LONDON, Aug. 10.—An election has been held in West Mayo to fill the vacancy in held in West Mayo to fill the vacancy in the House of Commons caused by the appointment of John Deazey, anti-Par-mellite, to the stewardship of the Chiltern hundreds. At the last election Deazey was returned by a majority of 2.847, and the district is so strongly anti-Parnellite that when a vacancy occurred the Parnellites did not nominate a candidate. The anti-Parnellites placed Mt. Robert Ambrose in nomination and he was declared elected.

Scarcity of Small Change.

Scarcity of Small Change.

Ross, Aug. 10.—There is great scarcity of small silver in Italy owing to the rise in the rate of exchange. The continual illegal exportation of silver to France and Switzeriand has induced the firm of Gavazzi in Milan, to coin tokens, which are generally sacepted. Other merchants use liera notes and peatage stamps. With a view of remedying this evil, Signor Gavazzi, Minister of Finance, has ordered the issue of bronze can to the amount of \$2,000,000, and of liera notes to the amount of \$6,000,000. This appears to be the only remedy, as the Latin Union convention does not allow the issue of such an amount of smaller silver.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Assistant Sec-retary of the Treasury Hamliu makes public a letter written to Collector Hop-tics cancerning two horses recently impublic a letter written to Collector Hop-kins concerning two horses recensly im-ported at that port which were invoiced and entered at a valuation of \$100 and \$110. Appraiser Kimball bad returned the value of the borses at \$125 and \$135 respectively. The secretary says that horses valued at less than \$150 are subject to a duty of \$30 each, and, if valued at \$150 or duty of \$30 each, and, if valued at \$150 or over, they are dutiable at 30 per cent. ad valorem. Inasmuch as the valuation found by the appraiser did not classify either of the animals within the scope of the ad valorem rate of duty, the specific rate applies, and consequently penal duties would not accrue.

## Father McGlynn Honored. Perfumes

No Retraction Was Demanded of Him in Rome, and He Took Back Nothing.

New York, Aug. 10.—It is evident the friends of the Rev. Father McGiynn, recently restored to the priesthood, do not propose to let his alleged enomies rest with the simple fact of his restoration, and the enmity which arose between the followers of Dr. McGiynn and Archbishop Corrigan is increasing.

of Dr. McGlynn and Archbishop Corrigan is increasing.

Tuesday night about 5,000 people gathered at Washington Park in a picnic and festival of the Iriends of Dr. Edward McGlynn. It was a jubilee over the doctor's restoration to the priesthood. Dr. McGlynn was treated to an ovation, and in the course of his remarks said:

"I rejoice in no personal triumph. It is triumph of truth over misrepresentation. I have always asserted in teaching those doctrines which were so misrepresented at Rome that I was moved by love and truth. I felt a determination to preach the truth, come what might, even it it meant burning at the stake. I do not detract one iota of what I taught, neither did I in my letter to the Holy Father. When I was in Rome he demanded no retraction. He gave his blessing to me and my work. Nothing can justify calumnious misrepresentations of me to the Propaganda at Rome."

The speaker here mentioned the name of the Archbishop of New York. As he did so there was a storm of hisses. Dr. McGlynn raised his hand and remonstrated, and finally the indignation of those present against Archbishop Corrigan spent itself, and he continued his address.

Dr. McGlynn then read two letters which he said had been withheld and which was written before his trip to Rome. One from

Satolii said: 'Beassured your reverence will be received by the Sacred Congregation of the Propaganda and by the Holy Father himself with all kindness and with all the regard that you could desire, and be, moreover, assured that there will be nothing olse done but joyfully continu with the arostolic benediction, already happily complete, the act of reconciliation. God will biess your steps, and on your return will multiply upon you the precious gifts of his grace to make fruitful the work of your ministry, particulary of preaching.'

The other letter was from a distinguished Catholic prelate, very high in the confidence of the apostolic delegate. It says: "The delegate is pleased with your idea of not taking charge of a parish, but going around freely and preaching and lecturing wherever you may be invited. After your return from Rome you must have full liberty to say mass and exercise your ministry in public everywhere. The delegate said emphatically he will insist on this point."

Temperance Workers on the Move.

An Estimate That Prohibition Have Fifty Thousand Majority.

BERLIN, Aug. 10.—A meeting was re-cently held in Trinity Methodist Church, Berlin, of the temperance workers of the town for the purpose of getting ready for the vote on the plebiscite in January next. the vote on the pichiacite in January next. The meeting was very largely attended and great enthusiasm prevailed. The appointment of an executive committee was about the only business done, and the duty of the committee is to hold meetings for temperance at intervals, and do everything possible to promote the work of temperance, and get out every vote in the coming election.

A PLEBISCITE ESTIMATE TORONTO, Aug. 10.—An enthusiastic ecting was held here the other night to anize the city for the approaching piscite on prohibition. One of the best plebiscite on prohibition. One of the best authorities on the temperance side esti-mates that a total vote throughout Ontario of 300,000 will be given, of which 175,000 will be for prohibition, 125,000 against, giving a majority for prohibition of 50.

Later dispatches from Coal Creek say the soldiers have arrested a miner named Moore on suspicion of being au accomplice of Drummond and Elkius, and unless he of Drummond and Eikins, and unless he can prove his innocence he will be lynched. This morning over 5,000 miners went out on strike and serious trouble is expected.

Nor are all the displays of agriculture made here, for in the Horticultural building and in many of the State buildings are exhibits that are individually worth the price of many admissions, and among these the charming display in the looked or forgotten.

among these the charming display in the Illinois State building should not be overlooked or forgotten.

There is so much to be seen in so short a time by visitors at the fair that a systematic course of action should be adopted. I would advise readers who are coming to obtain information freely from the Columbian guards, who may be seen in any part of the grounds and in all the buildings. They will courteously instruct all who approach them for guidance. After entering the grounds at any point find your way to the Old Times Distillery building and obtain a map of the grounds which is distributed free to all visitors. It will save many an unnecessary step and enable everyone to locate the buildings on the grounds more readily than they could otherwise do. Next proceed to the terminus of the Intraumural Railway, near the Krupp gun exhibit and spend 10 conts for a ride around the grounds on an electric railway, from which an excellent view is obtained. Near the terminal station is the Canadian head quarters, and, after registering there, vieit the various buildings in any order desired, consulting the map daily until you have mastered the situation and made it possible to visit any part of the grounds without getting lost. IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—After several days' deliberation the eastern racing associations determined yesterday to reduce the value of their over-night purses from \$1,000 to \$600. The announcement of this sweeping reduction was made public last night, when the following official bulletin was sent out: "The added money for the over-night events for the fall meetings of the Coney Island Jockey Club, Brooklyn Jockey Club and New York Jockey Club will be \$600 and upwards. As the Monmouth Park meeting will close in two weeks, it was not mentioned in the notice, but there is no question that the purses will be reduced at that track next year. These four associations, the Monmouth Park, the Coney Island, the Brooklyn and the New York jockey clubs comprise all the legitmate race tracks in the east, and their united action in the matter of reduction of the value of the purses will have a tremendous influence on the thoroughbred interests all over the United States. The value of the thoroughbred is, of course, dependent upon his earning capacity and if that is reduced \$60 per cent. the price of the thoroughbred must be correspondingly effected. As there are millions of dollars invested in running horses in Kentucky, Tennessee, Virgina, California and other States, the widespread effect of this decision of the eastern associations may be imagined. The reduction in values has been probably forced on the big clubs by the decreased attendance this season and the bitter rivalry of the small associations. EMANCIPATION OF THE IMPERIAL

PARLIAMENT. It would not do to totally exclude the Trish people from representation in the British House of Commons. Ireland 18 and must remain a portion of the United Kingdom. The position of the two islands -their contiguity to the great and ambitious European continental nationsmakes it necessary that they should pull together in all matters relating to external defense and trade and commerce.

For this reason, Parliament was war ranted in condemning the view set up by Mr. Chamberlain and his friends, that the Irish should virtually be debarred from representation in the Imperial Parliament.

There is some force in the objection that, though the Irish are to have a local legislature, they are still to have representation in the Commons alongside of the other divisions of Great Britain which, as yet, have no local legislature.

But does anyone suppose that the muchneeded unloading of Irish local concerns on a local legislature will not be followed by the necessary corollary of a local legislature for England and Scotland as well? When these portions of the nation are also able to transact their own local affairs in legislatures established at London and Edinburgh respectively, the world will witness the application of the federal system in the motherland. There will be system in the mother and. There will be nothing dangerous in the change—nothing very revolutionary. The sun will rise and set, and the people will continue to do business as before. But the management of British public affairs, which becomes more difficult and more harassing every few. British trade and commerce had not permeated every civilized and every savage country in the world, the democracy was not recognized in the government of the country, and the laws passed were chiefly designed to benefit the territorial magnates, and were therefore few and very conservative in their scope.

Conditions have entirely changed, and statesmen are recognizing that methods of povernment must change with them—that if the Imperial Parliament is to be imperial in fact as well as in name, it must cease attempting to control every petty municipal change, every little local reform that may be desired. These matters, it is recognized, must be settled by local legislatures of the respective already been accepted with respect to divisions of the kingdom. RIGHTFULNESS OF THE PLEBIS.

We are glad to find that Hon. G. W Ross, Minister of Education, and one o the most advanced temperance men in the Province, discusses the Referendum and Plebiscite in the Canadian Magazine for August. He effectively supports the stand taken by the ADVERTISER in favor of get ting at the undivided sentiments of the ommunity on the great moral question o prohibition by means of an untrammelec ote of the electors. The considerations dduced by the honorable gentleman in avor of the plebiscite are as follows:

1. It is an appeal to the calm judgmen of the electorate on a simple issue— a yes or no. Instead of a jury of twelve, as in ordinary civil or riminal cases, it is a jury of the nation and the jurors know that their verdic may affect themselves and their children o remotest generations.

2. It increases the responsibility of the electors. In the last analysis, sovereignty is with them. Why should the sovereign not be consulted in matters of state? If an evil is to be removed who is to benefited thereby but the people? If a great nationa reform is to be inaugurated why not let them share in the honor? Has Edward Burke's great maxim lost its force, namely, "Government by the people, for the people, and through the people?"

3. It increases the stability of legislation. In 1855 New Brunswick passed a prohibitory liquor law; the following year it was repealed, and Sir Leonard Tilly, the present Lieutenant-Governor of the Provnce-than whom no better authority could be cited-says the effect was injuriou to the temperance cause. A few days ago the book business was sold to Revell, of Chicago, for 45 cents on the dollar, and merged with the stock of the Willard Tract depository. The Review was then sold to Clougher Bros., two energetic yeung Episcopalians of Toronto, for \$5,000. They have issued their first number. The page is smaller than before, the quality of paper inferior, their first number. 
