle and without means of subsistence. Starvation stared them in the face. Still, the landlords insisted that it was necessary to keep bread dear if the prestige of Great Britain was to be maintained. They prophesied direct disaster to the country

if the "protective" tariff was removed. They asserted that Britain would be shor, of her glory if she threw off even a portion of the shackles that retarded her development and dwarfed the energies of her people. In this year of grace 1891 their Canadiancounterparts tell us that a similar partial emancipation, to be secured at the desire of the Canadian people, and indorsed by the British Government, will degrade the Dominion, result in annexation, and bring n us a host of evils.

It is the same old story; the fearful privileged ones we have always with us while such a system is tolerated.



LONDON AND ENVIRONS. CARROTTY NELL'S" ASSASSIN

ndon Police Believe They Have Got the Right Man—The Prisoner in Court.

The Lendon Police Bolieve They Have Got the Right Man—The Prisoner in Court.

London, Feb. 17.—The latest discovery made by the Metropolitan Police in connection with the Whitechapel murder of Friday morning last, bids fair to connect the man Sadler, now in custody, with this "Jack the Ripper" crime. The police now have in their possession a sharp, dangerous-looking knife, stained with blood, and showing traces of having recently been washed. The blood stains were examined microscopically by Dr. Phillips, the police surgeon attached to the Leman street police station, who has no doubt that the stains are of human blood. This knife was traced to the possession of Sadler, who, as stated, was a fireman on board a steamer, which arrived from Turkey. The police have no doubt that Sadler was the murderer of "Carrotty Nell."

From the time it became known that Sadler had been arrested and was formally charged with the murder of "Carrotty Nell," the greatest excitement has prevailed in and about Whitechapel. The Stepney police station, in Arbor Square, where the prisoner was detained, is surrounded by a vast crowd of people, mostly women. The women are eager for a sight of the prisoner. Wild threats of lynching and tearing the prisoner to pieces were uttered by the most excited of those females. When the man was removed to the police court an immense force of police was employed, and every precaution necessary was taken to prevent the Whitechapel mob from lynching the prisoner.

Further details in regard to the blood-stained knife in the possession of the police show Sadler sold the weapon to a sailor on Friday, the day of the murder.

The prisoner was placed in the dock yesterday afternoon. His face was dirty and scratched. He seemed to be utterly careless as to what happened to him, and is apparently entirely composed. He kept his hands in his pockets, and glanced calmly around him, as if he was a disinterested spectator. Eduring the 'examination a man testified that he had seen Sadler in g company with the murdered described in detail the visit of Sadler to a small "coffee shop," known in Whitechapel parlance as a "bad house." Sadler, according to the witness, sat in the coffee shop with the murdered girl and seemed to be quarreling with her. Sadler, the witness said, claimed to have been robbed. Finally Sadler and "Carrotty Nell" left the coffee shop separately. The witness admitted the prisoner's face was "scratched and bloody when he was seen in the coffee shop.

Upon the conclusion of the testimony the prisoner was remanded until Feb. 24.


