Solidity of National Finances in the Face of Trade Depression.

A Whole Native Tribe Obliterated by French Forces.

PARIS, April 16 .- The French forces at Timbuctoo have completely destroyed the troublesome Touareg tribe after a series of engagements. In one conflict the Touaregs left 120 dead on the field.

Underground Travel in London.

London, April 16 .- London will soon have an extensive addition to the underground railroad system. A line is to run north from Charing Cross to Euston and Hampstead. There will also be another east and west line, to cost \$20,000,000.

The Duke Volunteers as a Fire Laddie.

COBURG, April 16. - A furious fire started here this morning in a building facing the royal palace. The flames were finally subdued, but not until the building had been nearly destroyed. The Duke of Saxe-(Coburg (Duke of Edinburgh) gave active assistance to the firemen in putting out the blaze.

Armenians Massacred by Kurds.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 16 .- A report has been received here of an attack upon a body of Armenian emigrants to Russia by a band of Kurds, in which a large number of Armenians were killed. London, April 16 .- The budget was introduced in the House of Commons today by Sir Wm. Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer. BERLIN, April 17 .- The repeal of the anti-Jesuit laws was supported by the Centrists, Radicals, Socialists, People's Party, Alsatians, Poles and Farmers' Alliance, and opposed by the Conservatives, Imperialists, National Liberals and the members of the Radical Union.

In the Aristocratic "Swim." LONDON, April 17 .- It is said that a large number of the aristocracy, badly hit by the prevailing agricultural depression, have arranged to hire horses and carriages this season instead of keeping their own. Nevertheless, the season is expected to be exceptionally brilliant. Several great nobles who for various reasons have for years past kept the doors of their London good order. clining, and improved systems of detection, along with a decrease of crime, have rendered criminal practice the mere shadow of what it used to be. Slow as the process of simplifying law is in England, it has already cut hugh slices out of the cake on which the bar used to feed. The combined results are a vast increasing army of unemployed barristers and solicitors, with an inevitable lowering of the tone of the profession and a growing temptation to shady practices. The plain truth that "lawyer" has become synonymous in the common English mind with "robber" and "oppressor" was hinted at a good deal in the speeches, and a general sentiment was disclosed that the time for a radical overhauling of the whole system had arrived. The matter has been referred to a committee and there will be a characteristic delay, but there is a feeling that the ultimate result will be the abolition of the absurd immunities, prerogatives and limitations now engirdling the English barrister and his practical amalgamaticn with the solicitor.

Rothschild Gets the Lottery Price. PARIS, April 17 .- The Gaulis says Baron de Rothschild has won the first prize of 100,000 francs in the Marsielles municipal lottery. The entire sum will be given by the baron to charities.

A GREAT COAL BED.

Furnishes Matter for a Lively Debate in Parliament.

The Premier Driven Into a Corner by Neither Mileage, Percentage or

the Liberal Leader.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.) OTTAWA, Ont., April 16.—There was a lively debate this evening in the House over the French treaty. It arose on a motion made by Mr. Laurier for papers respecting the statement in the official note attached to the treaty. though not part of it, that Canada had voted \$500,000 for a steamship line between Canada and a Fronch terminal port. This note was signed by Lord Dufferin and Sir

Charles Tupper. Mr. Laurier alluded to Sir John Thompson's denial the other day that any such pledge had been given and quoted from the official note to show that it had been given, and very distinctly, and that it was a basic part of the negotiations

which ended in the treaty. In fact it was put in the draft of the treaty, and was only expunged to be transfer d to the official note attached to the treaty. Sir Charles Tupper had written to the French negotiators that without such a direct line of steamers the treaty would be of no use to Canada. Goods going to France from America other than by a direct line are subjected to a port tax. Mr. Laurier read many extracts from

official papers already brought down. Sir John Thompson declared that from first to last there was no promise of a subsidy for a direct line to France. The subsidy that Lord Dufferin and Sir Charles Tupper promised was the existing fast Atlantic subsidy of \$500,000, which applied to a line which would call at a French port. It was, however, the intention of the Government to establish a direct line with France. He declined to discuss the treaty until it came up.

Mr. Laurier declared that the honor of Canada was involved in Sir John Thompson's repudiation, as the pledge of a subsidy was the basis of the treaty.

Government was pledged to ask Parliament to vote \$500,000 for a direct line to France.

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS, TORONTO, April 16 -The session is now nearing its close, and a week or ten days will probably be the extent of its duration. A large amount of business was dispatched to-day. Sir Oliver Mowat's bill to enable boards of trade to appoint general arbitrators for certain puroses was passed. Hon. C. F. Fraser spoke during the

afternoon in favor of Mr. Barr's (Dutlerin) bill to regulate the sale of goods by agents. Mr. Meredith raised some objections to the bill, which was again referred to com-

The House once more went into committee on a bill to secure the prompt punishment of persons guilty of personation at elections for the Legis. lative Assembly. The bill at first only applied to cities. Mr. Gibson amended it so that the provisions apply to towns and incorporated villages where there is a police magistrate. Mr. Meredith suggested the other day that the bill should be made operative in all parts of the Province. Mr. Gibson objected to this proposition to-day. He said that the argument was very plausible, but it was impracticable. There was not the same evil from personation in the country as in the city. There were no magistrates in country districts, and it would be wrong to arrest a man at the whim of a returning officer.

The House adjourned at 5:40.

For the Electric Street Railway Franchise.

Cheap Fares Are in It.

They Propose to Run to Springbank on t'le Pipe Line Road.

Ald. Judd Effectually Objects to Being "Sat Upon." Wrangle in Re a Grant to the Mount

Hope Orphanage-Non-Resident Fruit Peddiars Must Pay \$10, \$30 and \$.0 Licenses-Ald. Wm. Heaman Granted Leave of Absence-The Bread Bylaw Deleated.

The council had a little scrimmage last night, and for a time warm words flew thick and fast. Insinuations, taunts and charges were freely exchanged, and the fair robe of charity was besmirched in the attempt to stir up prejudice. The course taken by Mayor Essery, however, brought down on his head the censure of some of his old-time colleagues, and in the end the grant to the Mount Hope Roman Catholic Orphanage was voted. Another interesting feature was a new bid for the electric franchise, which was sent to committee. There is no offer of percentage or mileage, nor are there any cheap fares mentioned. The parties tendering ask for the streets already occupied by the horse car system, but failing in securing those they would be satisfied with parallel streets. The Pipe Line road to Springbank is among the streets mentioned in the offer.

THE NEW OFFER. 1. William Ferguson appeared to present their views. They each objected to the horde of fruit peddlars that were in the city one day and away the next and paid no taxes being allowed to peddle in competition with tax-paying citizens.

It was finally agreed, on motion of Ald. Judd, to charge non-residents a \$40 license fee for a two-horse wagen, \$30 for a onehorse wagon, and \$10 for a basket or pushcart peddlar.

NUMBER TWO COMMITTEE. No. 2 committee's report recommended, among other things, that Charles Barfit's tender for artificial stone walk at 21 cents square foot, according to specifications, be accepted, and that the Sylica-Barytic Company, Ingersoll, be allowed to lay certain sidewalks at their own specification at 15 cents.

Several members expressed themselves very plainly against allowing any company to tender on their own specifications. Ald. J. W. Jones said that they had better do without walks than have them like those put down on Carling street and Richmond at Dufferin avenue. He was op-

posed to artificial stone walks, anyway.

Ald. Nutkins had seen walks in Ingersell that he could not recommend. Ald. Judd believed that the tender of (Continued on Page 3.)

THE PICKEREL AND ITS EYE.

Startling Experience of a Sport Who Angled for Chubs.

The Three-Mile Running Record Reduced by Half a Second.

PISCATORIAL.

STARTLING EXPERIENCE WITH A NEW BAIT. ROULETTE, Pa., April 16 .- Wm. Lillibridge was fishing in the Allegheny River near Portville the other day for silver chubs. He had caught but one after an hour's fishing, and was on the point of pulling up and going home when he felt a smart jerk on his line, which began to move off in the water. He found that he had hooked a big fish, and after a lively struggle the hook's hold was broken and the prize escaped. On examining his hook Lillibridge was surprised to see a fish's eye impaled on it. The eye was a big one, and from the way the hook was fastened in it the fisherman saw that the hook must have caught the fish accidentally in the eye, and that the fish had not bitten at the bait. In the struggle the eye was torn from its

Having heard that a fish's eye was a killing bait for perch and pickerel, Lillibridge concluded to give this strangely acquired eye a trial. He dropped his hook into the river and played it about for a moment when he got a strike that was sufficient indersement of the taking qualities of a fish's eye for bait. He had an exciting fight with the fish for a few seconds, but his tackle was not intended for fish of that size and strength and his line parted a foot or two above the hook. He lost his fish but went home and got stronger tackle, thinking that if fish of that size were biting he would try a little further to get

It happened that his wife, evidently wanting to be sure of having fish for dinner, had during his absence purchased a mess of suckers from some boys who had been net fishing. Lillibridge took the eyes out of two or three of the suckers and returned to the river. He made a cast with one of the sucker eyes, and the bait had scarcely touched the water before it was seized by a fish that gave the angler another contained. good fight. This one was landed. It was went to remove his hook from its jaw he fish line only a few minutes before. This was surprising, but when the fisherman discovered that the pickerel had but one eye, the missing one having but recently keen removed from the socket, his amaze-

ment was great. There could be no doubt that the missing eye was the one that his chub hook had saught and torn from the pickerel less than a quarter of an hour before. The pickerel had evidently considered the removal of his eye from its natural place as of small consequence compared to its attractiveness as an epicurean delicacy, and had pro-ceeded to recover it and tickle his plate with it the instant it reappeared in the water. The fisherman's hock interrupted the process, and, if the line had been strong enough, the pickerel would have fallen victim to his intention of dining on his own eye. But his appetite and nerve were so little disturbed by the tearing of the eye from its socket, and the subsequent placing of it and a two-inch hook in his hroat, that when the sucker's eye appeared he did not hesitate to try his chances with that, and was lost.
